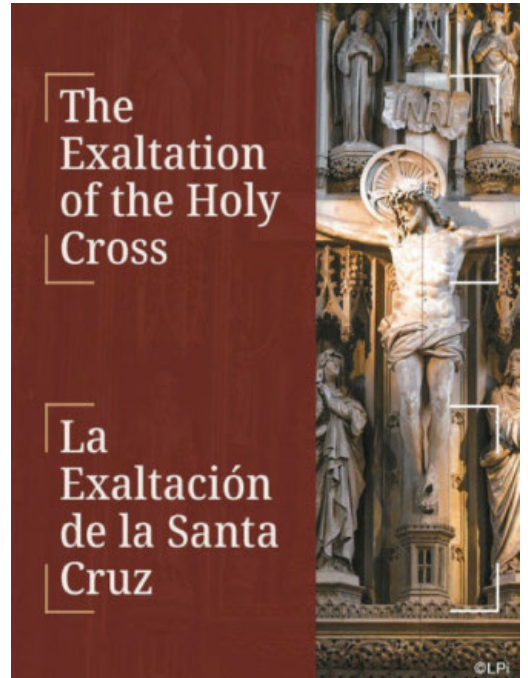

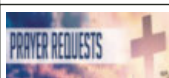

Dear Sisters & Brothers in Christ,

Last Sunday at the Canonization Mass for St. Carlo Acutis and St. Pier Giorgio Frassati, Pope Leo XIV said, “Just as no one is born a champion, no one is born a saint. It is daily training in love.” How fitting as we begin our third letter on training to be a saint. Last time, I shared some practices as we wake up to start off with a habit of discipline and prayer. This time, I want to offer some suggestions for the other end of our day: bedtime.

First, as we wind down for bed, we must be careful of our posture as we go to prayer. Don’t pray in a comfy chair or your bed. I say several things regularly, but one of my favorites is: “Horizontal prayer always ends in sleep” mostly because it has happened to me too many times in the past. Choose a place, maybe beside your bed, possibly on your knees by your bed, or some other suitable place.

In the morning, we offer our day to God; the tradition of the Church is in the evening, we offer thanks to God. Now, there are many prayers of thanksgiving we could pray. I want to recommend a prayer method I believe I may have shared in the past as a suggestion. I am offering two versions of the Examen Prayer, originally crafted by St. Ignatius of Loyola. The Examen Prayer is sort of like a short form of an examination of conscience with extra steps.



Model One:

- A. **Thanksgiving**— Place yourself in God’s presence. Give thanks for God’s great love for you. (Give thanks!)
- B. **Intention**— Pray for the grace to understand how God is acting in your life. (Ask for help!)
- C. **Examination**— Review your day — recall specific moments and your feelings at the time. (Reflect!)
- D. **Contrition**— Reflect on what you did, said, or thought in those instances. Were you drawing closer to God, or further away? (Say Sorry!)
- E. **Hope/Resolution**— Look toward tomorrow — think of how you might collaborate more effectively with God’s plan. Be specific and conclude with the “Our Father.” (Decide!)

OR

Model Two:

- A. **Gratitude**—Begin by placing yourself in the presence of God and thanking Him for the blessings of the day. Be specific.
- B. **Request for Light**—Ask the Holy Spirit to allow you to see yourself as God sees you.
- C. **Actions & Attitudes**—Evaluate your actions & attitudes considering how God would view them.
- D. **Chart Your Course**—If you have found peace in your actions and attitudes, commit to staying the course. If you find that you have failed, commit to doing something differently tomorrow.
- E. **Energy/Enthusiasm**—Ask for God’s grace to follow through joyfully on your plan, and for the gift of encouragement as you continue your earthly journey.

Grow Strong in Your Faith

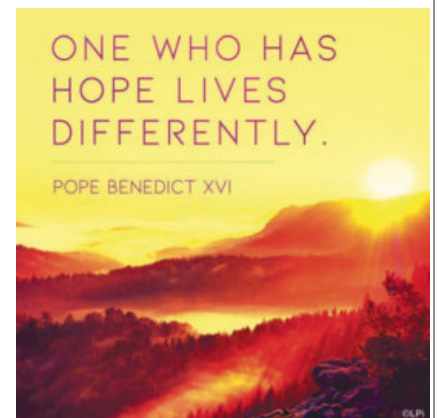

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Two weeks ago I gave a little intro to my discussion on hope. I mentioned some goals I have for the end of this series. The first step for reaching our goals is to grow in hope ourselves. If we want to help others, we must first have hope ourselves. Jesus once told us that we must remove the stick from our eye before removing it from others. Perhaps you need to remove a stick or perhaps you need to add something to your life. I'm going to give an example from my life where I had to grow in hope.

Think of a line where one side is hope and the other is despair. Think for a moment about where you end up on the line. You're probably not going to go entirely in one direction or another. Likely, there have been points in your life when you were closer to one direction than the other. I'd say that I'm probably leaning pretty far toward hope right now, but there's still more I can work on in that area. For the most part, I will believe that God's plan is perfect. But there are times I can't help wondering. Of course, wondering is perfectly natural. The problems occur when I try to take things into my own hands. I remember a time when I was kneeling in Adoration talking to God about something very important to me at that moment (I have almost no clue what it was now). I was having a bit of an argument with Him. I came up with excuse after excuse, but after but. (Just ask my family and friends, I'm well known for needing the last word.) As I tried to obtain the answer I wanted, I remembered one of the most important kinds of prayer, those in which we simply listen. I closed my eyes, took a deep breath, and repeated the words at the end of the Divine Mercy Chaplet, "Jesus, I trust in you." I ended that prayer with a smile and complete trust in God's plan. And then, I listened. I guess it worked because I honestly don't remember what I was praying about. In our hopes for Heaven, we must learn to resign our will and replace it with God's.

This is just one example of how I was trying to take things into my own hands. I've done it so many times before. I've thought a lot about my need for more hope in my life since this jubilee year began. In fact, I asked our priest here to give a talk on hope and trust in our youth group last year. Unfortunately though, I missed it. However, I have read some things and heard some talks on it since then. Hope is a really interesting virtue. The more life you live and the more problems you face, the more your hope will be put to the test. When we come out of these trials triumphant, our hope will be stronger. If we come out of these trials with despair in our heart, hope is not lost. Through prayer and trust in God's plan, we can regain hope. I'm sure there are some of you who know the great joy you can experience when you push despair out of your heart and replace it with hope. Think of the satisfaction you get when you finally yank a big weed out of your garden that you've been wrestling with for several minutes. This joy will be even greater! You will have ripped a weed out of the garden within your soul. And now, you can replace it with the beautiful flower of hope.



There are many things to help us plant that flower within our soul. First, pray. It probably won't happen instantly. You must continue praying. God and the saints will gladly help you gain or regain hope. This is like preparing the garden for the new flower. You are tilling the soil and making it ready. Maybe you need a little help in planting the flower. It is very beneficial to talk with family, friends, or your priest when you're going through something. Stories of the saints can also help us. I'm going to talk about one of those saints in my next bulletin article. Lastly, plant that seed of hope. With the help of the heavenly gardener, you will watch it grow! I hope you have a blessed and hopeful week!
