

A MESSAGE FROM OUR DEACON

With Christmas being on a Saturday in December, we celebrated the Feast of the Holy Family the very next day and, this weekend, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of Our Lord-the earliest that either of these feasts can be observed. We also begin the Year 2022 with much anticipation and optimism for the gifts God will bestow on us in the coming months.

Psychologists say that the most uplifting and important word that anyone wants to hear is his or her own first name. There is something about a "name" that just feels special. That's why teachers work so hard to memorize first names of students in their classes, as pastors and deacons try their best to remember the names of parishioners. This month, the Church honors the Holy Name of Jesus. From the very beginning of the Gospel, Mary says to Elizabeth in the Magnificat, "Holy is His Name" (Luke 1:49). Later, Jesus will say, "Whatever you ask in my Name, I will do, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask anything in my Name, I will do it" (John 14:13-14). Clearly, there is something special about calling someone by name, particularly when praying in petition to God.

Saint Bernadine of Siena, who lived from 1380 to 1444 AD in Italy, is known for his devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. Perhaps you have seen the insignia "IHS" in Catholic churches, often inscribed in a crest above the doorway or on a baptismal font. This symbol, called a Christogram, is made up of the first letters of the Holy Name of Jesus using Greek letters and was devised by Saint Bernadine. In addition, it was the preaching of Saint Bernadine that resulted in the word "Jesus" being added to the Hail Mary. Early versions of the prayer included the phrase, "Blessed is the fruit of thy womb," but the prayer was later extended to say, "Blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus."

In his Letter to the Philippians, Saint Paul wrote, "At Jesus' name every knee must bend in the heavens, on the earth and under the earth, and every tongue proclaim to the glory of God the Father: Jesus Christ is Lord" (2:10-11). Additionally, Saint Paul stated, "Whatever you do, whether in speech or in action, do it in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Col 3:17). In this month of the Holy Name of Jesus, we remember that "Jesus" means "Yahweh saves" and how invoking the Name of Iesus can help us to come closer in our relationship to our God. As we begin a new year, let us take time to give thanks to God for our lives, our families, and all He has given us. At the same time, we should never be afraid to ask God for what we need, but be sure to pray these petitions in Holy Name of Jesus.



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IT'S A WONDERFUL LIFE

More than one in five U.S. undergraduates are raising young children. Feminists for Life has recommendations for colleges and universities to better serve pregnant women, expectant fathers, parents, and birthmothers attending colleges and universities. Some of these suggestions include the following:

Start with policies to create a supportive culture on campus. For example, ensure that all key departmental staff that counsels students are familiar with laws against pregnancy discrimination and in support of families in need of leave and prevention of domestic violence, sexual assault and harassment.

Professors and advisors should all know to accommodate pregnant women or parents who need to adjust their schedule or take time off for maternity leave or sick leave for parents and children.

All Athletic Department staff must know and adhere to NCAA policies that would redshirt a pregnant student, rather than rescind her scholarship.

If a woman receives a positive pregnancy test from the health center, give her information including policies, on-campus support, and off-campus resources including federally funded programs.

Pregnant women should be informed that they may stay in the dorms while pregnant.

THE POPE'S MONTHLY INTENTION

Let us pray for the catechists, summoned to announce the Word of God: may they be its witnesses, with courage and creativity and in the power of the Holy Spirit.

As a counselor, you would not believe how many times I hear about New Year's Resolutions. They are most frequently made about things like diet, exercise, and saving money, but the possibilities are endless. I find myself having very little faith in New Year's Resolutions alone to actually change anything in a person's life. While there are exceptions, I have found that most people start building up January 1st as a big transformative day months in advance, find the courage to stop or start their behavior resolution, and then inevitably slip up, crash and burn, and refrain from trying again until next year. Friends I have in the gym business say that January 1st is the biggest day of the year for new memberships, followed by a sharp decline in attendance throughout the rest of the month. My issue with these resolutions is that failure is very common and having this significant start date for a resolution just leads to increased self-loathing, disappointment, and despair. Who cares if you fail on January 7th? Now the new start date is January 7th- start again. You went 7 days without eating Oreos! Excellent! Now try for 10 days. One of the most important virtues is hope, and Christ wants us to remember this virtue when we fall. We need to always have hope for ourselves and continuously get up to try again when we fall. My other issue with these resolutions is that we should be setting these goals constantly throughout the year. January 1st and Lent aren't the only times we should be practicing sacrifice, generosity, and almsgiving. This week, consider praying about your goals for self-improvement and remember that the process is lifelong, not restricted to January 1st.
