

Reflection on Sunday's Readings 13th Sunday in Ordinary Jime

J n listening to this Sunday's readings, you soon discover that there is a common theme of hospitality. In the first reading, we hear about how God rewarded the childless couple, who had provided food and shelter to Elisha the prophet, with the birth of a son. In the Gospel reading, Jesus similarly tells the apostles of the rewards that are given to those who extend their hospitality to them. This notion of hospitality is fundamental to Christian living and provides a significant way in which we can put into practice Jesus' command to love our neighbors as ourselves.

It is said that when we welcome another person, we also welcome God, who is the source of all life. Because human life is created in God's image, it possesses the inalienable right to life and to be respected for what it truly is; a gift given to us that reflects in a special way the image of God. Because of this, we can say that God dwells within each one of us. While it is easy for most of us to recognize this in our friends and in those people that we love, Jesus expects us to extend this attitude towards all people that we encounter; the homeless, the stranger, the immigrant, the child in the womb.

So how do we live out this commandment today? Is Jesus asking us to open our homes to anyone who is homeless or in need of a meal or a place to stay? Are we to open our wallets and give away all that we have? While some people choose to do this, most of us have circumstances that don't allow us to pursue this option, whether it be over concern for safety and welfare or many other issues. The matter really lies with our attitude. When we hear about illegal immigrants in the news, what do we think? When a homeless person approaches us asking for help, what do we say? When we see a car broken down at the side of the road, what do we do? You see, Jesus always wants us to realize that He is the

person in these situations. While we might have reasons that prevent us from acting in these situations, we can still respond with an attitude of RESPECT. This respect begins with our thoughts. These thoughts, which are shaped by our attitude, then become expressed through our words, and in the end, our thoughts and words give life to our deeds.

We can all be disciples of hospitality by simply examining our attitude towards others. If we are able to look past outward appearances, we will then see the reflection of God within them. Today's readings remind us that we need to examine our thoughts, words and deeds and see if our attitude is directing us toward Christ or away from him.



A Pilgrimage to Important yet Little-known Religious Sites in France

I had the opportunity to visit France this past two weeks. As you may know, France is a place of vibrant culture and history. It offers a diverse landscape filled with amazing sights and iconic landmarks. It is also famous for its delicious food, including cheese and wine. I learned that the cooler climate of the France countryside makes its wine stand out because it yields higher acidity and a lower percentage of alcohol that help them pair much better with food and is easier to consume.

I was blessed with a generous host family who took me to places to try French delicacies, experience the culture, and explore the unique beauty of the countryside of Southern France.

My vacation would not be complete without stopping by religious places. Some of the significant sacred sites I visited were the Shrine and the Cathedral of Marseille, where the tomb

of one of its renowned bishops, Bishop Eugene de Mazenod, who founded the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, was located.



I also visited the Shrine of Saint-Maximin-la-Sainte-Baume, where Mary Magdalene, a close disciple of Jesus, was laid to rest. In Lyon, I stopped by the Basilica of Notre-Dame de Fourvière, where I concelebrated the Mass with Fr. Marc Gustinelli, our Diocese's newly ordained



concelebrated and preached at an English Mass at the Antibes Cathedral, which many Filipino Immigrants call their spiritual home.

All these visits allow me to renew my faith, appreciate my priestly vocation and ministry, and admire the universality and vibrancy of our Catholic Faith. I also remembered those who asked for my prayers.

I want to let you, my family, friends, and parishioners know that I especially prayed for you. I also brought some dirt (soil) from our parish to be offered to God at a special religious site. The parable of the sower describes our hearts as the soil where the Word of God can grow. Jesus, who has healed many, spits into the dust. He wipes it on the eyes of a blind man and instructs him to go and wash it off. He was healed (John 9). I laid the dirt at the Monastery of St. Joseph in Cotignac, the capital of the Region of Provence.

