FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

DEAR FRIENDS,

There is one truth about the human mind, that it is selective. This process happens within our mind even when we are not aware of it. In today's gospel reading we see the struggle Martha is facing and we hear Jesus' response to her.

Generally, when we read this gospel passage, we are tempted to think about an exclusive alternative. We usually think about two unreconcilable things: one being what Mary does, the other pertaining to Martha. And we tend to ask: who am I, Martha or Mary? In today's gospel reading Jesus is inviting us to discover the source of our strength and commitment. In other words, he answers to the question of the "why" of our service to one another. He wants us to answer to the question: "why am I doing this?" Why am I serving? Is it because I just like it? Is it just because I feel like doing it? Or because I just do it? For us Christians and disciples, service to benefit others has its life at the feet of Jesus Christ. We learn from Him and we get all that we need to further our ministry. That is why our service to one another is the expression of our service to God. "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her." What is that better part? As we can see, it is first and foremost to listen to the Lord and to rely on Him as the source of life and of every strength we can get to fulfill our mission as disciples. We are reminded once more of the intrinsic connection between prayer and action. We are called to integrate within us and our life both Mary and Martha. We are not expected to be just Mary or simply Martha. We are meant to be the combination of both. Our commitment to serving should always stem from our deep relationship with the Lord. In the celebration of the Eucharist, we get the blessings and grace that lead us to action. From the feet of Jesus, we move to the world where we are sent to serve God through and by our service to one another. If we rely on human beings as source of our commitment to serving God and one another, we will always experience deception, frustrations and dejection. But if we rely on Christ, nobody will take our joy to serve from us. For we know that the one who called us will always be at our side.

What then about the load of the burden and frustrations that comes with the commitment to serving? Here again the response from Jesus is clear: He is the answer to our life's frustrations. Like Martha in today's gospel, we experience hopelessness and powerlessness amidst the challenges and frustrations of our life. We even come to think that the Lord is far from us and He has abandoned us. Today he tells you that your generous heart that you give and put into what he asks of you will always bear fruit if you rely on him. For your ministry and duty to bear fruit, you are invited to reconcile prayer, lectio divina, meditation, adoration and action. For it is from Jesus, the Source of everything that is good, that you will draw water of courage and strength.

As we turn to the Lord to receive the answer to our life's frustrations, let kneel at his feet, listening to Him in order to make our ministry a true response to his call. And let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish family.

QUERIDOS AMIGOS,

Hay una verdad sobre la mente humana, que es selectiva. Este proceso ocurre dentro de nuestra mente incluso cuando no somos conscientes de ello. En la lectura del evangelio de hoy, vemos la lucha que enfrenta Marta y escuchamos la respuesta de Jesús.

Generalmente, cuando leemos este pasaje del evangelio, nos sentimos tentados a pensar en una alternativa exclusiva. Solemos pensar en dos cosas irreconciliables: una es lo que hace María y la otra pertenece a Marta. Y tendemos a preguntar: ¿quién soy yo, Marta o María? En la lectura del evangelio de hoy, Jesús nos invita a descubrir la fuente de nuestra fuerza y compromiso. En otras palabras, responde a la pregunta del "por qué" de nuestro servicio mutuo. Él quiere que respondamos a la pregunta: "¿por qué estoy haciendo esto?" ¿Por qué estoy sirviendo? ¿Es porque simplemente me gusta? ¿Es solo porque tengo ganas de hacerlo? ¿O porque simplemente lo hago? Para nosotros, cristianos y discípulos, el servicio en

beneficio de los demás tiene su vida a los pies de Jesucristo. Aprendemos de Él y obtenemos todo lo que necesitamos para avanzar en nuestro ministerio. Por eso nuestro servicio mutuo es la expresión de nuestro servicio a Dios. "Martha, Martha, estás ansiosa y preocupada por muchas cosas. Hay necesidad de una sola cosa. María ha escogido la mejor parte y no se la quitarán." ¿Cuál es esa mejor parte? Como vemos, se trata ante todo de escuchar al Señor y confiar en Él como fuente de vida y de todas las fuerzas que podamos adquirir para cumplir nuestra misión de discípulos. Se nos recuerda una vez más la conexión intrínseca entre la oración y la acción. Estamos llamadas a integrar en nosotras y en nuestra vida tanto a María como a Marta. No se espera que seamos simplemente María o simplemente Marta. Estamos destinados a ser la combinación de ambos. Nuestro compromiso de servir siempre debe surgir de nuestra profunda relación con el Señor. En la celebración de la Eucaristía recibimos las bendiciones y las gracias que nos llevan a la acción. De los pies de Jesús, nos movemos al mundo donde somos enviados a servir a Dios a través y por nuestro servicio mutuo. Si confiamos en los seres humanos como fuente de nuestro compromiso de servir a Dios ya los demás, siempre experimentaremos decepción, frustración y abatimiento. Pero si confiamos en Cristo, nadie nos quitará el gozo de servir. Porque sabemos que aquel que nos llamó siempre estará a nuestro lado.

