

The Chosen



Have you ever wondered what it was like to travel with Jesus as one of His disciples? Then join us for the first episode of “*The Chosen*” on **Sunday, October 17th**, from **4:30-6:00 p.m. in the Marian Room of St. Benedict Church**.

We’ll continue this eight-week season with additional viewings of the entire first season of “*The Chosen*”.

“*The Chosen*” is the first multi-season series about the life of Jesus. It offers the viewer a glimpse into what the daily and extraordinary life of Jesus Christ and His disciples might have looked like 2,000 years ago and invites the viewer into His story. Based on scripture and historical references, “*The Chosen*” makes the story of Jesus come to life.

Everyone is welcome. The episodes are in a series but they also can stand alone. So, if you can’t come to all at least stop by to see an episode.

October 17 - Episode One: “*You Are Called*”

We are introduced to Mary Magdalene, Nicodemus, Matthew and Simon (Peter) just before Jesus calls them to be His “chosen” disciples.

October 24 - Episode Two: “*Shabbat*”

Simon’s deal with the Romans goes from bad to worse and Matthew secretly meets with Roman authorities to discuss spying on Simon. Mary of Magdala (Lilith) is seen in public completely healed and her transformation stuns Nicodemus who was powerless to help her. A restored and reformed Mary nervously hosts a traditional Jewish meal with a surprise and welcome guest.





READINGS FOR THE 30TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

October 24, 2021

As we gather on this autumn day, our Gospel reading speaks to us of the gift of sight that comes to us from our faith in God. In order to better prepare ourselves to celebrate these sacred mysteries, let us search our hearts and ask God for mercy for the times we have wavered in our faith in God.

Our readings again focus on God's loving care expressed in real terms. In the reading from Jeremiah, he tells his people of the good news of their release from exile in Babylon. It is cause for joy and praise, especially for the blind, the crippled, those who are lost; all those who are weak. They will rejoice in God's loving intervention.

Jesus expresses this help for the blind in his healing of Bartimaeus. This story reveals its theme of ultimate salvation in the words,

*"Teacher, I want to see!"
"You are healed, because you believe in me."*



An interesting image in both the first reading and the Gospel is the road. Jeremiah tells us that God promised a straight road on which no one would stumble and fall. Mark tells us that Bartimaeus called out for pity as he was sitting by the side of the road. When he receives his sight, he immediately follows Jesus on the road—a biblical symbol for the way to salvation.

Jeremiah 31:7-9

I will lead them to brooks of water, on a level road, so that none shall stumble.

What in my life is a "stumbling block" to my salvation?

Hebrews 5:1-6

You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek.

How do I witness my redemption in Christ Jesus?

Mark 10:46-52

Go on your way: your faith has saved you.

How strong is my trust and faith in the healing power of Jesus?

This week's readings (for Sunday, Oct. 17th) and next week's readings (for Sunday, Oct. 24th) make an interesting combination.

This week considers the reality of suffering. The kind of suffering into which the Lord asks us to enter is not a meaningless suffering. Rather, it is the suffering related to servant leadership. "Whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all" (Mark 10:44). And, the prophet Isaiah envisions the Messiah as one who embraces sufferings for the sake of lifting up and saving others: "through his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear" (Isaiah 53:11).

Next week, especially in the 1st Reading and the Gospel, the readings invite us to rejoice in various forms of healing and restoration. We will read about healing and restoration not only for individuals but also for whole communities.

In the Gospel we read about a blind man named "Bartimaeus." Bartimaeus represents not only each of us individually and the kind of faith God wants us to

experience growing in our hearts, but also us as a community with steadfast faith and a deeper vision.

Bartimaeus was someone who needed to beg for assistance. Likely there were many others like him whose life situation had reduced them to this state. Evidently his family was not able to care for him. His family was known so that people called him the son ("Bar") of Timaeus. And, he evidently had to sit by the roadside to beg; presumably this is something he had to do regularly.

However, again, even though he was in this dire state of dependency on the generosity of others for physical sustenance, his faith in Jesus had grown. Even though he could not see Jesus physically, he was able to recognize that Jesus had the power to heal and restore. He could already see that Jesus had the authority that the Messiah would have. And this faith was a determined faith that could withstand people telling him to be quiet. In fact, the more people told him to be quiet, the more he kept calling out. When his pleading resulted in an opportunity to meet with Jesus, he sprang up enthusiastically. Once healed physically, he follows Jesus on the way. He represents the Church as the restored People of God, following Jesus on the way to eternal life.

This can be seen as a fulfillment of the prophecy cited from Jeremiah 31:7-9. This is a prophecy of restoration of the tribes of Israel after their exile, which was just beginning as Jeremiah was writing this prophecy. This gave the community great hope during their exile: "They departed in tears, but I will again restore them" (v. 9).

May we experience this same gift of faith in our Lord Jesus Christ growing stronger each day, both as a community and as individual disciples.

Pastor's Letter

Next weekend is World Mission Sunday (October 24th). Each year we observe this to help us keep our connection both with Catholics throughout the world, especially those who need our outreach assistance, and with people throughout the world (both local and beyond) who have not yet truly heard the Gospel or who have not yet begun to know new life in Jesus.

Related to this, Pope Francis has asked that his Papal Intention for this month of October 2021 be that each one of us may be "missionary disciples." In other words, Pope Francis has asked that "every baptized person may be engaged in evangelization, available to the mission, by being witnesses of a life that has the flavor of the Gospel."

One way we have done this as a parish is through our growing friendship and connection with St. Elizabeth Parish in Caracol, Haiti. This week their pastor, Fr. Pierre Piquon, sent an email update of the situation in Haiti in general and in Caracol in particular.

On one hand, Caracol seems to be a bit of a haven along the north coast of Haiti. The number of COVID cases is low enough that they have continued to have Mass and other church activities. On the other hand, they still live with day-to-day uncertainty. For example, St. Elisabeth School has not yet been able to re-start their cafeteria for this school year. And one of Fr. Pierre's friends from seminary, Fr. Andre Sylvestre, was killed by bandits on motorcycles who tried to rob him as he came out of a bank in the nearby city of Cap-Haitien. So, the gang violence throughout Haiti has been keeping them on edge as well. Please keep them in prayer as they keep us in their prayers.

I'm looking forward to resuming the Holy Hikers next Sunday, October 24th. To keep it simple, I'd like to return to a trail we hiked in May, the Salt Fork State Park Kennedy Stone House trail. This will provide the opportunity to compare that trail's fall scenery with its springtime scenery. I plan to leave from the Gomber Avenue parking lot at 2:30 p.m. and meet at the Kennedy Stone House Trail parking lot at 3:00 p.m. This should be

about an hour-long hike so that I can return for Episode 2 of The Chosen that afternoon!

Thank you to all who are supporting St. Benedict School through the upcoming Reverse Raffle. Sr. Sharon has supplied me with a full page of new jokes for during the raffle. And our St. Benedict School students have also contributed quite a few good jokes. We will try to live-stream the drawing that evening of November 7th.

May Our Lord Jesus Christ help us to experience the transforming power of His mercy as He helps us to be always ready for the gift of eternal life in Heaven!

Devotional for Day 26, Sunday, October 17

Scripture: These all wait for you, that you may give them their food in due season, what you give them they gather in; you open your hand they are filled with good. You hide your face, they are troubled; you take away their breath, they die and return to their dust. You send forth your Spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the earth. — Psalm 104:27-30
