EASTER SUNDAY + APRIL 12, 2020

FIRST READING—Acts 10:34A, 37-43

Peter proceeded to speak and said: "You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

RESPONSORIAL—Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23

Response: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his mercy endures forever. Let the house of Israel say, "His mercy endures forever." (R)

SECOND READING—I Corinthians 5:6B-8

Brothers and sisters:

Do you not know that a little yeast leavens all the dough? Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough, inasmuch as you are unleavened. For our paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed. Therefore, let us celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

GOSPEL—John 20:1-9

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.





irst came ashes. Then came Fish Fries. Then Lenten liturgies...Then came *Corona Time!*

Even Easter—the greatest day of the history of the world and of our Church—is apparently affected by *Corona Time*. Is it possible to celebrate Easter without the big family brunches, without the typical flowers and yes, without bunches of kids finding bundles of chocolate eggs?

Well, the First Easter was a lot like this Easter! The first followers of Christ were sheltering-in, locked up seemingly like us, only able to go out (as I imagine Doubting Thomas did) for the bare necessities. The feeling of being locked up is the feeling of humanity without Jesus' Resurrection... Loneliness coupled with hopelessness settles in when despair is accepted, as the disciples did without the Savior's Resurrection... The darkness of a deadly virus that kills in suffocating ways is like our souls without the life of Christ's Resurrection.

COVID-19 supplies us a metaphor for the devil's tactics like Darth Vader supplies the breath of the Dark Side in Star Wars. We are at war against a virus, but more importantly the devil is at war with us. Imagine if we continued to proceed and ignore the Coronavirus: Gather in groupings like always; show up to our crowded schools; attend populated events. The dark side of the devil works best when we doubt his presence. Perhaps he deceives us so he can manipulate us into thinking it's all right to fall into a type of COVID-666 way of sin.

The Church presents Peter preaching his first homily weeks after the Resurrection: "Jesus went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil...They put (Jesus) to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead."


SAYOR THE DIVINE LOVE

For He is truly Here in our Great Parish Grouping churches, and yes, our homes. Never will we forget 2020 Easter for the extraordinary world-wide crisis. But also let us allow Jesus to rise in the dark corners of our crisis and unleash the light of his Easterhope that this virus will not have the final word because this reality story ends happily and holier ever after in Heaven. 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FOOD PANTRY

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e are all in shock over the present unexpected situation. None of us could ever have dreamed that attending Holy Mass and receiving Holy Communion would become DANGEROUS overnight. And yet, here we are watching another Sunday Mass on television or online.

This isn't the first time in history that Catholics were unable to safely attend Holy Mass. From his isolated cabin in the middle of the forest, hiding from the Gestapo during World War II, Blessed Michael Sopoćko, (Sr. Faustina's spiritual director) wrote the following words, which are quite relevant to us today:

"At present, many people are deprived of Holy Communion [...] Still, they can enjoy the blissful effects [of Sacramental Communion] by receiving Spiritual Communion. Spiritual Communion is an ardent desire to receive the Lord Jesus which stems from the love filling one's heart. This Communion of desire is extremely beneficial for the soul, because it inspires an attraction to the things of God and to living a more perfect life; it gives strength for practicing virtue; and sometimes it even brings more benefits than a Sacramental Communion received with less love. It has another advantage: it can be received even several times a day and at any time of the day or night, in any place, not only in a church or chapel, but also at home during chores, but particularly during visits to the Blessed Sacrament."

Let's take heart, then, remembering that when we take seriously the practice of Spiritual Communion, so does Our Lord! He can't wait for us to invite Him in! Let us do so often and with great love. May Spiritual Communion become a significant part of our daily prayer routine as we try to draw close to the Lord as often as possible.


SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

ACCORDING TO BLESSED MICHAEL SOPOĆKO, WE CAN RECEIVE SPIRITUAL COMMUNION AS FOLLOWS:

- 1) In the given moment we focus on/place ourselves spiritually before a tabernacle or monstrance containing the Blessed Sacrament.
- 2) We raise up to God acts of faith, hope, love, contrition, worship and desire.
- 3) We imagine that a priest is giving us the Blessed Sacrament.
- 4) We receive spiritually with great humility and reverence and with a trustful love, and afterward we spend time in thanksgiving—the same as after a Sacramental Communion.





've often heard people who leave the Catholic Church rave about this great practice they discovered at another church: tithing. I think it's funny, perhaps in a tragic way, because we have the same spiritual practice in the Catholic Church. We call it stewardship. Unfortunately everyone—me included—gets uncomfortable when we hear it's time for the stewardship campaign. That's probably part of why we miss out on this great practice.

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
