Legislation and the Supreme Court

States have passed 90 pro-life laws this year to save babies from abortion. State lawmakers are increasing efforts to help mothers and unborn babies by passing budgets that expand pregnancy support and unborn babies child tax credits. The upcoming U.S. Supreme Court case, *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* could lead to over-turning *Roe v. Wade*. The case challenges a Mississippi law that bans abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy.

Pregnant Female Athletes Face Discrimination, Pressure to Abort

Allyson Felix, Olympic winner with 9 medals, was offered 70% less money in Nike sponsorship when they found out she was pregnant. Corporate backing is vital to living/training expenses. Allyson asked for maternity protection and they refused. She published an opinion piece in the *New York Times* exposing the dirty little secret of the corporate world – their treatment of pregnant athletes. Other Olympic-caliber female athletes have reported *similar pressure to have an abortion*.

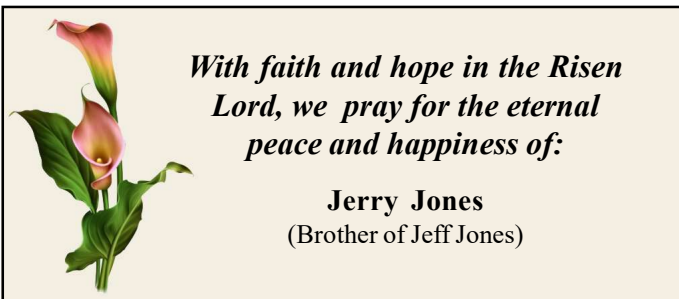

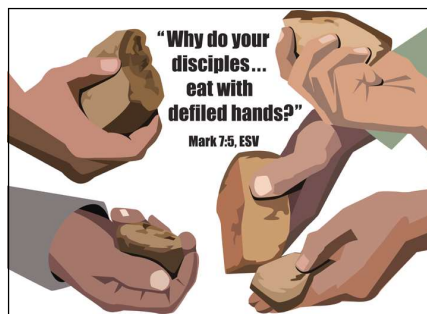

READINGS FOR THE 22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

August 29, 2021

Purity of heart comes from within. As Christians, our hearts must rest in loving God and in loving one another. As we prepare to celebrate, let us call to mind the times we have failed to love the Lord with our whole heart.

The focus of the readings is twofold. First, we have the teaching (commandment) to follow God's law and not replace it with laws of our own making. Second, we have Jesus' condemnation of legalism. He insists that we not concern ourselves with the purification of objects, but rather with the purification of our lives, our intention, and our behavior. This twofold focus draws our attention to the danger of hindering inner, thoughtful obedience to God by redirecting obedience to external laws made by humans.



Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8

Now, Israel, hear the statutes and decrees which I am teaching you to observe. How faithful am I to keeping the commandments the Lord has taught us to observe?

James 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27

All good giving and every gift is from above.

How often do I give God the glory for all His gifts to me?

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person, but the things that come out from within are what defile.

What do I harbor in my heart that I need to replace with thoughts of God?

Next week we will return to the Gospel of Mark for our Sunday Mass Gospel. Six weeks ago, we read from the end of Mark, Chapter 6. Next week, we will begin with Mark, Chapter 7. These next several weeks will focus on the theme of being disciples with our hearts set sincerely on the Lord.

In next week's Gospel Jesus teaches us, "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." Jesus said this regarding foods. Indeed, how we feed our souls – movies, music, books, websites, newspapers, etc. – is fundamentally important to how our souls are formed so that what flows out from within is good. Over these past five weeks of Gospel passages from John, Chapter 6, we have encountered and reflected upon Jesus nourishing our souls as the Bread of Life.

Regarding next week's Gospel, a Swiss physician named Adrienne von Speyr, who died in 1967 and who had experienced the wounds of Jesus – the "stigmata" – develop on his hands, offered these reflections about being attentive to the first stirrings of evil in our hearts, to turn more consciously toward thinking about the Lord and about goodness:

"Evil thoughts can surface first, for a moment, as mere temptations; but when someone resists them and arms his heart against them, they do not make him unclean. But if [a person] welcomes them and allows them to grow, and

they [flow out from] him with the strength of the developed thought, of the evil *intention*, then they make him unclean."

He then encourages us to consider two additional approaches for dealing with "unclean" thoughts. First, consider what our lives would be like if we had never experienced the grace of God and His mercy. This can be sobering and can then strengthen us to focus on thoughts of the Lord. This line of thinking can also make us more conscious of the reality of goodness. Secondly, although our thoughts are in many ways our own world, something wonderfully private, what flows out from our thoughts nevertheless does affect others. From these considerations, we are to "thank God for His grace, and ask Him to extinguish everything sinful glimmering within us, through the power of His grace" (from Magnificat devotional magazine, August 2015, p. 424).

Over these next few weeks, we will also be reading from the Letter of St. James in the Second Readings. St. James gives us a great teaching on how our spiritual lives can become more complete. He says that not only are we to be people of prayer and study of spiritual realities but we also need to put our faith into practice, serving the needs of the least around us. That concreteness of our faith then helps to reinforce our interior devotional life of our thoughts and in fact helps us to be spiritually alive.

May the Lord Our God, through the gifts of His mercy, inspirations, courage and faithfulness in doing His will, help us to grow in greater depth in being His beloved disciples – God's beloved sons and daughters.

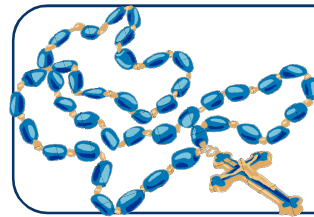

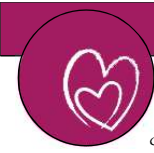
