READINGS FOR THE 24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Sunday, September 13, 2020

As followers of Jesus, we are invited to be people of mercy and forgiveness. Our Lord calls us to be Christ to one another. As we gather to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us turn to the Lord seeking mercy for the times we have failed to forgive our neighbor's injustice.

Our readings focus on forgiveness. Our forgiveness of others is motivated by the forgiveness we have received.

We experience the forgiveness of God in our own act of forgiving. In the readings, we are told that it makes no sense to expect forgiveness if we, ourselves, will not extend forgiveness to others.

Jesus insists that our forgiveness should be without limit. Matthew uses the Jewish symbol for absolute perfection or completeness: the number seven. But this symbol is

even multiplied here; seventy times seven! The parable illustrates the point and expands the motivation. As we have been forgiven, we must forgive.



Sirach 27:30, 28:7

If one who is but flesh cherishes wrath, who will forgive his sins?
To whom do you owe
"forgiveness?"

If we live for the Lord, we die for the Lord.
Do you truly allow the word of God to be the source of your life?

Matthew 18:21-35

So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart.
Is there someone in your life who needs forgiveness? How can you bring yourself to be forgiving of them?

In our day and time we are often cautioned about being merciful. Many people might tell us that it isn't very wise to be merciful. It would be better for us to hold people more strictly and exactly accountable for the ways they take advantage of our generosity. The deeper they become indebted to us the more cautious we should be about our generosity to them.

Surprisingly, both next week's First Reading, from the Old Testament Book of Sirach, and next week's Gospel seem to indicate that God deals with us in a different way – and asks us and helps us (through the Holy Spirit) to do the same. Being merciful fits well with being wise.

The Book of Sirach is in the Wisdom section of the Old Testament and was written about 200 years before Jesus' birth. Notice how much Jesus' emphasis on mercy echoes what we read from Sirach's words of wisdom: "Forgive your neighbor the wrong done to you; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. Does anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the LORD? Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself, yet seek pardon for one's own sins" (bible.usccb.org/bible/sirach/28)?

St. Peter probably thought he was being generous with his mercy when he asked Jesus if he had to forgive a brother who sinned against him as many as seven times. Even that

generous number of times of forgiveness is qualitatively different from God's mercy that we are called to imitate as disciples of Jesus. Jesus invites us to that mercy by experiencing a truly boundless mercy, forgiving seventy-seven times.

The The Word Among Us devotional magazine for September 2017 has an insightful way to connect with God's mercy. "The best way to answer the question – how boundless is God's mercy? – is to consider what our lives would be like without it. Imagine a world with no tenderness, no forgiveness, no compassion. Imagine being bound in your sin with no way out. Now imagine God sacrificing himself not only to rescue you, but to offer you the promise of eternal life with him in heaven. That's how boundless His mercy is. That's how deeply He loves you" (p. 38).

Another aspect of wisdom that is manifested by mercy is by realizing that it "is not just an abstract idea or a nice theory. It's a concrete reality" (p. 38). Hebrew wisdom is something concrete as well. People with craftsman skills, with down to earth skills, were seen as wise. True mercy is put into practice and because of this it becomes a known reality. When we appreciate the depths of the Lord's mercy for us, we start to want to see mercy realized in others' lives as well. We can grow in wanting to participate in that "seventy-seven times mercy" with others.

Pastor's Letter

Thank you very much for all of the birthday greetings I have received this week. It's enjoyable to me to share this birthday week with others, including Pat Farley, our DRE, on September 6th and Fr. Bob, on September 9th. Happy Birthday to them as well!

As you might have heard already, for me this week's birthday has been an especially enjoyable one. I formally qualified for the Denny's and Bob Evan's "Golden Menu" discounts! It is especially hard for me to fathom this because it seems that it was barely a blink of the eyes ago that I was still being carded!

Being a milestone birthday like this has given me opportunities to reflect on life and ministry as well. I will write about some of those reflections in more details in the upcoming weeks.

I have been especially grateful to be here in Guernsey County for a couple of reasons. On one hand this has been an ideal first experience as a pastor because of the foundations established here in our parish by so many different people. This includes the generations of families here that have built the foundations of the parish – in all four (including the original St. Patrick's parish in Old Washington) of the parishes that are the historical roots of our current county-wide Christ Our Light Parish – by the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity, whose continuous service and presence since 1911 has provided an important continuity that few parishes have. Our many pastors have likewise guided us through the ups and downs of our county's history.

On the other hand, I have had a unique sense of destiny for being here in Guernsey County. In my first pastor's letter in the first week of July 2014 I noted the following:

"I also have great peace and excitement about Christ Our Light Parish being my first opportunity to serve as a pastor in part because of an experience I had when I was in 7th grade. At that time my family lived in Minnesota and we would travel during the summer to visit grandparents in Florida and then other relatives along the East coast and in southern Indiana. As we were driving from Virginia westward on I-70 on our way to the Cincinnati area, I distinctly remember how impressive the Middlebourne valley here in Guernsey County was to me. I remember looking out the window of our family van as we swept down into that valley, prompted to look in the road atlas to see where we were. Then, seeing that we were in eastern Ohio getting close to I-77, I remember thinking, 'I wonder what it would be like to live here.' Little did I know that one day I would be here serving as pastor of the parish in this very

area! Again, that has given me a sense of destiny and of the hand of the Lord on this opportunity to serve here."

Again, thank you for celebrating this birthday with me, with Pat, and with Fr. Bob!

May the Lord keep us protected and healthy and, as always, well prepared for the gift of eternal life!!
