My Dear Brothers and Sisters,



LIFELINES: The "Choice" is Ours at the Ballot Box (cont'd): Cardinal Egan and the Catholic bishops of New York released a statement (Our Cherished Right, Our Solemn Duty) urging voters to make pro-life issues their first priority when voting. They say the destruction of 60 million children and the injury of countless millions of women eclipses any other political issue. The bishops warn against voting solely out of party loyalty or self interest and say voters should be guided by the pro-life teachings of the Catholic Church. "The inalienable right to life of every innocent human person outweighs other concerns where Catholics may use prudential judgment, such as how best to meet the needs of the poor or to increase access to health care for all," they add. "The right to life is the right through which all others flow," they wrote. "To the extent candidates reject this fundamental right by supporting an objective evil, such as legal abortion, euthanasia or embryonic stem cell research, Catholics should consider them less acceptable for public office." Today, in America 3,500 innocent babies lose their lives each day and in the words of Pope John Paul II "the blood of the victims cry to God for justice." 

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Even in our often secularized culture, many lament the rise of a digital "dystopia" where words are wielded with abandon and human dignity is a drive-by casualty. This presidential election year whose entr'acte coincides with the Iowa caucuses and extends through November intensifies the stakes and the passions that can poison the well of civic friendship and mutual respect for our neighbors, regardless of their religious, political, or other affiliations.

As Catholic Christians and persons of good will, we recognize how easily we, too, can be drawn into the contentious climate and fall short of basic charity in our attitudes and our speech. St. Peter cautions the early Christian community: "Rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, insincerity, envy, and all slander" (1 Peter 2:1). And St. Paul likewise counsels: "Therefore, putting away falsehood, speak the truth, each one to his neighbor, for we are members one of another" (Ephesians 4:25).

With a desire to lift up society in accord with our "better angels," the Diocese of Des Moines is collaborating with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops by participating in a campaign that transcends partisan sentiment: "Civilize It: Dignity beyond the Debate 2020." The hope is to encourage greater **civility**, **compassion**, and **clarity** in dialogue and engagement that will deepen our appreciation for varied voices, grounded in the belief that each of us by nature is inclined toward the true, the good, and the beautiful. None of us has a monopoly on the truth, but all have been leavened with "seeds of the truth" that we cultivate by forming personal conscience and through communal conversation so we can bear fruit in civic friendship and achievement of the common good.

Our "Civilize It" campaign is not an exhaustive, time-consuming parish program; it is more about cultivating the "how" and the dispositions of dialogue that will free us to discern and affirm the "what" of ordered goods that reflect our priorities and decisions as a political society. This year-long effort begins in earnest the weekend of February 1-2, 2020, and concludes after the U.S. general election on Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, I sincerely hope you will join me in promoting this initiative and most importantly I pray that we might meet our neighbor with civility, compassion, and clarity during this election season.

## Civil Dialogue: A response to Jesus' call to love our neighbor

Jesus uses the parable of the Good Samaritan to answer a question that is both searing and simple: "Who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10: 29). Our familiarity with this parable makes it easy for us now to identify as "neighbor" those on the margins of our society such as those experiencing homelessness or poverty. But how often do we see our neighbor in the person who disagrees with us?

As Catholics, our strong tradition of social teaching compels us to be actively engaged in the building up of our communities. This is achieved by being involved in the political process—and yet today, many shy away from such involvement because our national and local conversations are filled with vitriol and harsh language, often directed at people themselves. When personal attacks replace honest debate, no one wins. This kind of attack, no matter the reason, only serves to further divide our communities.

What is needed is good, honest, civil dialogue. This means that we must treat everyone as worthy of being at the table, worthy of our respect, and worthy of being heard. In short, it means treating everyone as our neighbor.

We undermine our commitment to human life and dignity when we fail to see the dignity of those who have a different viewpoint. We must detach from the bitterness that surrounds us and seek a better path. A commitment to civil dialogue

can help us make real and authentic human connections, which breaks down the barriers that divide us.

Engaging in civil dialogue can help our faith communities create a new space to model love for our neighbors and respect for the dignity of all.

Tips for Engaging in Civil Dialogue:

- Listen first and seek to understand the whole picture.
- 2. Ask questions for clarification.
- 3. Use 'I' statements; pay attention to body language.
- Listen to what feelings are present and pay attention to how you respond.
- Summarize what you've heard and ask for feedback.



Civil dialogue can best be defined as the ability to enter meaningful conversation with people whose viewpoints may be different from our own, who have a different background or experiences, or who come to a different conclusion about the best way to promote the common good. We enter into civil dialogue because we want to build a community that is rooted in understanding one another. God's love for each person requires us to remember that someone who disagrees with us is still a beloved child of



God who deserves our love, respect, and care.

An important ingredient to civil dialogue is commitment to the truth. While respecting the dignity of all, we acknowledge that not all viewpoints are equally valid. We have the responsibility to speak truth with love. In addition, all who exercise their freedom of speech have an obligation to ensure that they come to conclusions based on data from credible and reputable sources, and that care is taken to avoid seeking the truth selectively, that is, only when it is convenient to us.

Civil dialogue is different than remaining silent in the face of disagreement. Listening to opposing views is a part of seeking clarity and can be a creative process. In civil dialogue, all are invited to bring and share their values, beliefs, and questions. We seek first to understand how our views on a topic are different and why. We ask questions to be sure we understand one another. In thinking critically about how we arrived at our own view points and listening to the experiences of others, we can sometimes arrive at new understanding and even find common ground.

Pope Francis has remarked, "Dialogue allows people to know and understand one another's needs. Above all, it is a sign of great respect, because it puts the person into a stance of listening, and into a condition of being receptive to the speaker's best viewpoints. Secondly, dialogue is an expression of charity because, while not ignoring differences, it can help us investigate and share the common good. Moreover, dialogue invites us to place ourselves before the other, seeing him or her as a gift of God, and as someone who calls upon us and asks to be acknowledged."

Just like any authentic human connection, the process of dialogue is complicated, often uncomfortable, and requires vulnerability and trust. We must rely on our faith in Christ who taught us that everyone is truly our neighbor. Promoting civil discourse is one way we can put this teaching into action.

Interested in learning more about civil dialogue or about how your community can engage in civil dialogue more often? Join USCCB's *Civilize It* Campaign to help promote dignity beyond the debate. A version of this campaign was first implemented by the Archdiocese of Cincinnati and is a call for all people to civilize our conversations. Visit civilizeit.org for more information, to take the pledge, or plan an opportunity for civil dialogue in your community.

If you are part of a group looking to create an opportunity for civil dialogue in your community, it may be helpful to consider these questions:

- Is our intention to facilitate greater understanding, or merely win a debate?
- 2. Whose voices are we including? Whose are missing? Who else should be invited to the conversation?
- 3. How can we remember our shared human dignity and deescalate the situation when we feel ourselves become tense?
- 4. What guidelines could the group set together that will keep the conversation centered on dialogue instead of debate, and honor the dignity of all people present?
