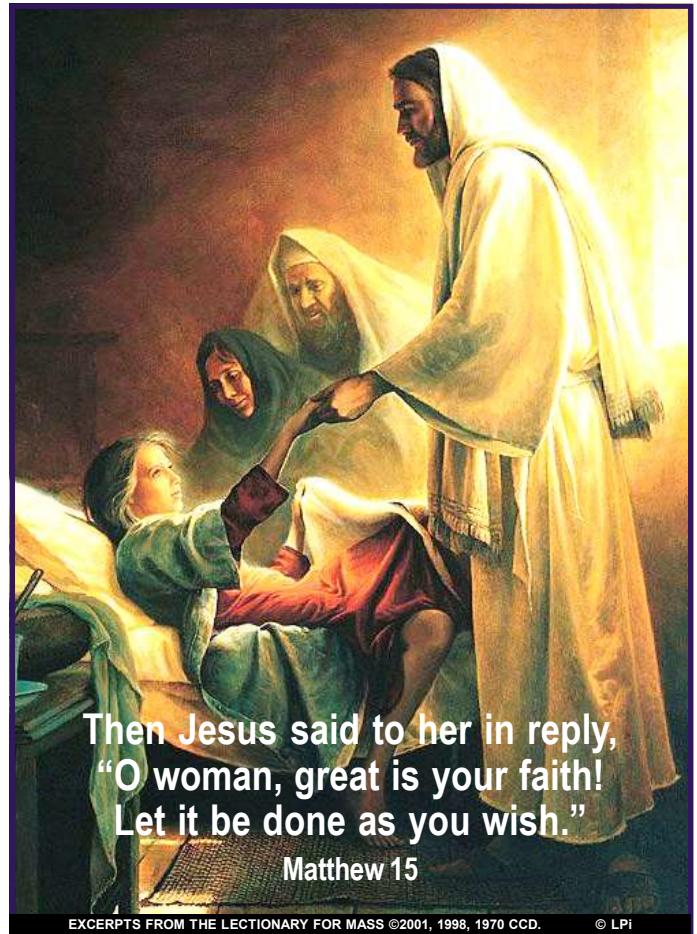

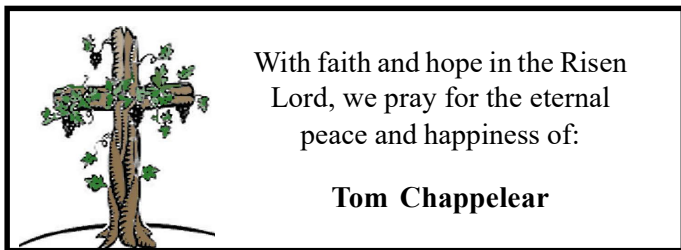

Parents of students who do not attend St. Benedict School are encouraged to enroll their children in PSR grades K - 6 .

Children in the 2nd grade will prepare for First Reconciliation and First Communion in the Sacramental Prep class. Students in the 5th and 6th grades will prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.

It is vital to the future of our Faith to train our children in the traditions of our Catholic heritage.

The Caracol Corner

To continue growing familiar with our twin parish in Caracol, Haiti, we will have information in this "Caracol Corner" in our bulletin over these next several weeks. This week we focus on the daily challenges they face from **food insecurity**, made even more precarious with the COVID-19 restrictions.

The majority of farming in Haiti is on small-plots subsistence farms, with mostly manual labor, and traditional farming techniques. Over 50% of Haiti's food is imported.

Almost half (49%) of Haiti's population of almost 11 million are undernourished per the UN. According to the UN World Food Program, about 1/3 of Haitians

need urgent food assistance, and about 10% overall are considered in an emergency situation. Current humanitarian assistance from outside of Haiti has been essential to avert a higher level of crisis.

According to the USAID Famine Early Warning System (FEWS) Network, the North and North East regions of Haiti, which include Caracol, are at IPC Phase 3, which they define as:

Phase 3: Acute Food and Livelihood Crisis;

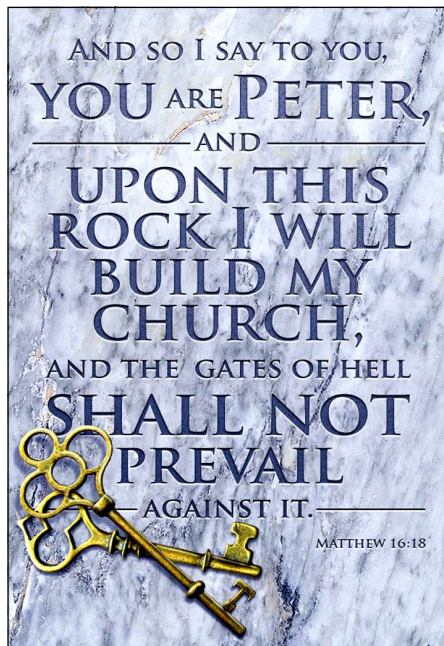
Highly stressed and critical lack of food access with high and above usual malnutrition and accelerated depletion of livelihood assets that, if continued, will slide the population into Phase 4 or 5 and/or likely result in chronic poverty.

READINGS FOR THE 21ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Sunday, August 23, 2020

Peter's confession of faith shows he is open to exercising the power of the keys to the kingdom of heaven. As disciples of Jesus, we too are called to be people of faith. To prepare ourselves to celebrate these sacred mysteries, let us seek pardon for the times our faith has wavered.

