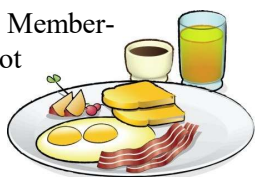

ABORTION

2270 Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. From the first moment of his existence, a human being must be recognized as having the rights of a person – among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life.

Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you. (*Jer* 1:5; cf. *Job* 10:8-12; *Ps* 22:10-11)

My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret, intricately wrought in the depths of the earth. (*Ps* 139:15)

2271 Since the first century the Church has affirmed the moral evil of every procured abortion. This teaching has not changed and remains unchangeable.

You shall not kill the embryo by abortion and shall not cause the newborn to perish. (*Didache* 2,2: Sch 248, 148 cf. *Ep. Barnabae* 19, 5: PG 2, 777; Ad Diognetum 5, 6: PG 2, 1173; Tertullian, *Apol.* 9: PL 1, 319-320)

God, the Lord of life, has entrusted to men the noble mission of safeguarding life, and men must carry it out in a manner worthy of themselves. Life must be protected with the utmost care from the moment of conception: abortion and infanticide are abominable crimes. (GS 51 § 3)

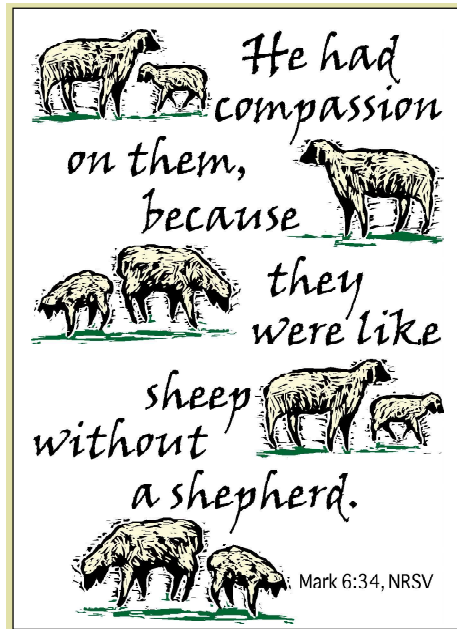


SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR THE 15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

July 11, 2021

The Gospel calls us to be people of prayer. Like the disciples, we, too, are invited by Jesus to find a place of rest, a place of quiet prayer where we can be renewed in body, mind and spirit. As we gather to celebrate the Eucharist, let us place ourselves in the presence of God.

The focus of the readings is God's loving care for everyone, expressed in the image of a shepherd. In Israel, the concepts of king and shepherd were often related. As the shepherd bore the responsibility or the needs of the flock, so the king was responsible for the needs of the people. Jeremiah expresses anger that the recent kings of Israel have not fulfilled this responsibility well. In this particular passage he denounces them for turning the people away and scattering them. The emphasis seems to be on the failure of the king to hold them together as a people united to their God. They had become like sheep without a shepherd. God promises a future king/shepherd who will do what is right.



The Gospel passage picks up this theme very subtly. Jesus, though tired and in need of rest, stays with the hungry crowd and teaches them because “they are like sheep without a shepherd.” This passage leads to the famous “Feeding of the 5,000,” and so Mark has presented Jesus as the shepherd who feeds by teaching and with bread.

Jeremiah 23:1-6

Behold the days are coming when I will raise up a righteous shoot to David.

How faithful have you been to the witness of your faith to those entrusted to you (children, spouse, etc.)?

Ephesians 2:13-18

Through him we have access in one Spirit to the Father.

How have I been made a “new person” in Jesus Christ?

Mark 6:30-34

Come away by yourselves to a desert place and rest a while.

How faithful am I to prayer? How could I become more a person of prayer?

Jesus welcomes the Apostles back from their training mission during next week's Sunday Gospel. We can connect that with today's Gospel.

