The Baptism of the Lord

The Stage for the Baptism of Jesus was set by John the Baptist, who preached judgement and repentance. People were filled with expectation that he was the Christ. Then out of obscurity Jesus walked in, and was baptized by John. He was revealed to be God's beloved son "After the Lord was baptized, the heavens were opened and the Spirit descended upon him like a dove and the voices of the Father thundered; This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased." (Matthew 3;16-17). The early followers of Jesus realized that Jesus' own ministry began after he was baptized by John. The Gospel of Mark, the first to be written, states that John preached baptism as atonement for our sins.

But why did Jesus, who is without sin submit to baptism by John? Each Evangelist has his own take on it, Matthew says it was to fulfill all righteousness (Matthew 3:15). Luke places the baptism of Jesus in the passive voice "After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized (Luke 3:21). John's Gospel does not say Jesus was baptized by John. John the Baptist saw Jesus coming towards him and said "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.. "Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God." (John 1:29-34). None of the other New Testament writers mention Jesus being baptized. So do we have an answer as to why Jesus, the sinless one, had to receive baptism? Was Jesus identifying himself with the rest of humanity? There is no clear cut answer to satisfy our curiosity.

One thing that is clear is the ministry of Jesus that began shortly after His baptism. The Holy Spirit was active at the time of His baptism. Luke also shows that Jesus was at prayer during this event.


Baptism is fundamental to Catholics. Through Baptism we enter into the church, who imparts us to all the rights, privileges and responsibilities. Baptism is a moment of Joy for the parents and the wider family of the Church. Adult baptisms are done at Easter Vigil, but children's baptisms are ideally done at the celebration of the weekend Masses. It makes no sense to say to the child that we welcome

you in our community of faith but we are not here to support them. So let us realize the importance of performing baptisms within the celebration of our weekend Masses. It will be a journey back in time when we ourselves were brought into our local parishes for our own baptisms.

The feast of the baptism of the Lord officially marks the last day of this years' Christmas Season. As we enter into the Ordinary time we all need to hear the voice of God "You are my beloved son/ daughter; with you I am well pleased".

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer:

When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers, and this is symbolized by the white garment.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE January 9, 2022 The Baptism of the Lord

"We are called to live our baptism every day, as new creatures, clothed in Christ." — Pope Francis

What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased.
