SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR THE 19TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME August 8, 2021

"Whoever eats this bread will live forever." As we gather to celebrate the great mystery of the Eucharist, let us open our hearts to our merciful and compassionate God.

The focus of the readings is twofold: the bread God provides is both strength and divine presence. Elijah is told to eat the



food provided by God so he will have the strength to go to Mt. Horeb where he will meet God. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the people "Anyone who eats this bread will live forever." Jesus is the one sent by God, and it is in him (the Bread of Life) that we meet God.

1 Kings 19:4-8

Get up and eat, else the journey will be too long for you.

How have you experienced the need for Eucharist in your life journey?

Ephesians 4:30-5:2

Forgive one another as God has forgiven you in Christ.

Who is that person you are called to forgive? Why has it been difficult to forgive him/her?

John 6:41-51

The bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.

How do you prepare to receive "the Bread of Life?"

Last week (17th Sunday of Ordinary

Time, Year B) we read about and reflected on the setting and context of John, Chapter 6. Then, over these next four weeks we will explore John 6:22-71, which is a Bible passage that consists of <u>four parts</u>.

The context is the New Testament Passover feeding of Jesus' followers through the multiplication of the loaves and fish. It was a significant sign he gave to all of us as his disciples. The miracle happened in a grassy wilderness (note its difference from the desert wilderness as the Hebrew people were escaping slavery in Egypt). Jesus led them beside still waters and fed them, like a fulfillment of Psalm 23. They did indeed understand part of the significance of that miracle. They grasped that Jesus was the Prophet who had been predicted repeatedly over the centuries beforehand. But, they put the focus of Jesus' salvation on this world and life. They seemed to miss the eternal significance of Jesus' miracle.

Over these next four weeks Jesus explains to them – and to us – the more complete meaning of that miraculous sign.

1) Today (August 1st, 18th Sunday of Ordinary Time) is **Part One**, which is the <u>introductory</u> part of John 6:22-71. Here Jesus lays the foundation of why the

- miracle was to lead to the conclusion that Jesus himself is the <u>Bread of Life</u>.
- 2) Next week (August 8th, 19th Sunday of Ordinary Time) is **Part Two**. Jesus explains that He is the Bread of Life in terms of his <u>words</u> and his <u>teachings</u>.
- 3) Because the Feast of the Assumption is on Sunday, August 15th, this year we will celebrate that in place of the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Nevertheless, it is worth noting the focus of **Part Three** of this passage in John 6:22-71. Jesus emphasizes there that among his words and teachings is that we are to consume his Flesh and his Blood!
- 4) Part Four of this passage is dealt with on Sunday, August 22nd, as we read and reflect on John 6:60-69. Many people found Jesus' Bread of Life teaching, about consuming his Flesh and Blood being connected with the bread and wine of the Passover, difficult to comprehend and difficult to accept.

So, in next week's passage Jesus slaloms between emphazing that he himself is God who is teaching them and that he himself is the Bread of Life.

Jesus' words and teachings are <u>nourishing</u>. In fact, they show him to be <u>the</u> Prophet who deepened and multiplied

the loaves and fish. Jesus reinforced this by citing a quote that could be read as either Isaiah 54:13 or Jeremiah 31:33. Jesus explained that they were being taught by God himself through his teaching!

On the other side of Part Two's slalom course Jesus demonstrated that he himself is the Bread of Life that has come down from heaven! This was difficult for them to grasp since they thought they knew him as the son of the carpenter, Joseph.

"Amen, Amen," Jesus says. This was a literary device used by the people of Jesus' time to emphasize when they were saying something to be understood literally. What, then, is the point that Jesus wants us to grasp literally? The final verse of next week's Gospel passage breaks the tape at the finish line of this slalom course:

"Whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

When did Jesus do this? When did Jesus say about bread and wine that "this is my flesh and my blood for the life of the world?" He did so at the Last Supper, which was also a Passover meal, the evening before he offered his flesh and blood on the cross as the Passover loaves of bread – giving the gift of eternal life to the world.

We are meant to benefit from our perspective of being his disciples <u>after</u> Jesus' death and resurrection and from the Apostle John's reflection on Jesus' words, teachings and actions. Therefore, may the Lord help us to grow stronger in our faith that Jesus is the Bread of Life for each of us and for all of us, and that we are to consume His Body and Blood so that we will <u>already</u> have growing within us the capacity to live forever in Heaven!

One thing I will reemphasize is that among the ways other parishes have been able to meet their goals is that a number of their parishioners give their parish support offerings primarily through the DPSC or split them 50/50. We as a parish have a monthly

"assessment" that we provide to the Diocese. Additionally, we have our annual DPSC parish goal. Once that goal is reached, the extra returns to the parish, assessment-free. When we don't reach our goal during the campaign time, we add that remaining amount to our regular, monthly assessment. So, giving more of one's regular offerings through the DPSC has an effect of reducing our regular, monthly assessment as well (clear as mud, right?). Anyway, thank you, again, to all who have already participated in this year's campaign!

I am looking forward to next Sunday, August 8th, and the return of coffee and donuts in the Social Hall after the 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Masses at St. Benedict. We will plan to have some gluten-free items available as well.

Then, the following weekend, after all of the Masses of August 14th (after the 5:00 p.m. Mass) & August 15th, our Knights of Columbus are planning the return of another annual event, <u>Sundaes for Seminarians</u>. Stop by the Social Hall after each of the Masses to enjoy an ice cream sundae and offer your support for the promotion and formation of seminarians for our Diocese of Steubenville.