During today's Gospel (Sunday, July 15th), Jesus authorized the Apostles to go out and show, through signs and wonders like healing and deliverance, that the Kingdom of God was in their midst. As the prophet Amos emphasized in the First Reading today that he was not a “professional” prophet, the Apostles too probably had never imagined that they would be doing what they were sent out to do. The prophet Amos had worked as a shepherd and as a tree farmer. God inspired him to go and be a prophet. The Apostles had a range of personal backgrounds such as fishermen and tax collector. In Jesus' eyes that would help to get people's attention; that ordinary people were raised up to do prophetic and priestly ministries such as preaching repentance, driving out demons in Jesus' name and anointing people with oil and healing them would show something special about the Kingdom of God that Jesus

had been proclaiming. The Kingdom of God, experienced as the Church he was establishing, would have an expanded and fulfilled understanding of priestly and prophetic ministries.

Next week, they return from their mission and Jesus invites them to go away from the busier town of Capernaum across the lake to rest and reflect on what they had experienced.

Hopefully they had a peaceful and restful boat ride!

Once they arrived at the other side of the lake, their quiet break time quickly ended! People had watched them leave and hurried around the lake to meet them on the other side. The Sea of Galilee is about 30 miles in circumference, so imagine that they travelled about half that distance. Although Jesus did want the Twelve to have some rest, the witness of what it means to be a shepherd of the Church that Jesus was establishing was even more

essential. Jesus showed them what it means to be a good shepherd by his heart-felt response to the situation before them: “his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things” (Mark 6:34).

The First Reading and Responsorial Psalm for next week reflect this theme as well.

Note what Psalm 23 says about God, our Good Shepherd. The first half of that psalm talks about God in the third person, describing him as one who leads us to restful waters and verdant pastures. Then, as King David reflects upon God as our Good Shepherd in moments when we’re

immersed in death – walking through the dark valley – he begins to write in second person. He starts to talk to – indeed, pray to – God rather than simply talk about God.

In the First Reading, the prophet Jeremiah both warned about the danger of negligent shepherds and gave encouragement about how the Messiah would be a good shepherd. Through this, Jeremiah showed the two basic actions of a prophet: warning and encouraging. We give thanks to God that in Jesus we see both of these actions fulfilled. Jesus is the priest, prophet and king who fulfills these roles sacrificially and lovingly. May he draw us into the effects of his sacrificial love not only in the outside world around us but also within our own hearts and lives.

Pastor’s Letter

One of the blessings of being in the Diocese of Steubenville is our proximity to Franciscan University of Steubenville. The university is what drew our family to Ohio from Oklahoma back in 1984 as well. Over the years the university has grown to become a hub for many renewal movements within the Church.

One of the ways the university has extended their outreach to beyond college-aged students is through summer conferences. These have ranged from their high-energy high school youth conferences to an annual priests, deacons and seminarians retreat and conference. Additionally, they have hosted a “prayer group leaders” conference and one that has been at the heart of the Church’s apologetics renewal movement called Defending the Faith Conference. They have also developed a summer Biblical studies institute. This week they will be hosting their annual catechetical conference called the St. John Bosco Conference.

This year they are offering a free live-streamed event this Wednesday evening, July 14th, 6:45 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Here is a link for registering for this: steubenvilleconferences.com/events/sjb/.

And, to become familiar with their other remaining conferences, which will also have some live-streamed options as well as to see some of their very inspiring past conference presentations, here is a link to their summer conferences home page: steubenvilleconferences.com.

I’m already looking forward to promoting a conference for next year called the “Steubenville Encounter Conference” described as a “Steubenville youth conference for adults.”

This week on Wednesday, July 14th, we also are celebrating the feast of a Native American saint, St. Kateri Tekakwitha. The Knights of Columbus have a website that presents many ways that the inspiring faith of Catholics of Native American heritage are benefiting all of us throughout the whole Church: www.kofc.org/en/news-room/enduring-faith/index.html.

As in years past, we are progressing through this year’s Diocesan/Parish Share Campaign, the DPSC. I plan to return the brochures and envelopes to the pews in the next week or so and have another pulpit appeal. Among the ways other parishes have been able to meet their goals is that a number of parishioners might give their parish support offerings through the DPSC. We have an annual parish goal and once that goal is reached, the extra returns to the parish, assessment-free. When we don’t reach our goal during the campaign time, we add that remaining amount to our regular, monthly assessment. Thank you to all who have already participated in this year’s campaign.

May the Lord help us to experience the transforming power of God’s mercy! May Our Lord help us to be always ready for the gift of eternal life in Heaven!
