

FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP

Catholics are about 51 million of voters in national elections. We have *the power to elect* officials that will lead our country *adhere to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness*:

In the key document for guiding election decisionmaking, *Faithful Citizenship*, the U.S. Bishops have highlighted 13 areas central for us as Catholics. This document is highlighted at the homepage of the USCCB: <u>usceb.org</u>. Human Life issues are set as the primary concern and the other 12 are as follows: Promoting Peace; Marriage & Family Life; Religious Freedom; Preferential Option for the Poor & Economic Justice; Health Care; Migration; Catholic Education; Promoting Justice & Countering Violence; Combatting Unjust Discrimination; Care for Our Common Home; Communication, Media & Culture; Global Solidarity.

Key passages from the Catechism of the Catholic Church or from *Faithful Citizenship* guiding our election decision-making include CCC 2271: *Abortion is gravely contrary to moral law*; 2234: *Euthanasia & assisted suicide are against the dignity of the human person*; 2308: *All citizens and all governments are obliged to work for the avoidance of war*; FC, n. 70: *Marriage must be defined, recognized, and protected as a lifelong exclusive commitment between a man and a woman*; 2229: *Parents have the right/duty to educate their children in the manner they choose;* 2288: *Health care that respects patients and workers' rights is vital.*






READINGS FOR THE 26TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Sunday, September 27, 2020

The scripture readings beckon us to turn from our sinful ways and to seek what is right and just. To better prepare our hearts to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us acknowledge our sinfulness before the Lord.

Our readings focus on the mercy of God for sinners. In their earlier history, the Iraelites tended to think almost exclusively in communal terms: communal guilt, communal punishment. Here Ezekiel presents the corrective to that extreme: individual responsibility for individual sin. The truth is in the balance of the two. The major focus, however when seen with our Gospel reading, is that God always allows the freedom and opportunity to change.

The Gospel presents this in parable form. It is the story of each of us. Sometimes we say yes, and we don't act. Sometimes we rebel and say no — but later have a change of heart and act! God is primarily interested in our final option! God does not hold past sin against us. God hopes and waits for our obedient response.



Ezekiel 18:25-28

If he turns from the wickedness he has committed, he shall preserve his life. Do you truly believe that God forgives even the most diabolical of sinners?

Phillippians 2:1-5

Have in you the same attitude that is also in Christ Jesus. What does St. Paul mean when he says we must have the same attitude as that of Christ Jesus?

Matthew 21:28-32

Amen I say to you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you.

Who in today's culture would be "the tax collectors and prostitutes" who are entering the kingdom before us?

Two verses before next Sunday's First

Reading from Ezekiel 18, God says through the prophet Ezekiel, "Do I find pleasure in the death of the wicked? Do I not rejoice when they turn from their evil ways and live?" Both God's deep desire for us and His patience toward us are for our eternal salvation! Jesus' series of teachings about mercy, that we have heard over the past three weeks, concludes next weekend by reinforcing God's mercy toward us.

God's deepest concern at any given moment, according to that passage, is for those who are most vulnerable to perishing in sin. Jesus gives witness to that desire through His obedience to the Father's plan, about which we read in our Second Reading. St. Paul teaches us to have the same attitude as Jesus, that we "humbly regard others as more important than [ourselves], each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others."

Bearing those two points in mind can help us to enter into and benefit from Jesus' parable about the two sons. One of the sons initially refuses to do the father's will but later changes his mind and completes his father's request to work in the vineyard. The other says he would go but never does. We could be jealous about people who had lived a life of sin but then turned to the Lord's ways. Did they get away with sin? Like the first son in this passage from Matthew 21 as well as like the Prodigal Son in the Gospel of Luke, chapter 15, the one who changes his mind discovers that it is better to live the father's plan and to be a person of integrity. Yes, the father is merciful, but at the same time it **is** better to be doing the father's will all along.

Catholic writer, Neal Lozano, who also conducts an effective healing ministry, has written two books (<u>The</u> <u>Older Brother Returns</u> and <u>Unbound</u>) that draw upon the dynamics of the person who is bitter about receiving back into the fold others who had gone astray and who had been caught up in lives of sin. The conversion from deep sin often also brings a deep and strong awareness of the goodness of God. But those who haven't necessarily strayed as much can, nevertheless, suffer from holding on to unforgiveness toward those who have had the deep conversion.

So, may the Lord help each of us to rejoice in what He is doing in our lives and to rejoice in the gift of deep conversion He is doing in the lives of others as well.

Pastor's Letter

One of our annual staple events each year in October is our diocesan Respect Life Conference. We have hosted this event here at Christ Our Life Parish a couple of times. In this year, when so many events have been cancelled or postponed, this is one event that is actually going to be held at an even grander level.

This year's diocesan Respect Life Conference is planned for Saturday, October 10th. It is being planned as a "joint venture" between the Diocese of Steubenville and Franciscan University of Steubenville. This will enable the event to be conducted in the university's large gym space of Finnegan Fieldhouse. Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City, KS, the Chairman for the US Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee for Pro-Life Activities, will be the keynote speaker. Following his keynote address at 9:00 a.m. is a panel discussion involving several other prolife leaders. This will be followed by Mass at 11:00 a.m.

Registration will be limited to 100 people and participants will be required to follow applicable safety standards of social distancing and face coverings. There is <u>no fee</u> for attending, but <u>pre-registration is required</u>. The conference will be live/streamed for those who cannot attend in person. Please register to receive details about live/

streaming. Registrations will be taken online (www.diosteub.org/respect-life-conference), through email (jschmidt@diosteub.org), and through the mail (using the registration form provided by the diocese). On another note, regarding our parish's participation in this year's DPSC, this year's parish goal is \$76,563. As of September 8th, 137 of our parish households have participated. Our pledges total at this point is \$57,464. A number of parishioners participate in this campaign toward the end of the year and designate this as one of their key end-of-tax-year contributions. I, too, have yet to make my contribution! I will finally offer <u>this</u> weekend the usual springtime annual pulpit presentation that was disrupted by the COVID-19 shutdown.

Additional information will be provided next week regarding a matching funds collection to benefit our twin parish community of St. Elisabeth Parish in Caracol, Haiti.

May the Lord continue to bless us with joy and peace as disciples of Jesus and always ready for the gift of eternal life!

National Day

Prayer and Fasting

September 24, 2020

For God's mercy on our land and the healing and conversion of our hearts.

In the midst of the Civil War, President Abraham

Lincoln called for a national day of prayer and fasting. It was observed on April 30, 1863. Two days later, Confederate General Stonewall Jackson, who "was considered one of the greatest tactical commanders in history," was accidently shot by one of his own men and died nine days later. Many Civil War historians consider this one of the key turning points in the Civil War.

Inspired by Abraham Lincoln, another national day of fasting and prayer is planned for this upcoming **Thursday, September 24th**, for the emergence of a new unity, peace and civility in our nation. See actsxxix.org for details.
