



CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH (Second Edition)


ABORTION and HUMAN LIFE

2272 Formal cooperation in an abortion constitutes a grave offense. The Church attaches the canonical penalty of excommunication to this crime against human life. "A person who procures completed abortion incurs excommunication *latae sententiae* (CIC, can. 1398) by the very commision of the offense (CIC, can 1314) and subject to the conditions provided by Canon Law. (Cf. CIC, cann. 1323-1324) The Church does not thereby intend to restrict the scope of mercy. Rather, she makes clear the gravity of the crime committed, the irreparable harm done to the innocent who is put to death, as well as to the parents and the whole of society.

2273 The inalienable right to life of every innocent human individual is a consitutive element of a civil society and its legislation:

"The inalienable rights of the person must be recognized and respected by civil society and the political authority. These human rights depend neither on single individuals nor on parents; nor do they represent a concession made by society and the state; they belong to human nature and are inherent in the person by virtue of the creative act from which the person took his origin. Among such fundamental rights one should mention in this regard every human being's right to life and physical integrity from the moment of conception until death." (CDF, Donum vitae III)

"The moment a positive law deprives a category of human beings of the protection which civil legislation ought to accord them, the state is denying the equality of all before the law. When the state does not place its power at the service of the rights of each citizen, and in particular of the more vulnerable, the very foundations of a stated based on law are undermined.... As a consequence of the respect and protection which must be ensured for the unborn child from the moment of conception, the law must provide appropriate penal sanctions for every deliberate violation of the child's rights." (CCDF, *Donum vitae* III)



Society of St. Vincent de Paul Christ Our Light Conference April 17, 2021 Brief Meeting / Spiritual Formation

President Peggy Adams welcomed members at 1:00 p.m. and offered a spiritual lesson from SVdP's Deacon's Desk based on the "Road to Emmaus". We are called to discover Jesus in each individual we meet. Those in attendance included Susan Berilla, Patricia and Pat Grubbs, Lornah Hannahs, Jeff Jeney, Barb Mingione, Veronica Norman, Teri Poulos, Ron Sebek, Gail Shank, Fr. Paul Hrezo and Stevie Fairchild. Jeff provided a handout summarizing SVdP Mideast Region News.

The purpose of this meeting was for members to consider a proposal by Peggy and Stevie regarding a possible partnership between this SVdP conference and Samaritan Center (SC), a local faith-based agency offering transitional housing to local homeless families and individuals. Stevie explained her involvement with SC which grew from her past work as the local liaison for homeless children in the County School District.

Stevie provided a detailed history of SC along with its funding sources which includes several grants. She emphasized the role of Christ Our Light Parish in supporting this nonprofit community service. SC is also partnered with the local United Way, First Presbyterian Church and Habitat for Humanity.

The SC volunteer board is aging and becoming fewer in number. Their government grants have limits and may not be used for salaries or to hire a home manager. Currently SC is operating two transitional homes on Chestnut Street and N. 8th Street. Stevie provided a handout with an explanation of client eligibility requirements and expectations. Currently SC is in dire need of volunteer assistance in order to complete their mission of transitioning homeless clients to a more stable, independent living arrangement.

SC and its mission need help in 3 main areas; with client intake, weekly client monitoring and encouragement, and follow-up for clients once they leave an SC home. Peggy asked members to consider these tasks as compatible with our current service to the poor of our community. Stevie will address the SC board the following week to see if the SC board is open to such an arrangement.

The meeting was followed by a presentation of the film "The Nativity Story" with emphasis on the role of St. Joseph in our daily lives. We thank Pat and Patricia Grubbs for sharing their copy of this film.




SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR THE 17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME July 25, 2021

God's abundant love for us is manifested in the miraculous story of the multiplication of the fish and loaves. As we prepare our hearts to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us give thanks and praise to the Lord who cares for us and answers all our needs.

The focus of the readings is God's loving care for us. God is able (and wants) to supply all that we need, and more.

The reading from the second book of Kings and the Gospel passage are stories about miraculous feedings which are alike in many ways. The outline of each includes a special person (Elisha/Jesus,) a large crowd (100/5,000), and insufficient



bread (20 loaves/5 loaves). In both, the number of people and the number of loaves is relatively unimportant. What is important is the action of God. The point is that God did, and does, provide. Both Jewish and Christian believers have consistently related this truth through stories in which God supplies food, the basic need of human life.

