FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

DEAR FRIENDS,

A Roman Poet named Horace has a life aphorism, "Carpe diem," translated by "Seize the day." The saying is usually used to encourage someone to make the most of the present rather than dwelling on the future. This invitation to focus only on immediate success and fulfillment in life has brought different understandings of happiness, particularly the one themed Hedonism, which is the belief that pleasure, or the absence of pain, is the most important principle in determining the morality of a potential course of action. This has led to the moral relativism that characterizes our world today.

Today's readings take us to a different direction and different level of understanding the meaning of our life. They remind us of the purpose of life. Why did God create human beings? Saint Paul said that we are not citizens of the world. "We are citizens of heaven..." (Philippians 3:20-21). The same truth comes from the mouth of Christ in his priestly prayer in the gospel of John when he says, "I am not asking you to remove them from the world, but to protect them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world" (John 17:15-16).

Two things to consider here. For one we are reminded that life is a journey on earth; and as such it should be oriented towards things which make us experience the ascent to the highest joy and happiness, which is communion with the Lord. Secondly, that we are meant to strive to live up the foretaste of what we shall be here on earth. For the kingdom of heaven is at hand. It is already here although not yet fulfilled. We are invited to labor for what is above because all is vanity here on earth. Concern for temporal materials will always be cause of distress and anxiety.

The first reading from the book of Qoheleth is a constant reminder is given to us today as antidote to the culture of jouissance that characterized our world today. Happiness is a function of the social rank we hold or our possession. We are reminded that material possessions have a mission and purpose in God's plan; that they are means to help us strengthen our relationship with God and to spread God's love. They are not an end on their own. True richness is to be found in a personal relationship with God when we strive to seek the One who is above. This will make us claim not only what we have but who we are as belonging to Christ. Seek ye first the kingdom of heaven and everything else will be given to you besides.

At this table, God invites us to share in eternal food which is more valuable than any other food. Whereas material food and possessions can give us a certain level of joy and relief, they will not give us eternal happiness. It is only in and with God that we will find true food that sustains our life.

And let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish family.

QUERIDOS AMIGOS,

Un poeta romano llamado Horacio tiene un aforismo de vida, "Carpe diem", traducido por "Aprovecha el día". El dicho generalmente se usa para alentar a alguien a aprovechar al máximo el presente en lugar de pensar en el futuro. Esta invitación a centrarse solo en el éxito inmediato y la realización en la vida ha traído diferentes interpretaciones de la felicidad, en particular el hedonismo temático, que es la creencia de que el placer, o la ausencia de dolor, es el principio más importante para determinar la moralidad de un potencial. Curso de acción. Esto ha llevado al relativismo moral que caracteriza nuestro mundo hoy.

Las lecturas de hoy nos llevan a una dirección diferente y a un nivel diferente de comprensión del significado de nuestra vida. Nos recuerdan el propósito de la vida. ¿Por qué Dios creó a los seres humanos? San Pablo dijo que no somos ciudadanos del mundo. "Somos ciudadanos del cielo..." (Filipenses 3:20-21). La misma verdad sale de la boca de Cristo en su oración sacerdotal en el evangelio de Juan cuando dice: "No te pido que los quites del mundo, sino que los protejas del maligno. Ellos no pertenecen al mundo más de lo que yo pertenezco al mundo" (Juan 17:15-16).

Dos cosas a considerar aquí. Por un lado, se nos recuerda que la vida es un viaje en la tierra; y como tal debe orientarse hacia cosas que nos hagan experimentar la ascensión al gozo y felicidad más altos, que es la comunión con el Señor. En segundo lugar, que estamos destinados a esforzarnos por vivir el anticipo de lo que seremos aquí en la tierra. Porque el reino de los cielos se ha acercado. Ya está aquí aunque aún no se ha cumplido. Estamos invitados a trabajar por lo de arriba porque todo es vanidad aquí en la tierra. La preocupación por los materiales temporales siempre será causa de angustia y ansiedad.