The readings focus on the power and fidelity of God made manifest in human ministry.



The prophet Isaiah delivers to Shebna the results of his unfaithful behavior. But God will continue. A new “officer” will be appointed who will be invested with the keys, a symbol of the power and authority of God.

This theme is picked up in the Gospel reading where Peter is given the keys to the kingdom, symbolizing the power and authority of Christ. But the focus is sharpened. Isaiah refers to the wrongful behavior of Shebna. Christ responds to the positive faith expressed by Peter.

Isaiah 22:19-23

I will place the key of the House of David on Eliakim's shoulder.

How well do I exercise the power of God in my life?

Romans 11:33-36

For who has known the mind of the Lord or who has been his counselor?

How do you discern “the mind of the Lord” in your life?

Matthew 16:14-20

You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church.

How faithful are you in listening to the teaching authority of the church?

Our Gospel passage for next week, August 23rd, jumps forward to the 16th chapter of the Gospel of Matthew. And, we encounter another passage that develops a couple of themes we've had throughout these past several weeks' readings: a) expressions of either a strong faith or a weak faith and b) the purification of the faith of Jewish and Gentile believers.

In *this* Sunday's Gospel, the Gentile Canaanite woman's faith in Jesus is contrasted with that of the Jewish Pharisees. In *next* Sunday's Gospel, St. Peter's Jewish faith in Jesus will be compared with the pagan Gentile believers in the region to the north and east of the Sea of Galilee.

Among the reasons this series of questions and answers between Jesus and Peter is set in that area of the Sea of Galilee is to show that St. Peter's faith in Jesus has a universal – worldwide – impact. That area was controlled very thoroughly by the Romans and was a hub of their regional activities. An elaborate shrine had been built into

the rock on a huge hillside. This shrine was filled with statues of the various Roman gods. Bearing this in mind, consider how St. Peter responds to Jesus' question, “Who do you say that I am?” St. Peter exhibits a good, strong, Jewish faith by declaring boldly with all of these statues in front of him, “You [Jesus] are the Christ, the Son of the living God.”

When Jesus affirms Peter by giving him the “power of the keys,” to bind and to loose on earth and in heaven, this was an echo of a key passage from the Old Testament that we will read as our First Reading next week, from Isaiah 22. That passage describes the authority of the prime minister of the kingdom of Judah. This authority enabled the prime minister to speak in the name of the king. And, this authority could be handed on from one prime minister to the next. In light of St. Peter's declaration, prompted by the living God, our Heavenly Father, Jesus confers a prime minister's authority on St. Peter. He could speak in Jesus' name and in his authority. And, again, this is something that would have a worldwide and universal impact.

The name **addition** given to St. Peter reflects the setting as well. “**You** are Peter [i.e. Rocky!]” – recall that huge stone hillside where they were standing. “Upon **this** rock [not that pagan hillside rock] I will build my church.” He was given an additional name to supplement Simon, which in a positive sense means something alive, a variety of grass, though something that could be swayed by the wind. Jesus gave him the additional name, Peter, something even more solid – a rock.

The Lord invites us, too, to make a declaration like Simon Peter, to acknowledge Jesus as God. Our own faith in

Jesus, which is both alive and growing like fertile reeds and solid as rock, is to help us to have greater hope in light of the various challenges to faith we experience in our daily lives. And, this faith is not something passive and only defensive in the face of those challenges. It is something that the gates of the netherworld will not be able to resist. The Lord wants to help us to go beyond our fears and to see how faith in Jesus transforms our world from one of emptiness and superficiality – like those idols on the hillside – to a world that is both alive and stable. May our Heavenly Father help us to experience Jesus as our merciful and eternal life-giving Messiah!

Pastor's Letter

If you're in St. Benedict Church in the near future, you might notice a different scent in the air. We had been using Pine Sol and another cleaner called, Fabuloso, to keep the surfaces inside thoroughly sanitized. I had jokingly referred to our churches as “St. Benedict of the Pine Sol Forest” or “Christ Our Fabuloso Light”. We've been using a bit more Murphy Oil (woo hoo to Colgate-Palmolive) and some Old English recently to protect and restore some of the wood finish.

Anyway, the more recent scent is in fact grapefruit, which is the fragrance of the formula in our new electro-static sprayer. That should make the sanitizing of our churches and school go noticeably quicker and with a formula that is easier on the wood, too.

I'd like to acknowledge our St. Benedict School staff and teachers for going the extra mile in preparation for a safe re-opening of the school this year. Actually, I know so many of our parishioners have key roles in *all of our area school districts*. Blessings to you for your efforts to ensure a wise and safe return to school. What a challenge to be double-preparing (planning both for in-class instruction and for the possibility of returning to remote teaching)!

Please note that when our St. Benedict School begins on Tuesday, September 1st, the school Mass on Thursday will be held at another time, later in the morning. That way, we would be able to maintain distance between those attending the 8:35 a.m. Mass and the students plus have some time between the Masses to re-sanitize the church. As mentioned last week, a few more fix-up projects are underway, including the roof of the main school building this upcoming week and a new layer of mulch on the

playground. Thank you to the Callihan family (Chelsea, who is our First Grade teacher, her husband, Derrick and children) who power-washed that playground equipment recently, helping to prep the playground for the new year.

Please note likewise that we have established a way to make offerings to the parish and school online. It is a process that was established by the Catholic Extension Society, which provides many resources for dioceses like ours that has been re-designated as a “mission” diocese.
