
You must be born from above.

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God.

"And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God."

John 3: 14 -21

Nicodemus comes to Jesus at night to seek a better understanding of some of the ideas Jesus has talked about with the people.. Nicodemus takes a literal understanding of his ideas, and Jesus responds with a more spiritual approach. An important point he makes is the need to be born again of water and the



Spirit.. Nicodemus has trouble understanding that rebirth is not literal physical birth, but a kind of renewal of one's being. Jesus then turns to a story of Moses dealing with the people of God as they return to the chosen land of Israel. Their complaining results in visits of serpents that inflict fatal bites, causing the people to complain about the serpents. God tells Moses to create an image of the serpent which becomes the cure for the fatal bites. The people stop complaining.

If you come for Communion only, line up from A-Z on the sidewalk between the church and the Nazareth Center. Keep social distance as indicated on the sidewalk by the blue letters and hash marks.

Enter through the far, right door and exit by the opposite door. There are two communion stations inside.

<u>CONFESSION</u>: Saturday 2:00–3:00 pm Mask required. Wait outside. Only one penitent enters church at a time. Confession heard at the glass door with the sign: CONFESS HERE.

Dress for the weather & stay warm.

Nicodemus is an interesting character in John's gospel. He struggles with his faith life, and is impressed by Jesus as a teacher and as a spiritual icon. He wants to learn more.

Because Nicodemus has had questions after hearing Jesus speak, or even after observing him with the crowds, he comes at night to have a conversation with him. The questions he raises indicate he has been thinking about the implications they raise for his faith life. It may even seem to him that they may be beyond his ability to accomplish them,

Jesus is patient with his questions, realizing that Nicodemus may be at a place where understanding the spiritual nature of his comments is too much to expect.

In the story of the ordeal of the People of God as they return home, they do continue to complain and challenge God. A result of this is the introduction of serpents whose bites are fatal.

God has a solution to the fatal serpents. He tells Moses to create a bronze image of the fatal serpent and make it easily seen by the victims of the bites. Moses is to mount it on a pole and tell the people to look upon the image of the deadly creature. They will then be cured of the harm and survive. Moses tells the people to look at the thing that they experience as deadly, and it becomes the source of relief. They are to look at what is causing their deaths, and they will be saved.

Jesus then explains that he will be crucified, lifted up on the cross, and one who looks upon him in faith will be saved. This is probably the most dear of all quotations from the Gospel of John. One can rest on these words in prayer, and experience the tender love of Jesus for each of us.

GOSPEL FOR MARCH 21

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. 'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say-"Father, save me from this hour"? No. it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgement of this world: now the ruler of this world will be driven out. 
