

<u>RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS</u> First Corinthians and the Stewardship of Social Media

"Love is patient, love is kind ..." As familiar as these words are, they never seem to stray into the territory of becoming trite or silly. At their core they communicate a truth about us and about our Creator that never fails to inspire.

But despite the fact that you've probably heard it at many weddings over time, First Corinthians isn't just for newlyweds. It wasn't written for married folks. It's for every single one of us, in every state of life and every social situation, in every country and culture and language across the globe.

Which means that First Corinthians is even for the online world. It's for Facebook and Twitter and Instagram and all the other platforms I'm forgetting (there seems to be a new one every day, doesn't there?).

A sense of division — whether rooted in politics, culture or anything else — is growing in our world, and it's never more obvious than when we observe interactions online. It is far easier, after all, to remember what love is when a human being of flesh and blood stands before us. When all we see is an avatar or a profile picture on a screen — especially accompanied by an opinion with which we vehemently disagree — even the most loving Christians can throw First Corinthians out the window.

As everyday stewards we know that we are charged to be not only gracious but grateful. We receive others but we also give thanks for what they bring to us — even if that's an opportunity to "strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts."

So before the next time you post anything online, I suggest giving First Corinthians a read — and remember, love never fails. — *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS*

Announcements at Mass

Many of you realize that I try as much as possible to avoid announcements during Mass. Sometimes, I must resign myself to the fact that there might be no other way to convey essential information. If that happens, rest assured that I have tried to explore all other avenues about which I knew before making an announcement during Mass.

The Mass is the summit of Christian life. It is the most important thing that we do. Nothing is more important. Nothing is more sacred. If I find myself with no alternative but to make an announcement, you should probably know that the thought going through my head at that moment is, "And now we interrupt this Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for a word from our sponsors."

The good news is that we have a multitude of alternatives to announcements at Mass. Some see announcements at Mass as necessary because "not everyone reads the bulletin." True, but that is why we have so many different means of communication available: bulletins, Flocknote text messages, Flocknote emails, Facebook, Instagram, and even the Jumbotron (aka – the television monitor in the narthex). All these alternatives combined can reach nearly everyone.

And the use of these alternatives helps us to protect the integrity of the Mass.

In much the same way, we avoid taking time in the church itself for socialization. I know that the argument in favor of it is to build community. However, we come together in our sacred church space to worship God, but not to socialize with, or celebrate, each other. Respecting the sacredness of the space, we are committed to building community using all other available means that do not desacralize the worship space of our church. That is why we promote so many gatherings in the hall after Mass. That is why we have a Welcome Desk in the narthex (but not in the nave of the church).

Again, we are committed to building community. But we are also committed to protecting the integrity of the Mass and the sacredness of the church. People question why so few Catholics believe in the Real Presence of the Eucharist. One root problem is that so many others do not worship as though such a Real Presence actually exists. $\sim Fr.$ Bob



SAINT OF THE WEEK --St. Blaise | February 3

You may be familiar with the annual "blessing of throats" that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life.

History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions, and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:


