QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading

Although initially reluctant to be one of God's prophets, Jonah was ultimately successful in getting the Ninevites to repent of their sins. When do you find yourself resisting God's will?

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It was a normal day by all accounts, but John just wasn't feeling himself. He was a little lightheaded and out of sorts. Later in the afternoon, he experienced a sharp pain in his chest and arm. Quick thinking and action brought John to the emergency department with a diagnosis of a significant heart attack. Surviving this ordeal, he found himself face to face with his cardiologist, having an honest conversation about things that needed to change. "I came close to death," John found himself thinking. Then came the remorse. He was a young man with a loving wife and children who were very close to facing life without him. John found himself with intense sorrow for living an unchecked and self-indulgent life that almost brought him to his demise. He wanted to change.

We all have our wake-up calls. We have experiences and encounters that force us to really think twice about choices we have made and directions we have taken. Often, we find ourselves looking at those we have hurt square in the eye and wallowing in our foolishness. We regrettably realize that we have allowed our needs to lure us into making some cruel mistakes. We impulsively say things and flippantly do things that reveal our unredeemed and unhealed self. It is a self we stumble over and try to tame but can't quite seem to master and control. Help!

We spin our wheels, naively thinking that we will somehow, perhaps through persistence, get ourselves unstuck. But, we don't. We just get out of the car, feeling very helpless, and ignorantly look at the mess we got ourselves into. Did we ever think to ask someone for help? Or, taken the advice of One who is wiser and avoid this route altogether? "Come after me," are words that Jesus says to all of us. In order to heed his invitation, we must leave our ego-self behind and follow.

When we really see and understand the freedom, peace, justice, and love he offers, we find ourselves with such sorrow in our hearts for how foolish and silly we have been. All the misguided choices and sinful actions come full view and we see how risky our random impassioned behaviors really have been. Repentance is beautiful. When done with a sincere and contrite heart, it directs us to the glory that can be ours, ignites us with the challenge of living a life in service of others and reminds us that all is well.

WITNESS TO HOPE UPDATE

Hello fellow parishioners. I hope your holidays were enjoyable and safe. It's been quite a while now since you got a look at our Witness to Hope campaigns so let's take a peek.

Our most recent figures thru 12.30.20 are as follows:

St's. C & C \$43,125
St. J's \$276,368

Please note that Bunker Hill has already withdrawn some of its WTH money to fund the items they're steering committee listed in its original WTH plan. There's been no withdrawals to date in St. J's account. Recall that the St. J's steering committee determined that improvements to Cave Hall and the kitchen would be the project funded by the Mason WTH. To date the Cave Hall/kitchen plans are proceeding but, with the building-use restrictions currently in place for Covid-19, the start of actual construction is pending better pandemic control.

Meanwhile, also note that we're less than one year away from the five year maturity/conclusion date for the Bunker Hill and Mason WTH campaigns. By theory and design all of our pledges should be completed by December of 2021. However, the Diocese will leave our two WTH accounts open thru December of 2022 for those wishing to contribute after the maturity date.

We can all be very satisfied with our combined WTH efforts here in Leslie and Mason over the past four years. Just in southern Ingham County we've raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for the church-at-large which is being used at our Catholic schools, in Diocese outreach programs, for Cathedral improvements, seminarians, and in support of retired clergy: to name a few. You've also raised a similar amount which stays local: the results of which will be evident on our two sites for decades to come.

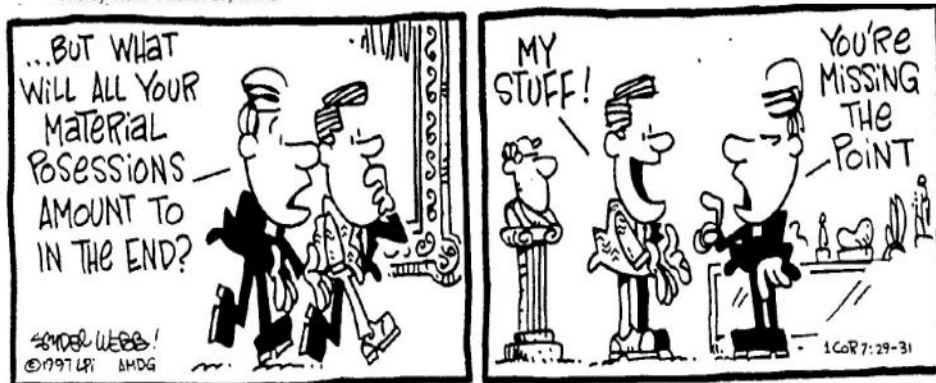
I don't know about you, but if my kids left me on a hot summer day to finish the lawn by myself, I wouldn't be too happy.