The apparition of St. Joseph in Cotignac is not well-known to many Catholics. Yet, it was the first church-approved apparition way before that of Fatima, Portugal, on October 13, 1917, where after the miracle of the sun, the blessed mother appeared along with St. Joseph holding the child Jesus. The other known St. Joseph apparition occurred in Knock, Ireland, in 1879. On June 7, 1660, more than 500 years ago, amid a sweltering summer in France, a young shepherd named Gaspar Ricard was searching for fresh grass on Mount Besillion. Because of the exceptionally hot summer, he had to stop as he suffered from intense thirst. While resting, he suddenly saw a tall man standing next to him. The man declared himself Joseph and told Gaspar to lift the large boulder to get water. It was a huge rock, and moving it would be impossible for him alone. Nevertheless, he listened to the man and attempted to move the rock. Gaspar did not ask the man for any explanation. He was surprised he could lift the boulder and saw a freshwater spring under it.

Gaspar rushed to the village and told the folks what had happened. They all rushed to the site to see the spring. They saw an abundant supply of water, which was never seen before. The water has a great healing quality and has continued attracting pilgrims worldwide who come to drink the water and find healing remedies. Many returned to their homes, healed and renewed. St. Joseph brings families together and heals their problematic relationships. He also helps people who experience financial hardship and difficulties and grants wisdom to those who make important life decisions. Since the beginning, the spring has never dried up.





The present site has a chapel and a statue of St. Joseph on the apparition site. In 1661, King Louis XIII made a royal decree designating the 19th of March as the feast of St. Joseph. It was known that four years earlier, the King had already consecrated France to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Roughly 2 miles away from the site of the apparition of St. Joseph, Mary also appeared, where a chapel is built known as Our Lady of Graces. The local bishop at that time combined the sites of both apparitions under the title, Sanctuary of the Holy Family.


St. Joseph is indeed a father to Jesus and is for us. He provides and cares for his spiritual children. According to St.

Teresa of Avila, a known devotee to St. Joseph, she did not remember ever asking him anything he failed to grant. She was astonished at the many favors God had bestowed on her through the intercession of St. Joseph.

May St. Joseph help me, as I am a spiritual father to many of you. May I always show patience, understanding, and strength as I lead our parish closer to God.

To share with you a special blessing, I took a bottle of water from the spring and used it to bless rosaries of St. Joseph, a reminder of the strong bond of love and faith of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Joseph. Please visit the parish office if you wish to have the rosary.

I feel blessed with this marvelous opportunity to have a time of physical and spiritual rejuvenation. I am back with renewed vigor and energy to fulfill my mission in our faith-filled parish of St. Vincent Ferrer.

St. Maria Goretti

Young people today often feel pressure from society, from movies, even from their peers, to live a life of less than modest behavior. One saint we can turn to when we look for help against temptation is St. Maria Goretti, who was not even twelve years old when she died. Maria was born on October 16, 1890 in the Italian town of Corinaldo, which is about 50 miles north of Assisi. Her family

were farmers. She was just nine years old when her father died. After his death, her family had to share a house with another family, the Serenellis. Maria's mother and siblings worked in the fields. while Maria took care of the household duties. The twenty-year old son of the Serenelli family, Allesandro, often made sexual advances to her.

Maria always refused, saying it was a sin and not in accordance with God's will. One afternoon, when Maria was eleven years old, Alessandro Serenelli again made sexual advances to her. Maria again refused to submit, which angered Alessandro. He choked her; but she still would not submit. She fought against him, declaring she would rather die than submit to him. He then stabbed her 14 times. She desperately tried to reach the door, to get away from him, but he intercepted her, stabbing her three more times.

When her family found her bleeding, she was taken to the nearest hospital, where she was hurried into surgery without the benefit of anesthesia, but she was injured beyond help.



Within twenty-four hours of Allesandro's last attack, Maria died, having voiced her forgiveness of him. Allesandro was subsequently arrested. convicted, and jailed. He did repent during his imprisonment. After serving 27 years, he was released from prison, and visited Maria's mother, whom he begged for forgiveness, which she granted. Allesandro later became a Capuchin lay brother. Maria was beatified on April 27, 1947. In attendance at the

ceremony were both her mother, Assunta, and Pope Pius XII, who greeted Assunta, saying "Blessed mother, happy mother, mother of a Blessed." Three years later, on June 24, 1950, Pius XII canonized Maria as a saint. Assunta was again present at the ceremony, along with her four remaining sons and daughters. Alessandro was also present.


