FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

DEAR FRIENDS,

Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. It is also the end of the Christmas season. With the Baptism of the Lord we enter in the first part of Ordinary Time, the time we are invited to live the spirit of discipleship sustained by hope and faith in the Lord who calls each and all of us to partake in the mission of transforming the world.

As he goes down to the Jourdan riverbank to be baptized by John the Baptist, the Lord teaches us humility. He reminds us that we cannot transform this world without humbly accepting the message which transforms us inside ward. Humility means first of all that we acknowledge and recognize that we depend upon God who created us with and for a purpose. Jesus showed us that He came to fulfill the purpose for which the Father sent Him: to redeem the world. This, He did it with humility and self-sacrifice. It is a call for us to listen to one another and to build a more loving and embracing church and world. To live the spirituality of the synod is to stretch out our hands to embrace and welcome each other; it is also to open our ears to listen to one another and to be determined to journey together as one family. All this requires humility and self-sacrifice, death to oneself in order to make it possible for another brother or sister to have the opportunity to share his/her faith and life journey.

As we renew our baptism promises today, let us resolve to contribute to building of the church as family of God and work towards a more loving, embracing and unified world. Let us make the church, this great family of God, a safe haven for all who hunger for love, understanding and support. And let us continue to pray for one another, and for our parish family.

May God bless us all and help us to engage in the process of interior transformation that will bear fruits in our daily life.

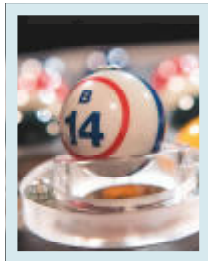

STEWARDSHIP: I HOPE I AM LIKE HIM

“Who is this Christ? Is he like you?”

Perhaps you’ve heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

“He is nothing like me,” the saint is said to have answered. “But I hope I am like him.”

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. “One worthier than I is coming,” he insists. And because of that humility and

that total embrace of God’s will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let’s examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God’s plan? — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

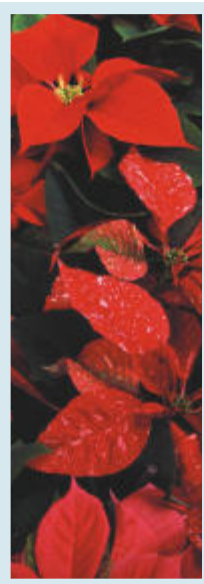

FUNDING DIOCESAN MINISTRIES AND SERVICES

2022 CATHOLIC MINISTRY APPEAL (CMA)

We are changing the way the Diocese funds ministries and shared expenses. Starting in 2022, diocesan leadership provided through the Office of the Bishop, Chancellor and Vicar General necessary for shepherding our local church will be funded through a Cathedralicum tax equal to 2% of parish offertory and donations. Diocesan ministries will be funded through a new, voluntary "Catholic Ministry Appeal," and the former "Annual Pastoral Appeal" (APA) will no longer take place.

Pledging

We currently work with monthly, quarterly and annual pledge cycles. Donors who pledge and do not establish an e-payment account will receive reminders through the mail according to their chosen payment schedule.

One-Time Gift

A one-time gift can be paid at the time of commitment or payment can be scheduled a later date.

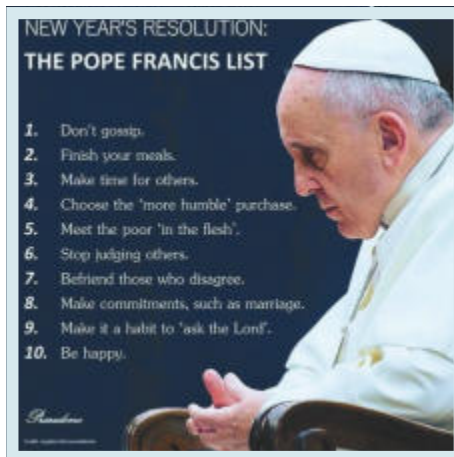
4. Persevere in Prayer! Do not forget that God is always present.