La primera lectura del libro de Qoheleth es un recuerdo constante que se nos da hoy como antídoto a la cultura del goce que caracterizó nuestro mundo de hoy. La felicidad está en función del rango social que ostentemos o de nuestra posesión. Se nos recuerda que las posesiones materiales tienen una misión y propósito en el plan de Dios; que son medios para ayudarnos a fortalecer nuestra relación con Dios y a difundir el amor de Dios. No son un fin en sí mismos. La verdadera riqueza se encuentra en una relación personal con Dios cuando nos esforzamos por buscar a Aquel que está arriba. Esto nos hará reclamar no solo lo que tenemos, sino también lo que somos como pertenecientes a Cristo. Buscad primero el reino de los cielos y todo lo demás se os dará.

En esta mesa, Dios nos invita a compartir el alimento eterno que es más valioso que cualquier otro alimento. Mientras que los alimentos y las posesiones materiales pueden darnos un cierto nivel de alegría y alivio, no nos darán la felicidad eterna. Sólo en y con Dios encontraremos el verdadero alimento que sostiene nuestra vida.

Y sigamos orando unos por otros y por nuestra familia parroquial.

READINGS

FIRST READING

ECC 1:2; 2:21-23

Vanity of vanities, says Qoheleth, vanity of vanities! All things are vanity! Here is one who has labored with wisdom and knowledge and skill, and yet to another who has not labored over it, he must leave property. This also is vanity and a great misfortune. For what profit comes to man from all the toil and anxiety of heart with which he has labored under the sun? All his days sorrow and grief are his occupation; even at night his mind is not at rest. This also is vanity.

SECOND READING

COL 3:1-5, 9-11

Brothers and sisters: If you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory. Put to death, then, the parts of you that are earthly: immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and the greed that is idolatry. Stop lying to one another, since you have taken off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed, for knowledge, in the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcision and uncircumcision, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all and in all.

LK 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me." He replied to him, "Friend, who appointed me as your judge and arbitrator?" Then he said to the crowd, "Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions." Then he told them a parable. "There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest. He asked himself, 'What shall I do, for I do not have space to store my harvest?' And he said, 'This is what I shall do: I shall tear down my barns and build larger ones. There I shall store all my grain and other goods and I shall say to myself, "Now as for you, you have so many good things stored up for many years, rest, eat, drink, be merry!"' 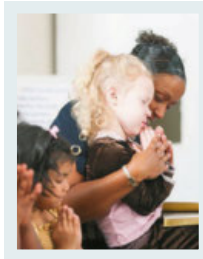

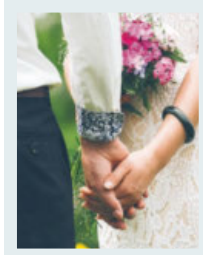
CATECHISTS NEEDED

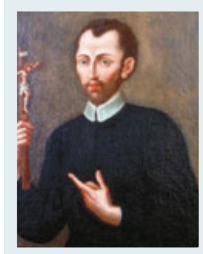
MARRIAGE JUBILEE MASS

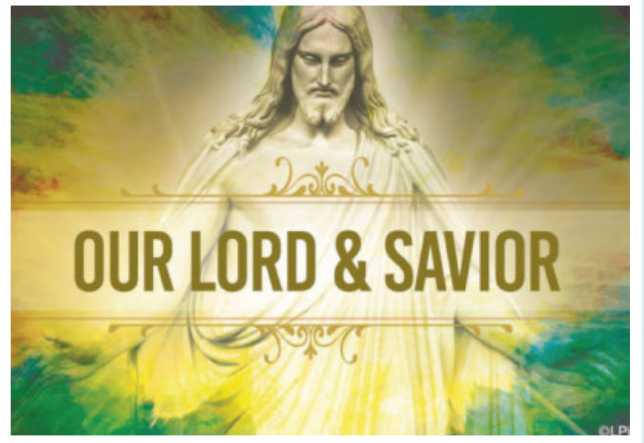

15 Q. What are the species of the bread and of the wine?

A. The species of the bread and of the wine are the quantity and sensible qualities of the bread and of the wine, such as the form, the color, and the taste.

