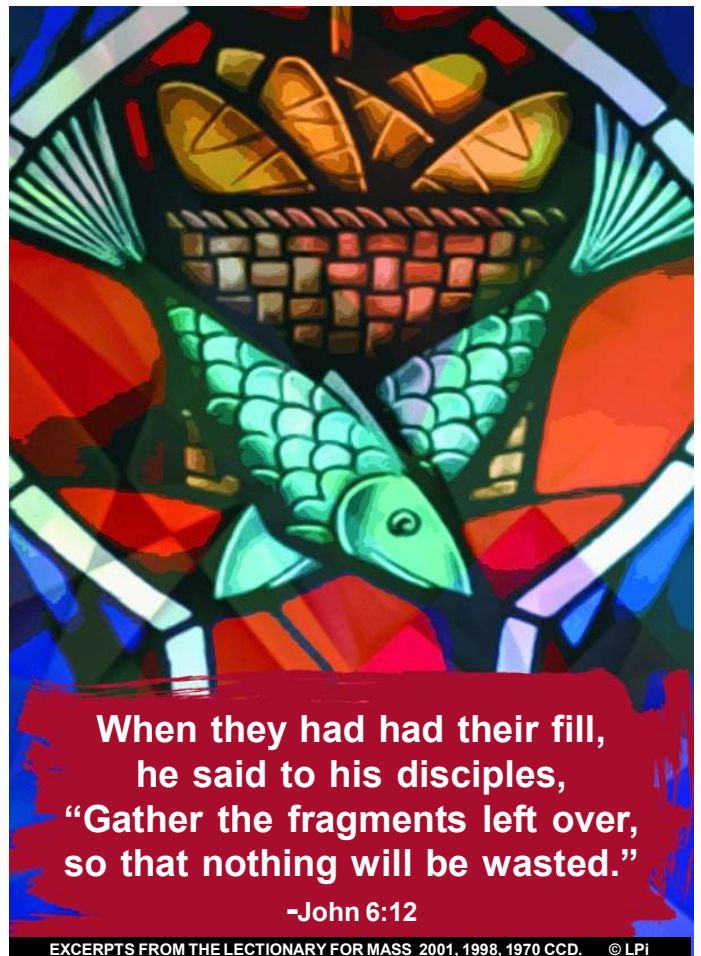

St. Vincent de Paul Society Christ Our Light Parish Conference

COVID 19 has affected our local conference. We have seen fewer requests for assistance most likely due to economic impact payments, COVID related FEMA funds, and moratoriums on evictions and utility shut offs. SVdP society volunteers have served the community by referring most calls to the government and agency offices offering assistance, while financially assisting those whose needs cannot be met by any other agency. We are currently only in the parish office on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday mornings from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

During the slowdown of requests, the SVdP Society has started a partnership with Samaritan Center, to assist with screenings and intakes for their transitional housing program for homeless individuals. We also offered to help with encouragement and monitoring of clients' needs and responsibilities.

We are resuming in-person visits outside the parish office and now have an outdoor area to meet with clients, which has a personalized picnic table made by Guernsey Industries..

Recently we were able to help a young man in his 30s who needed gasoline to get to his job in Zanesville. He had run out of money due to unexpected car repairs. We also referred him to the local food pantries where he now volunteers on a regular basis.

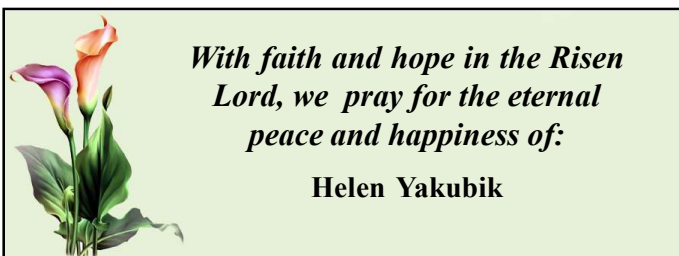
We also met a young woman in her twenties who needed a state ID card so she could continue to work off her public assistance. She openly told us how much better her life is off drugs and how determined she is to stay sober and live a good life.

Those of us who are able to volunteer are blessed so much by this wonderful ministry. Volunteers and financial help are always welcome.

