

READINGS FOR THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST Sunday, June 14, 2020

Our sharing in the bread of life and the cup of salvation draws us into communion with Jesus and one another. United as one family in Christ, we turn to the Lord with grateful and loving hearts.

The readings focus on the presence of Christ in the Eucharist. In the reading from **1st Corinthians**, St. Paul presents what he was taught concerning the actions and words of Jesus at the Last Supper. While the words may vary in the four accounts (Matthew, Mark, Luke and 1 Corinthians), what remains consistent is the belief that in the sharing of bread and wine Christ is truly present (the real presence).

The gospel proclaims that Christ himself is our life. It is he who satisfies our hunger and thirst. He chose to make this concept a reality in bread and wine. Jesus invites us to share his body and blood, which in Hebrew are symbols of person and life. In these symbols we encounter the living Lord, ever present to us. To share in his life, to be one with him, is to live forever.



Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14-16

Not by bread alone do we live, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

How well do I "listen" to the word of God as it is proclaimed and preached at Mass? What might I do to better "hear" the word that comes from the mouth of the Lord?

<u>1 Corinthians 10:16-17</u>

Though many, we are one body. Do I involve myself in the community of the Church?

<u>John 6:51-58</u>

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.

What is my disposition when I receive communion? What does it mean when I approach and receive the "real presence" of the Lord in Eucharist? How have I been changed?

We read about three progressively more

profound levels at which God feeds us in next week's Sunday Mass readings for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi.

In Sunday's First Reading, from Deuteronomy, chapter 8, Moses reviews with the Hebrew people what God had done for them throughout the 40 years they had been journeying through and living in the wilderness between Egypt and the Promised Land of Israel. The setting for the book of Deuteronomy, the fifth book of the Bible, is the Hebrew people encamped at the edge of the Promised Land, getting ready to go into that land and to re-inhabit it 470 years after Jacob and his twelve sons had moved to Egypt due to a famine (Exodus 12:40). By the time God set them free to leave Egypt, they had become a nation from there of "about 600,000 men...not counting the children" (Exodus 12:37).

In next Sunday's First Reading, we hear Moses remind them that God had nourished them with manna throughout their journey in that barren land, where it seemed impossible to find enough food for sustaining them physically. God provided them with day-to-day *physical* nourishment during that extended time of instability and transition.

In next Sunday's Responsorial Psalm we hear King David sing about another level at which God feeds us. God also provides steadfast nourishment during times of stability and peace. Psalm 147 celebrates this. God's providence in that way is not only with enough food to feed a growing population during times of peace but also with the *peaceful and secure borders* that enable that peace to be experienced in the first place.

In both of these Old Testament passages we are taught that God's way of nourishing us physically draws us into the way God feeds our <u>souls.</u> "Swiftly runs God's word," we sing in Psalm 147. And, God's providence of manna was "in order to show you that not by bread alone does one live, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of the LORD" (Deuteronomy 8:3).

Both the Second Reading and Gospel for next Sunday

teach us more about that third and ultimate level, the level of our souls, on which God feeds us.

Amazingly and wonderfully, God feeds our souls with his very body and blood, we read in next Sunday's Second Reading from 1 Corinthians 10:16. This echoes what Jesus teaches in the Gospel where he says, "the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." Among the effects on our soul is that it gives us a new kind of unity with each other: "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body" (1 Cor. 10:17).

May the Lord help us to be nourished at the level that we most need, both individually and as a community.

Pastor's Letter

What did we learn from last weekend's first public *Sunday* Masses?

To me it was interesting to see that we had basically the same number of people at all 4 of our weekend Masses: 60 at the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, 70 at the 8:00 a.m. Mass at St. Benedict, 58 at the 10:30 a.m. Mass at St. Benedict and 50 at our 12:15 p.m. Mass at Sts. Peter & Paul. These numbers mean we had about 25% of capacity in attendance; we are allowed up to 50%.

Many people contacted me to say that they were at least waiting to see how many attended and how full the churches were for the weekend Masses. Probably 95% of those who attended brought and wore their own masks or bandanas (we have masks available – thanks to several parishioners – in case anyone needed one).

Two suggestions have emerged both from our own parishioners and from folks in the Diocese of Columbus: if anyone is concerned about us getting closer to our allowed capacity, please note that our daily Masses have been averaging now ~20 people, with plenty of space to spread out. You might consider attending a daily Mass during the week, such as our 8:30 a.m. Mass on <u>Saturday</u> if you would like to attend a Mass over the weekend. In the Diocese of Columbus, some parishes have designated a specific Mass during the week as especially for older parishioners, something for us to consider, too. I'm posting this letter earlier this weekend (I apologize for the *late* email of last weekend's bulletin, sent on Thursday of *this* week!) so that perhaps some of you can see *Deacon* Jeremiah's ordination on Friday evening, June 5th, at 5:00 p.m. They are hoping to live-stream the ordination at the Diocese of Steubenville <u>Vocations</u> Office's *Facebook* page. If you have access to Facebook, try searching for "DSvocations" to find their page. If you cannot watch the ordination live, they hope to maintain that video there for a while.

Father Nicholas Ward's priesthood ordination was very beautiful and very prayerful. His first assignment is at the parishes in Wintersville. We will announce his Mass of Thanksgiving here as soon as that information is available.

Thank you for the Ordination Anniversary card shower! I received a number of very creative cards with meaningful messages. I truly have been blessed with an exceptional experience of priesthood over these past 20 years. I never even imagined so many of the almost daily signs of the Lord's activity that I have experienced. My experience has been that priestly ministry is one of those best-kept secrets – not always simple but certainly filled with experiences of the graces and presence of God. Thank you, again for your prayers and support.

May the Lord keep us protected and healthy and, as always, well prepared for the gift of eternal life!