He simply went back to mending his nets, I imagine.

Zebedee already understood what St. Teresa of Calcutta would say millennia later: "Give until it hurts."

"You're wasting my time." "I've done so much for her; she owes me this." How often do we think things, and even people and relationships, belong to us? The truth is none of them do. We must be ready, as Zebedee was, to surrender them to God when He comes walking past.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

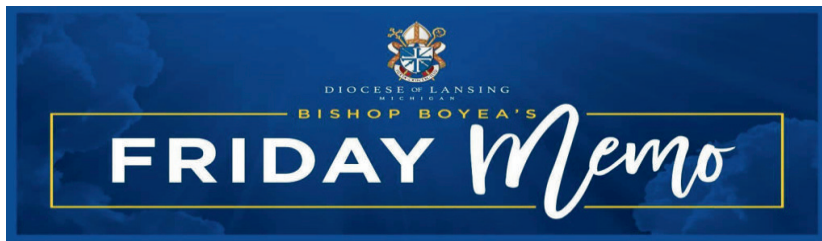
Question:

Question: Do Catholics always need to receive communion in wafer form, or can it be different kinds of bread?

Answer:

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the most common form for the eucharistic bread is the small white communion "wafer" that is a ubiquitous part of the Catholic Mass. The instructions of the Church have been very specific regarding the make-up of the bread used in the Mass: "The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made ... it follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament" (see *Redemptionis Sacramentum* by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, no. 48). The Church's tradition of using a wheat-based bread is based on the bread that Jesus would have used at the Last Supper and is considered to be an essential part of the "matter" of the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

As we consider the question of whether a "wafer" — which is properly called a "host" — should be used, we also must keep in mind that in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, leavened (i.e. "raised") bread is more often used. And so, while the thin, white "wafer" is most commonly used in the Roman Rite of the Church, the full expression of the Catholic tradition does allow for a more substantial form of bread to be used, but the tradition of using a simple wheat bread with no other additions or additives is considered essential.

Dear Friend,

In a speech in Cape Town in June 1966, Bobby Kennedy famously asserted: "There is a Chinese curse which says 'May he live in interesting times'. Like it or not we live in interesting times."

It has since emerged that no such Chinese curse exists but as apocryphal ancient Oriental aphorisms go, there can be few more apt for the times in which we now find ourselves. These are, indeed, "interesting times" and for many of us they can instill in us both fear and anxiety. In the midst of the storm, therefore, to what or to whom should we turn? I would, of course, answer Jesus Christ, God made man, and with good reason. Let me explain.

In the Gospel passage quoted above, Saint John both accurately and deliberately depicts Jesus as the new Moses who is now bringing his fearful followers safely across the waters as did Moses in the Book of Exodus. It is one of the seven signs in the Gospel of John that are meant to point to Jesus himself as eternal life and thus seeking faith in those around him.

The ending of this fifth sign in John's Gospel seems a bit confusing, however: "They wanted to take him into the boat, but the boat immediately arrived at the shore to which they were heading" (John 6:21). Where the previous sign had Jesus present himself as a prophet after the multiplication of the loaves, now we see that he is more than a prophet. His very words to the apostles: "It is I. Do not be afraid" (John 6:19) are literally, "I am. Do not be afraid." These words bring to our minds the words of God to Moses, "I am who am" (Exodus 3:14).

Jesus had fled to the mountain after the gift of bread because he did not believe that the people understood what had happened. He thought they might try to make him a king and that was the last thing that he wanted. Perhaps Jesus knew that even his disciples were misunderstanding his mission. And so, there is this mysterious, fear-inducing presence before them as they faced a strong wind on the sea. Things are not to be as they expect. And then miraculously, they are at the shore.

Soon after this Jesus will give his famous discourse on the Bread of Life at the end of which many will leave him. Simon Peter then commits the band to Jesus: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God" (John 6:68-69).

Sisters and brothers, God in our midst can be a bit scary. The only way to overcome this is to believe that his presence is for our good. It is most likely never in a way that we would expect or want and thus calls for us to have complete trust in him. That is why we need not fear. That is why we should not be anxious. We may at times want a king, but Jesus knows what is truly best for us and we have to be convinced that he is the Holy One of God.
