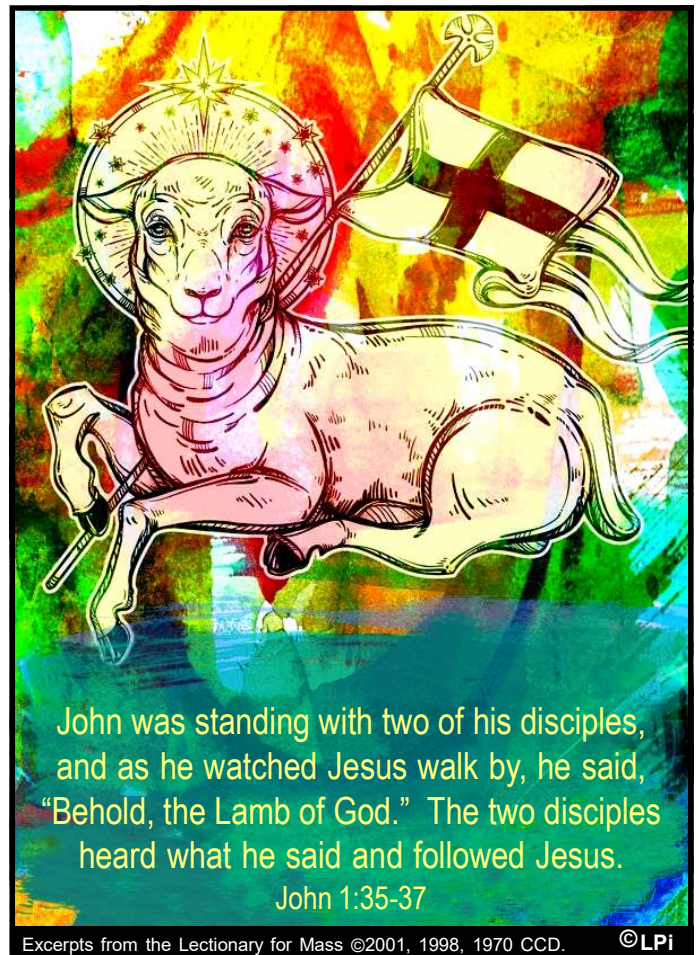

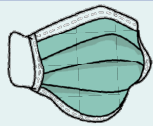



SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

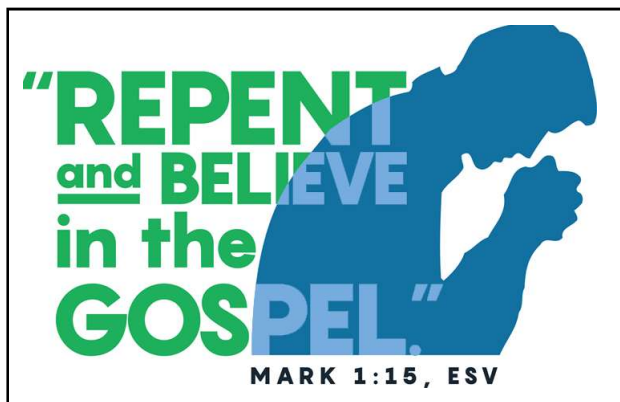
January 24, 2021

The Kingdom of God is at hand. In our fragile world it is sometimes difficult for us to believe that the Kingdom is at hand. As Christians, we are continually called to abandon our sinful ways and to follow Jesus. In order to prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us seek the Lord's mercy for our sins and the sins of all.

The focus of our readings is twofold: the call of the prophet/disciple and the message to be proclaimed – repent and believe.

Jonah is called and sent. Our passage picks up the story after the call and tells us that Jonah was sent to preach repentance to the people of Nineveh. The heart of the story is the faith response of the people of Nineveh: when they heard God's message they did in fact believe and change their lives.

In our passage from Mark, the first disciples are called while at their ordinary work. They change their lives immediately and follow Jesus. And as we will hear on a later Sunday this year, they too are eventually sent out to preach the message Jesus gives in the opening verses of this Gospel, "Change your lives and believe in the Good News."



Those who are called must first repent and believe.

Jonah 3:1-5, 10

The people of Nineveh repented from their evil ways.

What do I need to “repent of” that are my evil ways?

1 Corinthians 7:29-31

The world in its present form is passing away.

What are the things in my life which I cannot live without?

Mark 1:14-20

Come after me and I will make you fishers of men.

What is the Lord asking of me?

