

Year of St. Joseph

St. Joseph— By: Fr. William Saunders

St. Joseph truly is the silent figure of the New Testament. For instance, the Gospel does not record one spoken verse for St. Jo-

seph. Nevertheless, what this great saint did in his life for God speaks volumes. To appreciate him and his role in salvation, we need to glean the Gospels.

St. Joseph was "of the house and lineage of David" (Lk 24). Because of this ancestry, St. Joseph is the linkage between the old covenant made with Abraham and Moses, and the new, perfect, and everlasting covenant which will be made through the blood of Jesus. He brings to a close the notion of the Patriarch's promised land and King David's established kingdom, and prepares the way for Jesus, the Messiah, who will establish the new Kingdom of God and the new Promised Land—not a kingdom of land, castles and armies, but one that is within oneself with the Lord, lived now and fulfilled in Heaven.

St. Matthew identifies Joseph as an "upright man". The original text uses the word just or righteous, which better reflects that he lived by God's standard, keeping the commandment and emulating God's love.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question: Are Catholics allowed to visit psychics? Why or why not?

Answer: It's part of human nature to experience some sense of unease and fear about the future. This can lead some people to seek out the services of psychics or consult horoscopes or turn to other occult practices or resources (e.g. Ouija boards or tarot cards). The Catechism of the Catholic Church is very clear that Catholics should avoid such practices: "Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone" (no. 2116).

Despite the uncertainties we might feel, we are called to have faith and trust in God, confident of God's desire for what is best for us. This means that we are called to surrender, to pray and to reflect on how we can best move into the future in hope, knowing that God is with us.

<u>SAINT THÉRÈSE OF LISIEUX Part 6:</u>

This week we continue and conclude with the last and final days of the spiritual journey of St. Therese of Lisieux, also known as the Little Flower. In her trial of faith and final days on earth, Thérèse wrote the following in her autobiography, in The Story of a Soul....



Then suddenly the fog that surrounds me becomes more dense; it penetrates my soul and envelops it in such a way that it is impossible to discover within it the sweet image of my Fatherland; everything has disappeared! When I want to rest my heart fatigued by the darkness that surrounds it by the memory of the luminous country after which I aspire, my torment redoubles; it

seems to me that the darkness, borrowing the voice of sinners, says mockingly to me: "You are dreaming about the light, about a fatherland embalmed in the sweetest perfumes; you are dreaming about the eternal possession of the Creator of all these marvels; you believe that one day you will walk out of this fog that surrounds you! Advance, advance; rejoice in death which will give you not what you hope for but night still more profound, the night of nothingness." Dear Mother, the image I wanted to give you of the darkness that obscures my soul is as imperfect as a sketch is to the model; however, I don't want to write any longer about it; I fear I might blaspheme; I fear even that I have already said too much (SS, 213).

It appears the fog did not lift before Thérèse died. St. John of the Cross might say, "Thérèse, you are finally living with faith, the only proximate means of union with God." Her experience would seem to be an example of John's dark night of the spirit, when intellect, memory, and will are emptied of their content (such as "heaven") and replaced by faith, hope, and charity. Thérèse was living with a truly biblical faith and trust.

Amazingly, most of her writings occurred while she was in this condition. She wrote manuscripts B and C of The Story of a Soul, eighteen letters to two missionaries, eighty other letters, and about twenty-four poems while experiencing her trial of faith. In this writing there is no sign of depression or even discouragement. She is buoyant and faith-filled. When faced with the possibility of not being able to receive Communion, Thérèse said, "Without a doubt, it's a great grace to receive the sacraments; but when God doesn't allow it, it's good just the same; everything is a grace." She said to Mother Agnes, her sister Pauline, "Ah! What darkness! But I am in peace" Therese began manuscript B with a letter to Marie. Do not believe I am swimming in consolations; oh, no my consolation is to have none on earth. Without showing Himself without making His voice heard, Jesus teaches me in secret. ...I understand so well that it is only love that makes us acceptable to God. It was Thérèse's conviction that God was not looking for people to punish; God was looking for people who would open their lives to God's transforming love. Thérèse concluded the Story of a Soul, Yes, I feel it; even though I had on my conscience all the sins that can be committed, I would go, my heart broken with sorrow, and throw myself into Jesus' arms, for I know how much He loves the prodigal child who returns to Him. It is not because God, in His anticipating Mercy, has preserved my soul from mortal sin that I go to Him with confidence and love...

Undoubtedly, it is her little way and her example of living by faith in difficult times that draws people to St. Thérèse, the Little Flower.