16 Q. How can the species of the bread and of the wine remain without their substance?

A. The species of the bread and of the wine remain without their substance in a wonderful way by the power of God Almighty.

17 Q. Under the species of the bread is there only the Body of Jesus Christ and under the species of the wine only His Blood?

A. Both under the species of the bread and under the species of the wine the living Jesus Christ is all present, with His Body, His Blood, His Soul and His Divinity.

18 Q. Can you tell me why Jesus Christ is whole and entire both in the host and in the chalice?

A. Both in the host and in the chalice Jesus Christ is whole and entire, because He is living and immortal in the Eucharist as He is in heaven; hence where His Body is, there also are His Blood, His Soul, and His Divinity; and where His Blood is, there also are His

Body, His Soul and His Divinity, all these being inseparable in Jesus Christ.

19 Q. When Jesus Christ is in the host does He cease to be in heaven?

A. When Jesus Christ is in the host He does not cease to be in heaven, but is at one and the same time in heaven and in the Blessed Sacrament.

20 Q. Is Jesus Christ present in all the consecrated hosts in the world?

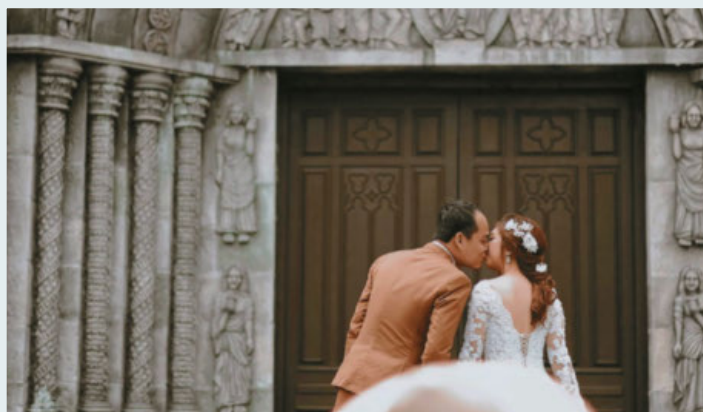
A. Yes, Jesus Christ is present in all consecrated hosts in the world.

What makes us feel secure? Many people look to tangible forms of security that will safeguard their livelihood and prepare for their future. We tend to associate security with things: the accumulation of goods and possessions, retirement funds, savings accounts, and substantial incomes. While acquiring these promises a life with less anxiety and worry, we actually find ourselves more preoccupied and consumed with their growth and preservation. We can easily become quasi-hoarders, consumed with obtaining more tangible crutches. Our minds and hearts are always restless, and we never seem to be at peace.

Why do we so easily give our self-worth, value, and sense of security over to things? God certainly does not deny us the pursuit of a productive and enjoyable life but where do we draw the line? A sense of well-being and happiness can easily get deferred to sometime "in the future" while we continue to wrestle with the toils of today. There is no guarantee that there will be an earthly tomorrow and all of the frenzy we bring to securing our state in life will be for naught.



When we are called from this world, will we even know where to begin to look for the tranquility and repose our souls so desperately need?

We cannot be hoarders, pursuers of vanity, or greedy. They just don't work as they are too dependent on things that can fall apart. Rather than always feeling the need for more, we need to learn how to be grateful for what we have. By learning to look inward we can learn how to live lives of faithful service to others. "Happiness can only be achieved by looking inward and learning to enjoy whatever life has, and this requires transforming greed into gratitude (St. John Chrysostom)." We all need to be

good stewards of what has been entrusted to our care. Grateful hearts recognize the true source of what we have and realize that our true treasure lies not in what matters to us but to God.