¿Qué pasa entonces con la carga de la carga y las frustraciones que vienen con el compromiso de servir? Aquí nuevamente la respuesta de Jesús es clara: Él es la respuesta a las frustraciones de nuestra vida. Como Marta en el evangelio de hoy, experimentamos desesperanza e impotencia en medio de los desafíos y frustraciones de nuestra vida. Incluso llegamos a pensar que el Señor está lejos de nosotros y nos ha abandonado. Hoy te dice que tu corazón generoso que das y pones en lo que te pide siempre dará fruto si confías en él. Para que vuestro ministerio y deber den fruto, estáis invitados a conciliar la oración, la lectio divina, la meditación, la adoración y la acción. Porque es de Jesús, la Fuente de todo bien, de quien sacaréis agua de valor y de fuerza.

Mientras nos volvemos al Señor para recibir la respuesta a las frustraciones de nuestra vida, arrodillémonos a sus pies, escuchándolo para hacer de nuestro ministerio una verdadera respuesta a su llamado. Y sigamos orando unos por otros y por nuestra familia parroquial.

GN 18:1-10A

WHY AND HOW TO WEAR THE BROWN SCAPULAR OF OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL?

Question: I have grown up wearing the traditional brown scapular, but recently noticed that they have come out with many types of scapular jewelry. I am interested in wearing a scapular bracelet instead of the traditional wool scapular. Does the bracelet contain the same benefits as the brown scapular? Also, must the wool scapular be worn over the head or can it be pinned to your clothes?

Answer: The brown scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel is a wonderful devotion richly promoted by saints and popes since the middle ages. John Paul II wore it every day since his First Communion.

There are many types of religious medals, necklaces, bracelets, and scapulars, but there's only one brown scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel that enjoys such rich blessings. In 1274, Our Lady presented the scapular to St. Simon Stock with the promise that those who die wearing it will escape the fires of hell.

On the day the brown scapular is imposed, that person can gain a Plenary Indulgence. If he wears it



piously, which means saying the 'little office of Our Lady' daily (three Hail Mary's), and observing the virtue of chastity according to his state in life, he can also gain plenary indulgences on various feasts day of Carmelite saints such as July 16 (Our Lady of Mount Carmel), October 1 (St. Therese of Lisieux), and October 15 (St. Theresa of Avila).

Of course, the usual conditions for the plenary indulgence apply: 1) you must wear the scapular piously; 2) you must attend Mass and receive Holy Communion worthily that week; 3) you must go to confession that week: 4) you must pray for the Holy Father and his intentions; 5) and finally, you must be detached from any desire to sin.

When the brown woolen scapular is imposed upon you (investiture ceremony), it should hang over your shoulders, either outside or inside your clothing, but later it can be replaced with a metal scapular medal. It is not intended to be worn as a bracelet or pinned to vour clothes, but since it is a devotional sacramental, there is no prohibition against such practices so long as you try to treat holy things in a holy way. It should not be worn or exhibited as jewelry, but should serve as a reminder that you are a child of God, and your Mother Mary in heaven will watch out for your spiritual and physical welfare.

SEVEN SISTERS APOSTOLATE

Please join us in the small hall to learn more about the Seven Sisters apostolate on **August 12**, after the noon mass. Refreshments will be served. If you are already a sister please come to meet each other. If you are a sub please come so we can show our appreciation. The Seven Sisters Apostolate is a call for women to strengthen the Church by ensuring that a Holy Hour is prayed each day of the week for the sole intention of our parish priests. Each woman

commits to a Holy Hour on a distinct day of the week, thus covering a complete week. The Holy Hour is ideally prayed in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. We ask for a oneyear commitment, which can begin at any time, and is renewable each June.