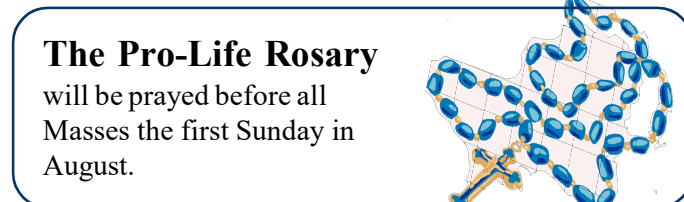

SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR THE 18TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

August 1, 2021

“Great meal,” we say, “good food” — as we push ourselves back from the table after a particularly satisfying meal. If this is the way it is with ordinary, human food, imagine what must be our reaction to the extraordinary, divine food that Jesus gives us: the bread that comes down from heaven, the bread of life.

The first reading and the Gospel tell us that God does not simply send food (manna/bread) but that God is truly and personally present in the event. It is not so much the bread we receive but believing in the one who gives bread. Bread sustains our lives for the moment. Believing in the one who gives the bread sustains our lives forever.

The people in the desert complained constantly about physical needs. And God answered their cries, but always with the underlying message, “believe, trust in me.”

Jesus tells the “miracle seeking” crowd not to work for the bread of the moment only, but for the bread of life. “This is the work God wants you to do: believe in the one sent by God,” (the Bread of Life).

Again we are called to see more than bread. We are called to see and believe in the One who gives us life.

Exodus 16:2-4, 12-15

“Our ancestors had manna to eat in the desert,” says the crowd in today’s Gospel. This passage from Exodus is the background story of God feeding the Israelites in the desert.

“This is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat.”

Ephesians 4:17, 20-24

In Christ, we have been taught a new way of life. Therefore, our old ways of thinking and acting are no longer sufficient.

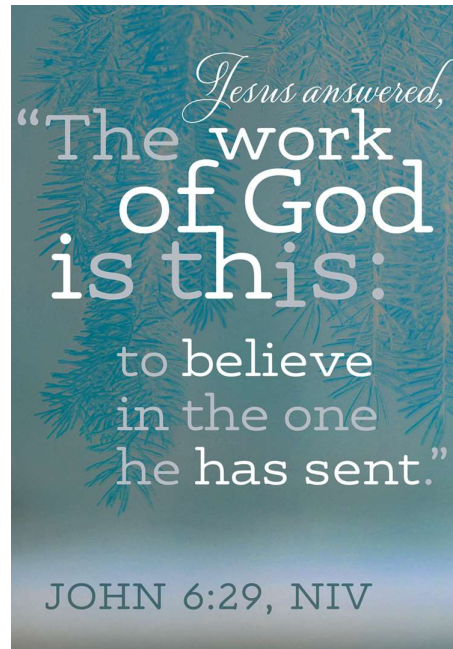
What have I done to broaden my understanding of what I, as a Christian, should be about?

John 6:24-35

Jesus reveals himself as “the bread of life.”

How do I approach the Eucharist? Do

I have a sense of awe and reverence for all the Lord has given me?



Between this Sunday’s Gospel (July 25th) and next Sunday’s Gospel, Jesus and the twelve Apostles travel again from one side of the Sea of Galilee to the other. Again, these next five Sunday Gospel passages are all from John 6. This Sunday’s Gospel finishes with verse 15 and next Sunday’s Gospel starts at verse 24. Between those verses is a passage where the Apostles precede Jesus in the boat and then, to their great surprise, Jesus catches up with them by walking on the water!

The Apostles weren’t the only ones who were surprised. The people, too, were baffled about how Jesus had crossed from the site where he had performed the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish (in today’s Gospel) to Capernaum on the other side of the Sea of Galilee.

As surprised as they were, Jesus points out to them their real motivation for wanting to know how Jesus traveled around so quickly. It was not that they had seen a sign. If

they had understood that Jesus could walk on water, they would understand who he is more clearly and believe in Him as eternal Messiah – as *God* walking around in their midst.

Recall the symbolism of water, especially when it’s stirred up, as it had been when the Apostles went ahead of Jesus (see John 6:18). Recall that when large bodies of water are stirred up, like rivers, seas and oceans, they symbolized chaos and evil for the Jewish people of Jesus’ time.

Recall at the very beginning of Genesis and the creation of the earth that God, in the Holy Spirit, hovered over the turbulent seas that covered the whole world. That Jesus could hover over the stirred-up Sea of Galilee was an indication that He has the same control over evil and chaos as God the Father and the Holy Spirit. Jesus is the eternal Messiah who can bring order and calm over evil in this world. He is God!

