
RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: Parish School of Religion (PSR) classes for children in grades K through 8 are held Sunday mornings from September to May.



READINGS FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT March 22, 2020

The scripture readings challenge us to confront our own blindness, our own failure to acknowledge Christ as the light of our world. As we prepare our hearts to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us ask the Lord for mercy for the times we have been blinded by self-ambition and greed.

The readings focus on conversion from darkness to light. The New Testament reading focuses more directly to the gospel theme. In the reading from **Ephesians**, Paul reminds his community that before they knew Christ, they lived in the darkness of sin. But now that they are baptized, they must live as Children of the light, doing what is good and right and honest. Paul believes baptism should make a radical difference in our lives.

The gospel story begins with the healing of a blind man. But the dialogue which follows leads us to focus on spiritual sight. The blind man accepts the free gift of Jesus and receives both physical and spiritual sight. Those who reject the power of Jesus remain spiritually blind. In their blindness, they refuse to "see" who Jesus is ("We know he is not a man of God.")



In contrast, the blind man, now healed by Jesus, insists simply, "I do know one thing; I was blind and now I can see." The story's climax comes with the statement of faith, "Yes, Lord, I do believe."

1 Samuel 16:1, 6-7, 10-13

From that day on, the Spirit of the Lord rushed upon David. Remember a time when you experienced the Holy Spirit directing you.

Ephesians 5:8-14

You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. What "darkness" do you need to be freed from?

John 9:1-41

One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see.
Who in your experience has helped you break out of the "blindness" of sin?

In her autobiography, The Story of My Life

(published as a series in the 1902 Ladies' Home Journal), Helen Keller described her own experience of being set free from interior darkness. A childhood illness left her deaf and blind at 19 months, and her next few years were filled with angry outbursts and frustrated fits of violence against those who were at a loss as to how they could best help her. Said Keller, "I got used to the silence and the darkness that surrounded me and forgot that it had ever been different until she came – my teacher – who was to set my spirit free. Thus, I came up out of Egypt and stood before Sinai and a power divine touched my spirit and gave it life. From that sacred moment, I heard a voice which said, 'Knowledge is love and light and vision!" Although Keller never regained her sight or her hearing, she went on to experience the beauties and mysteries of life with such clarity that she was able to share what she called her "soul's sudden awakening"

with others. In her blindness, she has helped many to see; in her deafness, she has enabled many to hear.

Like the man born blind featured in today's Gospel, Keller's life experience continues to witness to the One by whose words and works every darkness can be illumined. The blind man, too, came out of "Egypt" or out from the exile in which his blindness had relegated him. At Jesus' word, he began to know a dignity and a freedom that had previously eluded him. He saw, he believed and he emerged from his physical blindness as well as from his spiritual darkness. His experience, as well as that of Helen Keller, invites us to turn with renewed trust to the One whose life, whose dying and whose rising can illumine our darknesses.

Jesus' healing of the blind man in the Gospel brought light and renewed hope into the man's darkened life. Drawn

out from his blindness, the man began to see and to believe in Jesus. His sight and his faith challenge us to leave behind our personal darkness and to live in the light of Christ. Such a decision is not without risk. When the man was blind, he was pitied and <u>ignored</u> by others; in his

"helplessness," he posed no threat. But the gift of sight and his willingness to use it made him both a target and a threat in the eyes of those who refused to see and believe in Jesus.

Are we willing to follow Jesus into the light?
