

READINGS FOR THE 27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Sunday, October 4, 2020

As Christians we are called to be caretakers of the vineyard of the Lord. As we prepare to celebrate these mysteries, let us seek the Lord's mercy and pardon for the times we have not been good stewards of the kingdom of God.

Our readings focus on the rejection of God's message.

The reading from Isaiah is a parable of the loving, caring owner of the vineyard who did everything possible for the vineyard. Even after God's constant loving care and grace, there are those who turn away. What more could God have done? God does not force a positive response.

The Gospel parable presents the same theme with more drama. Each time God sent a prophet, He and His message were rejected by God's chosen people. God never gives up. But even the most loving offer, God's own son, is rejected!

What more could God have done? God does not force a positive response.

Isaiah 5:1-7

The people of Judah are God's cherished plant. How have you experienced God's continous love in your life?

Phillippians 4:6-9

The peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Describe a time when you experienced the peace of God surrounding you.

Matthew 21:33-43

The kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit.

How do you "proclaim/live" the Kingdom of God?

Our Sunday readings next week give us a contrasting look at what happens when we accept or reject God's offers to give us His peace.

We might wonder why the tenant farmers in next week's Gospel would refuse to give the owner his produce, even to the point of killing his son. Evidently in the time of Jesus in the Galilee region there was a law in place – to assure that all available land was being cultivated – that if a landowner had tenant farmers living and working on his land and if he died without a son, the tenants could inherit the land in place of a son. So, there was some motivation for them to scheme the death of this landowner's son.

Nevertheless, in light of <u>last</u> week's parable of the generous landowner it seems that the tenant workers in <u>next</u> week's parable had been living on an ideal vineyard of a generous man. That's what our God is like. He invites us into a daily relationship that is meant to have a profound peace with it. Central to this peace is Jesus, God the landowner's beloved Son, reigning in the vineyard and land of our hearts as the Lord of our lives.

Unfortunately, we tend to want to replace <u>his</u> peaceful rule with our <u>own</u>. Sometimes we choose actions that, in effect, reject the rightful place Jesus is meant to have. How do we sometimes get to that point of rejecting the Lord?

God offers us opportunities to know His peace that are progressively refined. In time they often invite us to be patient about experiencing God's presence and action in our lives. That patience allows experiences of God's presence to be even deeper and more profound. But, in that waiting, because of the freedom in which God relates to us, we could either grow more grateful or grow more self-centered, even sinfully so.

Isn't that often what happens? We tend to develop a caricature of the people we don't see regularly. We see that happening with the tenant farmers regarding the landowner who had been away on a journey. They seemed to have lost their memory of this generous landowner and focused instead on ways they could acquire the land.

In our experience of God the Father, he might seem distant to us, like the landowner away on a journey. But, God does not abandon us. God the Father has sent Jesus to be close to us in an on-going way. He is exceptionally close to us through the Eucharist. Our "memory" of God can be weekly and even daily refreshed.

To conclude on another positive note, St. Paul teaches us in next week's 2nd Reading about how to respond well to God's invitation to us and what happens when we do. We are to immerse our minds – our outlook on life – in at least eight categories of positive thoughts. We are meant to think about these things as realistically as possible, as St. Paul says, "Keep on doing what you have learned and received and heard and seen in me." The content of our thoughts about these eight categories of positive thoughts is meant to be what we have seen and heard – that is, on what is real. When we do this, St. Paul teaches us, then the "God of peace will be with you." When we think about the concrete goodness that is around us, our faith can be bolstered.

And, we can avoid getting bored from living with a positive, Christian outlook by considering the range of categories available to us, plus additional categories such as the fruits of the Holy Spirit given in Galatians 5. After thinking about what is true or honorable, we can then shift

to considering what is pure or excellent or worthy of praise. That can help us to have more on-going refreshment about what is good.

Again, all of this is to help us to experience the peace of God from our friendship with the God of peace!

Pastor's Letter

This weekend we will be conducting something very unique. In light of this year's particularly unprecedented election process, we will be conducting a voter registration opportunity after each of the Masses this weekend.


Please note this is something that you can do at home, as I will describe below. And, as I have been researching about this process myself, I have learned more about the election process and about how all of us can participate in a way that is much more secure and systematic than I thought possible. I believe this will help to peacefully diffuse a lot of the confusion that seems to be growing as we are drawing closer to the November 3rd election.

A) Our "Voter Registration" opportunity can also be described as simply going to the Ohio Secretary of State Election website and confirming that you are registered. We will have a laptop in the Marian Room (and at the dining room table in the Sts. Peter & Paul rectory) and either myself or another parishioner who can step through the very simple process of verifying that you are registered and where you would vote on November 3rd. The last day to complete the voter registration/confirmation process is Monday, October 5th. To "do it yourself" go to https://olvr.ohiosos.gov.

B) The voting process itself is something we can be much less anxious about because we actually have a whole month for Early In-Person voting. See posters around the church and that we will have at the table with us during the voter registration. That's what I plan to do: one day during the month of October (yes, only once), beginning on Tuesday, October 6th, go to the Guernsey County Board of Elections Office on Wheeling Avenue in Cambridge, directly across the street from Theo's Restaurant. You would receive a ballot and go to a regular voting booth set up there just as you would at the November 3rd voting sites.

Of course, you can always go to your regular polling site on Tuesday, November 3rd, itself and vote on that day. Thank you to many parishioners who have served as poll workers. Additional poll workers/volunteers are needed for this year and if you can serve this way, call (740) 432-2680.

May we all participate in this unprecedented election, aware of the various <u>local</u> levies, candidates and issues as well. May the Lord bless us with joy and peace as disciples of Jesus and always ready for the gift of eternal life!



On October 7th, the Church celebrates the Feast day of Mary, Queen of the Holy Rosary.

The feast day was established by Pope Saint Pius V and the Church then proceeded to dedicate the entire month of October to the Holy

Rosary so that individuals, families, and communities would pray the Holy Rosary, if possible, on a daily basis.

Remember, every time you pray the rosary you are given the privilege and honor of pronouncing the holy name of Jesus more than 50 times.

The members of your local Council of Catholic Women would like to invite you to consider joining our "Living Rosary" and discover a very special way to show your love for Mary, opening your heart to her, confiding to her your sorrows and joys, and asking Mary to help you recognize and follow Jesus.

What is the Living Rosary?

The Living Rosary is a prayer group that requires a short, simple, daily commitment from the members. Parishioners form teams of five members, with each member individually praying one decade of the Rosary, so that each day the team completes a full Rosary. Each team will have one special intention for which they offer their decade in addition to prayer intentions of the members. Each member follows a calendar indicating the mystery on which to meditate as they pray their decade, which can be prayed at any time. We now have 14 teams actively participating in the Living Rosary, but recently lost a member on one of those teams. Anyone may join our Living Rosary prayer group, and it would be best for younger children to be guided by an adult or older sibling. 