2 Kings 4:42-44

When they had eaten, there was some left over, as the Lord had said. Take some time to reflect on all the good things God has given to us. How do you give blessing to the Lord for all He has given us?

Ephesians 4:1-6

I, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received.

How do others come to know that you have received a "call" from the Lord?

John 6:1-15

Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining.

How do I approach the Eucharist? Do I have a sense of awe and reverence for all the Lord has given me?

Beginning next week for five weeks our

Sunday Mass Gospel Readings will be from John, Chapter 6. We will take a break from this year's focus on the Gospel of Mark. One of the reasons for this is because the Gospel of Mark is notably shorter than Gospels of Matthew and Luke. This gives us some "extra" Sundays for readings from the Gospel of John. We usually read from the Gospel of John during Lent and Easter, but not all of that Gospel. So, "Year B", with its focus on the Gospel of Mark, gives us this opportunity to include these next five weeks focused on this important chapter in the Gospel of John.

We've read over these past few weeks about Jesus traveling back and forth across the Sea of Galilee. That helps to set the scene for us for these next few weeks and for Jesus' ministry and teaching in John, Chapter 6.

We start, next week, with Jesus away from his base of operations in Capernaum. He is across the Sea in an isolated place that nevertheless has a hillside where many people could gather to see Jesus and to seek to be healed by Him. St. John describes the scene with Jesus and his disciples resting on this hillside and seeing a vast crowd walking toward them. If we were to connect this with similar scenes in the Gospel of Mark, after Jesus and the Twelve had gotten in a boat in Capernaum to go to an outof-the-way place to rest a while, crowds of people began to hurry around the Sea (which is more like a big lake, 30 miles in circumference) to catch up with them where they were going.

St. John says that this surging crowd was following Jesus because they had seen the healings Jesus had done as signs. They saw that there was something very hopeful about what Jesus was doing, worth making a 15-mile journey on foot or on beast around the Sea.

Jesus then asks a question of the Twelve not so much about curing the people but more about feeding the people. This question seems to be as much about testing the Twelve as about having the physical means to feed the crowd.

Note especially that the time of year for this event and chapter was the feast of Passover. That means it was early spring and that it was the time for the annual remembrance of the Hebrew people being set free from slavery in Egypt, beginning their forty-year journey through the desert to the Promised Land. It was a time of remembrance about being nourished by God in the wilderness by the miraculous food called "manna."

Though the Twelve could not see the possibility of feeding so many people with the meager supplies they themselves had on hand, Jesus nevertheless saw this as an opportunity to perform another significant sign.

From seeing and hearing the crowd's reaction to this miraculous multiplication of loaves and fish, Jesus could

see quite clearly that most of the people were grasping the significance of the miracle. Surely Jesus is "the Prophet" and therefore the one who is about to reign in Israel, they say to one another. Jesus showed them that He could provide for them as God the Father had provided for them the manna in the wilderness or as Elisha had provided a multiplication of barley loaves, as we read in next week's First Reading.

Nevertheless, the people kept reducing the concept of Messiah to more of an earthly king. <u>They</u> wanted to make Him a king; <u>He</u> wanted to be their <u>eternal</u> Messiah.

May the Lord help us, in a special way over these next five weeks, to grow in appreciating how the nourishment Jesus gives us through the Eucharist is meant to draw us into the life of our <u>eternal</u> Messiah!

Let us plan another Sunday afternoon hike next week on July 25th, leaving from the Gomber Avenue parking lot at 2:30 p.m. or meeting at the parking lot at the beginning of the Primitive Camping parking lot along Parker Road at Salt Fork State Park at 3:00 p.m. There are several places where we can connect with portions of the Buckeye Trail and we can choose from that point, based on our group. Indeed, all are welcome for these hikes! Please feel free to recommend trails at other parks that you have enjoyed. Thanks!

As mentioned last week, we are progressing through this year's Diocesan/Parish Share Campaign, the DPSC. We have returned the brochures and envelopes to the pews for the next few weeks, with another pulpit appeal probably next week. Among the ways other parishes have been able to meet their goals is that a number of parishioners might give their parish support offerings through the DPSC. We have an annual parish goal and once that goal is reached, the extra returns to the parish, assessment-free. When we don't reach our goal during the campaign time, we add that remaining amount to our regular, monthly assessment. Thank you to all who have already participated in this year's campaign.

May the Lord help us to experience the transforming power of God's mercy! May Our Lord help us to be always ready for the gift of eternal life in Heaven!