Instead of seeing this sign, the people were focused ultimately on their full stomachs. Jesus was inviting them to focus on the eternal plan God has for them in him.

Where is our focus?

Another dimension of the sign that Jesus wanted them to see is that he is the Bread of Life. The Hebrew people were sustained by the manna that God provided as they

journeyed for forty years across the desert. Jesus himself is the true Bread of Life that nourishes with both his words and with his very body and blood, as will be the focus in the weeks after next Sunday. Jesus' flesh and blood and words are life giving. In fact, they are eternal life giving! That is the more complete sign that Jesus wants each of us to see and that is the more complete focus he wants each of us to have as well.

Pastor's Letter

We're just a week away until this year's parish picnic. Thank you, in advance, to our local Knights of Columbus, Council #1641, for doing so much for organizing this annual event. Thank you in advance to everyone who is preparing a salad or dessert, based on where your last name is in the alphabet. This year's event will feature a couple of new activity items, including some additional "picnic games" (i.e. potato sack races, etc.) and – as you well know – the dunk tank! We'll see how accurate you all are for determining if I get to stay fairly dry next Sunday afternoon or if I should wear some scuba gear for plunging into the water so often!

And, I am especially encouraged that the pilgrimage to the Holy Land and Egypt is now moving forward. We are planning for the journey to be Monday, October 11th, through Friday, October 22nd, leaving from the Pittsburgh airport. The journey will begin in the northern part of Israel and visit various sites around that Sea of Galilee area, including Nazareth and the Mt. of the Beatitudes. We will be there for 2-3 days, then progress to the southern area including the Jordan River, Bethlehem and Jerusalem. After 2-3 days there we go to Mt. Sinai and then to Egypt. Our journey will of course emphasize places and events in Jesus' life and ministry. But, we will also connect with places that are key to the Old Testament background and to the life of the early Christian Church.

"Follow the Blue Blazes" is an expression referring to the Buckeye Trail here in Ohio. We have many miles of this statewide trail that pass through Guernsey County. So, I would like to explore parts of this trail with our Holy Hikers group. Today (Sunday, July 25th), I would like to connect with part of the Buckeye Trail that meanders through Salt Fork State Park, on the eastern end of Salt Fork. As before, I plan to leave from the Gomber Avenue parking lot at 2:30 p.m. and arrive at a parking area along Parker Road, again, on the east side of Salt Fork Park

around 3:00 p.m. This parking area, the Group Campground Parking Area, is close to U.S. 22, about ¼ mile in, on the left-hand side.

12 PROMISES OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS



Over the centuries in Christianity, many saints have introduced a prayer or an approach to praying that has been particularly effective for them to be more fully alive in Jesus. One well-known example is the Stations of the Cross, which St. Francis of Assisi developed and then became popular for their effectiveness throughout the world.

In the 1600s, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a saint from France, was inspired to know the love of Jesus in an effective way through meditating about Jesus' heart. This became known as the Sacred Heart devotion. St. Margaret Mary experienced "locutions," reportedly hearing Jesus speaking to her directly. Among the messages were asking her to go to Mass and receive Holy Communion on the first Friday of each month and to do so for a total of 9 months in a row. We traditionally think about Jesus' crucifixion on Fridays. And, for connecting the offering of Jesus on the Cross, where His heart was opened by the spear of one of the Roman soldiers, and for connecting Holy Communion to Jesus nourishing us with His very heart, Jesus told St. Margaret Mary that 12 "promises" would be experienced by those who participated in this devotion. See the lists below that describe how to complete the devotion and to see the 12 Promises.

How to complete the First Friday's Devotion:

- Receive Holy Communion on each First Friday
- The nine Fridays must be consecutive
- They must be made in honor and in reparation to His Sacred Heart

12 Promises of the Sacred Heart to St. Margaret Mary

1. I will give them all the graces necessary for their state of life.
2. I will give peace in their families.
3. I will console them in all their troubles.
4. I will be their refuge in life and especially in death.
5. I will abundantly bless all their undertakings.
6. Sinners shall find in my Heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy.
7. Tepid souls shall become fervent.
8. Fervent souls shall rise speedily to great perfection.
9. I will bless those places wherein the image of my Sacred Heart shall be exposed and venerated.
10. I will give to priests the power to touch the most hardened hearts.
11. Persons who propagate this devotion shall have their names eternally written in my Heart.
12. In the excess of the mercy of my heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour.
