



Children in the 2nd grade will prepare for First Reconciliation and First Communion in the Sacramental Prep class. Students in the 5th and 6th grades will prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.

It is vital to the future of our Faith to train our children in the traditions of our Catholic heritage and to grow in knowledge of God's action in our lives.

The Caracol Corner

For this week's Caracol Corner, I'd like to highlight two things: the positive realities from which <u>we</u> can benefit, and the water and sanitation needs that they are striving to remedy.

Caracol, Haiti, is beautifully situated on the northern coast of Haiti. However, like the Rime of the Ancient Mariner, this saying is unfortunately true "water, water everywhere, but not a drop to drink!" More water than ever is needed because of increased washing and sanitation in light of the current coronavirus response. Among the projects St. Elisabeth Parish is working on for the sake of their school, parish and broader community is, according to Mr. Jean Mirvil, developing "a well [for the school that] at the same time we could

modernize the water installation to reach its public bathroom area. With Covid, more water will be utilized and must be available in a more expeditious manner."

While funding is needed for this project, both Mr. Mirvil and Fr. Pierre Piquon, Pastor of St. Elisabeth Parish, would like to emphasize the positive qualities of their community. [The realities of life in St. Elisabeth Parish continue] "to showcase elements that are still associated with Haiti: The diversity within its people, the culture, history and a type of people that is too resilient to let the vicissitudes of life overcome its determination to ascend to a better life...In a nutshell, there is a *joie de vivre* that does not reflect in the profile" [of need with negative statistics].

READINGS FOR THE 22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Sunday, August 30, 2020

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. Jesus reminds us that the call to discipleship is not always easy. Yet Jesus assures us that the glory of the Father awaits


us at the end of our journey. As pilgrims, let us join our voices in prayer as we seek the Lord's mercy and pardon.

Our readings focus on the cost of obedience to the will of God.

Jeremiah is constantly ridiculed and persecuted for being the bearer of God's word to the people. His messages, and he, are rejected, yet he remains faithful.

In our Gospel, Jesus warns his disciples that he himself will suffer and even be killed for being faithful to God's message. The focus then shifts to the disciples; those who want to follow Jesus must accept the same cross, the

willingness to be faithful, even if it means giving their lives. What Jeremiah experienced and Jesus died for, the disciples must accept — the world is fundamentally opposed to the message of God.



Jeremiah 20:7-9

The Word of the Lord is burning in my heart.

How do I respond to the "word of God" when it goes against something the world says?

Romans 12:1-2

Do not conform to this age. What have I compromised of my faith in order to get ahead?

Matthew 16:21-27

Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it.

What do I value so much that I might resist if God asks me to Surrender it to Him?

Does Jesus mean it literally when he says,

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me"? When we read this we tend to hear, "if you want to go to Heaven, you will have to suffer many different kinds of pain." But why did Jesus also spend so much time healing all forms of illness? Are we to suffer and offer up suffering, or are we to focus on healing and being freed from suffering?

I know I find myself wishing that Jesus had said, "Because I will take up my cross, you won't have to take up your cross. I will suffer in every way so that you won't have to suffer in any way." Isn't that what he meant to say? Since he spent so much time healing all forms of illness, doesn't he want us to be free from all kinds of suffering? Why, then, did he give us this commandment about taking up our own cross?

Key to grasping Jesus' command to take up our cross are the two bookends of that whole sentence: "denying ourselves" and "following him." And, another distinction is made between general suffering and suffering in the service of God. Jesus wants to heal us from general suffering, especially from the reality of spiritual affliction.

He continually invites us into deeper healing and spiritual freedom. And, often we don't actually seek and ask for (or believe in!) the healing that Jesus wants us to know.

Suffering in the service of God, however, is a different aspect of suffering and is something that Jesus says is an expected part of being his disciples.

Suffering in the service of God has at least two dimensions. There is a personal, interior dimension of it. This is connected with "denying ourselves." Denying ourselves means not pretending that we are the masters of our ultimate destiny. We are to deny ourselves from thinking, feeling and behaving as if we were God. We acknowledge God as God and deny ourselves as God, just as we are to deny other things and beings that we could put in place of God.

The second dimension of suffering in the service of God is the external dimension, connected with "following Jesus." When we then take up the cross of being a disciple of Jesus, we are to follow Jesus wherever that cross leads us. We see in our own day and time many Christians throughout the world suffering for being Christian. That, again, is to be expected. But, where did Jesus' cross ultimately lead Him? As Easter people we can acknowledge that the cross led to the resurrection! The courage of persecuted Christians throughout the world today, throughout history and also our own courage in the face of threats to religious freedom in our country, for example, are meant to be emboldened by the promise that in losing our lives for Jesus' sake we would ultimately discover that the cross leads to Heaven!

And, if we're honest with ourselves, it is often in denying ourselves that we can experience longer term and more complete healing from the full range of suffering that often results from sin and spiritual affliction. As we follow the Lord and actually turn to the Lord in the face of temptations, we can experience His assistance and healing more completely as well.

St. Paul described his experience of living out this Gospel commandment in his letter to the Galatians. He said, "I have been crucified **with** Christ," meaning that the experience of taking up his cross was not something he did on his own to prove his worthiness to God. Instead, it meant experiencing Jesus helping him. In fact, he went on to say, "yet I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me; insofar as now I live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God who has loved me and has given himself up for me" (Gal. 2:19b-20).

May we be ready to embrace opportunities to deny ourselves, to take up our crosses **with** Jesus, and to follow Him through persecutions into the deeper joy, healing and Easter freedom where He wants to lead us.

Pastor's Letter

I have been encouraged this week to see that the statewide coronavirus numbers associated with hospitalizations has declined over these past 10 days so that the total numbers in hospitals with COVID-19 is under 900, in ICUs is under 300 and needing ventilators is under 200. Here in Guernsey County, too, it looks like the number of active cases has declined to under 15 as well.

I know that there are many contributing factors for this improvement. As difficult as it has been for many people, I'm sure that the mask mandate has been among the most effective for this largely airborne virus.

So, I'd like to emphasize that until we formally have no more new cases here in Guernsey County and have this mask mandate lifted to please continue wearing a mask when attending Mass or other prayer services in our churches. We have additional masks on hand if you forget a mask at home or leave it in the car. We want to continue to keep our "common breathing space" as clean as possible.

My favorite new tool is the electro-static sprayer that recently arrived. It has helped to greatly reduce the time spent on sanitizing both the surfaces and the air in our buildings. And, the buildings and maintenance staff for the Diocese of Steubenville is producing a solution for those sprayers and is making it available

for all of the parishes and schools of our Diocese at an extremely affordable rate. This will help us especially both with keeping our St. Benedict School classrooms and common spaces well-sanitized and with improving the effect of all of this cleaning on the wood surfaces of our pews.

Additionally, we are continuing to have an increase in attendance at our Sunday Masses, especially at our 10:30 a.m. Mass.

If you are uncomfortable with gatherings of people in closer proximity like that, and if we get close to capacity, please feel free to a) leave and attend Mass at another time or b) simply only attend a daily Mass during the week where we usually have between 20-30 people in attendance (compared to the 60-110 people at the Sunday Masses).

Likewise, please do not be offended if we post signs on the door indicating that we have reached our capacity and that we cannot have additional people in the building. Hopefully, we are not far away from the point that we can get back to having more people closer to each other without the current restrictions. Thank you for your sacrifices and attentiveness to cleanliness that are helping us to get to that point.

May the Lord keep us protected and healthy and, as always, well prepared for the gift of eternal life!!

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