For two weeks in a row we have readings that seem very similar.

The Gospels are in fact notably similar. The first readings, each from different books in the Old Testament, are purposefully different, helping us to grasp the difference in focus of each of the Gospels. This can help us to have a more complete understanding of ways that God calls us in our daily lives.

This week, for the 2nd Sunday of Ordinary Time, we hear about the call of Peter and other disciples of Jesus from the Gospel of John and about the call of Samuel in the first reading. We read about the very personal and transforming aspects of God's call. Next week, for the 3rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, we again have readings that describe people being called by the Lord. Next week's readings emphasize a different aspect of God's call in our lives.

Another aspect of the call God gives us often includes a dimension of trusting God's plan, especially when it includes an initial surrendering of what is familiar and what gives us a sense of security in our lives. Next

week's readings emphasize the cost of responding to God's call.

The sequence involved in these two weeks seems to be significant. To help us respond to the costly dimension of God's call to us, we often need to have already encountered God's very personal care for us.

For next week's first reading from the prophet Jonah, reading that whole book of the Bible can help us to appreciate the interior dynamics happening in Jonah. He was asked by God to preach conversion and repentance to the people of Nineveh. The Ninevites had been brutally cruel enemies of the Hebrew people. Jonah both could have been deeply fearful of going to Nineveh because of their cruelty and, therefore, because of how dangerous it would have been for Jonah to go there. He would have strongly wanted Nineveh to be destroyed rather than to be shown mercy by God. We see this swaying his initial decision to get on a ship bound for the extreme opposite direction of Nineveh! Then, with the help of “the big fish,”

Jonah eventually did what God had asked of him – with the result being God’s abundant mercy poured upon the Ninevites.

In the Gospel, Simon Peter, Andrew, James and John all responded in the opposite manner of Jonah. They all responded by surrendering their fishing enterprises to become fishers of men, something as equally fear-bringing as Jonah’s being called to go to Nineveh.

May the Lord help us to have deeply personal encounters with Him to prompt us to respond in generosity to His call as did the four apostles highlighted in next week’s Gospel. It is OK for us to have a Jonah-esque initial resistance. We ask the Lord to help us to be as courageous as Jonah, Simon Peter, Andrew, James and John in responding to that invitation of having both a close personal relationship with God and an ever-more generous living out of that relationship for and with others.

Pastor’s Letter

Since mid-March of 2020, I have been learning more and more (little by little!) about ways of connecting our parish’s information with the world of the internet. One of the key resources I am learning about is our Facebook page. I have learned things that range from funny to eye-raising.

For example, as an administrator of that account, I have access to statistics and information that is provided about people who visit our Facebook page. I can see that many people when they view our parish Masses at the Facebook page will watch some of the initial content, scroll forward to the homily and then scroll forward to the end of the Mass! I can also see who leaves comments, who rates a video with a thumbs up or thumbs down, and who adds an “emoji” to rate the video!

At the same time, I realize from my own attempts to view other Facebook pages or other social media sites that sometimes you can press something on the screen of your “smart”-phone intending one thing and inadvertently sending one of those responses.

I have also learned that the Facebook system has capability to censor some of our content. For example, with our purchase of the hymnals and missalettes that we use we pay for license agreements allowing us to use those hymns repeatedly throughout the year and even make some photocopies of lyrics, etc., not for sale or making a profit from that but for facilitating using the hymns in our liturgies. Evidently, however, we don’t necessarily have rights to play some hymns when we “live-stream” those liturgies. You might notice that sometimes the audio goes silent when we have hymns like “On Eagle’s Wings” in funerals. That has happened even when we simply had a CD playing instrumental background music for the sake of the pre-funeral ambience.

I appreciate, of course, the rights of the artists to compensation for their work. I am just a bit amazed that the social media platform can detect and censor the notes of background music! And, most of us are probably well aware that many of these social media companies benefit from selling personal data they gather from their users.

So, I am exploring other outlets/platforms for our parish content that are still easy to use – as Facebook is – but are a bit less intrusive and that don’t “monetize” our data.

On a very different topic, please note that a little caravan of parishioners is developing to participate in a March for Life event on Saturday, January 23rd, at Noon in Geneva, Ohio, which is on the northeast side of Cleveland, about 2 ½ hours from Cambridge. See the notice about this below.

May the Lord continue to bless us with joy and peace as disciples of Jesus and to help us to be always ready for the gift of eternal life in Heaven!
