FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

DEAR FRIENDS,

Christ said to his disciples, "Without me you can do nothing." The Blessed Virgin Mary expressed the same truth in her Magnificat: "He lifts up the humble and raises up the lowly." Today's readings lead us to this same understanding and truth. When we accept the mission God has entrusted to us with humility and trust, He always makes it flourish. This is because the mission and its fulfillment are never about us but about Him who is the Source and the One watering what He has sown in us.

Time and again I hear people say, "Father, who am I? I am just one person, what difference can I make?" This is true from our human side. Yet, when we look at the mission from the side of the One who is its source, we will understand the truth of today's message. Whenever we proclaim the Word of God, we scatter the seed and we let God work on it as He waters it. Secondly, if we trust in God, no matter how much small we can feel about ourselves, and less fitting for the task, if we accept to die to ourselves by giving out our time, talent, and treasure for the sake of the kingdom of God, the Lord himself will make our small actions and our trust yield fruit. The small action each individual makes will sprout and grow by the grace of the Lord.

So, today Christ calls us to abandon our excuses and our fears. When He created and saved us, the God who adopted us in Christ did have more than our own growth and fulfillment in mind. The purpose of Him adopting us was and still is to entrust us with a particular mission within His plan of salvation. This means that every grain and every seed bears a mission. Therefore, when we think that there is nothing we can do to make that mission fulfilled, we are denying the mission and the purpose for which He created us. Nobody should be left behind. Every grain should yield fruits. When we let our spot empty, that void will remain because no one else will leave their spot and cover two empty spots. When we just lay back, we must always try to answer to the following question, "who is going to fill in my spot?" This way, we will always remain aware about our place in the building up of the kingdom of God in union with other members of the body. This unity of commitment to not leaving our spot void and empty is what leads us to accept to die to ourselves in order to allow the growth of our community to a big tree able to offer branches for the birds of the sky to dwell. These branches are the different ministries through which we spread the love and mercy of God to the world. If you are not there, the tree is deprived of a grain necessary to its growth.

As the Lord waters us today with His Word and His Body, let us make ourselves available to Him, as we continue to pray for one another and for our parish family.

QUERIDOS AMIGOS,

Cristo dijo a sus discípulos: "Sin mí no podéis hacer nada". La Santísima Virgen María expresó la misma verdad en su Magnificat: "Él enaltece a los humildes y enaltece a los humildes". Las lecturas de hoy nos llevan a esta misma comprensión y verdad. Cuando aceptamos la misión que Dios nos ha confiado con humildad y confianza, Él siempre la hace florecer. Esto se debe a que la misión y su cumplimiento nunca se trata de nosotros, sino de Aquel que es la Fuente y Aquel que riega lo que ha sembrado en nosotros.

Una y otra vez escucho a la gente decir: "Padre, ¿quién soy yo? Soy solo una persona, ¿qué diferencia puedo hacer?" Esto es cierto desde nuestro lado humano. Sin embargo, cuando miramos la misión desde el lado de Aquel que es su fuente, entenderemos la verdad del mensaje de hoy. Siempre que proclamamos la Palabra de Dios, esparcimos la semilla y dejamos que Dios trabaje en ella mientras la riega. En segundo lugar, si confiamos en Dios, no importa cuán pequeños podamos sentirnos por nosotros mismos, y menos aptos para la tarea, si aceptamos morir para nosotros mismos dando nuestro tiempo, talento y tesoro por el bien del reino de Dios. Dios, el Señor mismo hará que nuestras pequeñas acciones y nuestra confianza den fruto. La pequeña acción que haga cada individuo brotará y crecerá por la gracia del Señor.

Entonces, hoy Cristo nos llama a abandonar nuestras excusas y nuestros miedos. Cuando nos creó y nos salvó, el Dios que nos adoptó en Cristo tenía en mente más que nuestro propio crecimiento y realización. El propósito de su adopción fue y sigue siendo el de confiarnos una misión particular dentro de su plan de salvación. Esto significa que cada grano y cada semilla tiene una misión. Por tanto, cuando pensamos que no hay nada que podamos hacer para que esa misión se cumpla, estamos negando la misión y el propósito para el que nos creó. Nadie debería quedarse atrás. Cada grano debe dar frutos. Cuando dejamos que nuestro lugar se vacíe, ese vacío permanecerá porque nadie más dejará su lugar y cubrirá dos lugares vacíos. Cuando simplemente nos recostamos, siempre debemos tratar de responder a la siguiente pregunta, "¿quién va a ocupar mi lugar?" De esta manera, siempre estaremos conscientes de nuestro lugar en la edificación del reino de Dios en unión con otros miembros del cuerpo. Esta unidad de compromiso de no dejar nuestro lugar vacío y vacío es lo que nos lleva a aceptar morirnos a nosotros mismos para permitir el crecimiento de nuestra comunidad a un gran árbol capaz de ofrecer ramas para que habitan las aves del cielo. Estas ramas son los diferentes ministerios a través de los cuales difundimos el amor y la misericordia de Dios al mundo. Si no estás allí, el árbol se ve privado de un grano necesario para su crecimiento.

Mientras el Señor nos riega hoy con Su Palabra y Su Cuerpo, estemos disponibles para Él, mientras continuamos orando los unos por los otros y por nuestra familia parroquial.

STEWARDSHIP: ST. ANTHONY CAN FIND ANYTHING

“Tony, Tony, come around! Something is lost and it must be found.”

Did you learn this one when you were a kid? In my experience there are even a lot of lapsed Catholics — or people who were never Catholic at all — who know that when you lose something, St. Anthony becomes your best friend. Missing keys? Pray to St. Anthony. Can't find your favorite sweater? St. Anthony. Forget where you parked your car in the mall lot? St. Anth—okay, you get the idea. Whatever it is, large or small, important or trivial, Tony has a reputation for finding the lost things.

It's a devotion that can seem a little like superstition — witchcraft, even? — if you don't really understand it. Mumble an incantation to a dead man and you're guaranteed to find your sunglasses. But as with most traditions that are old, beloved and effective, looking a little closer reveals the truth of the matter.

When we lose something really important, what do we do? We make the whole household stop what they're doing to join the search. Having St. Anthony as a friend means you ask him to stop what he's doing to help, too. And how he helps is by taking the matter exactly where all matters need to go — straight to the feet of Christ.

Here's the real genius of St Anthony: he takes the most mundane, commonplace occurrence — misplacing socks — into an encounter with the divine and truly all things great and small are gifts from God. He grabs our hand and points to the cross. “That's what you're looking for,” he tells us.

In the end, Tony doesn't really find the lost things. He finds the lost people.

ENCOURAGING DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF HIS LIFE & VIRTUES

CATHOLIC VIRTUES: OBEDIENCE

This Saint (John of the Cross), having finished his studies and returned to the monastic life, showed that he had a high opinion of himself on account of his great learning. To cure him, his director gave him a catechism, telling him to lay aside all other books and read this alone, picking out the words syllable by syllable, like a child. He continued to do this for a long time, and with great application, and afterwards confessed that he derived from it not only a high degree of **obedience**, but many other virtues as well.

We read in the Lives of the Fathers that four monks once visited the Abbot Pambo, and each of them told him in private of the virtues of the others. One fasted severely; another did not possess the smallest thing; this one glowed with the most fervent charity; while that one had lived in the practice of obedience for twenty years. When the Abbot had heard these things, one after the other, he said: "The virtue of this last is greatest of all, for the rest followed their own will, but he has made himself the servant of another's will."

A little drop of simple **obedience** is worth a million times more than a whole vase full of the choicest contemplations. --St. Mary Magdalen de' Pazzi
