t's Advent! We consider the many comings of Christ—the First Coming (the first Christmas), the Second Coming, the encounters with him each day, and much later in the Advent season the coming at the Feast of Christmas itself. In the old days, Advent was a solemn time, quite similar to Lent in that there was fasting and penance in preparation for Christmas. Christmas itself was not observed or celebrated in the home until Christmas Eve. It was then that the tree was lit and/or decorated, that the figure of the Infant Jesus was placed in the crèche, and that the merriment truly began. The song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" tells us quite correctly that Christmas is a season in itself (quite distinct from Advent) about twelve days long until Epiphany, which concluded the grand celebration on January 6 in the old liturgical calendar.

How our society has changed! Our so-called "Christmas" now begins well before Thanksgiving with music, trees, and parties included. "Christmas" ends on the 26th of December with the removal of the tree, the same time that the "after Christmas" sales begin in our stores. Unfortunately, we have lost our perspective on the observance of Christmas as a Season. And just as unfortunately, we have lost the true meaning of Advent Season. Although there is a place for Christmas greeting cards, shopping, and decorating during Advent as legitimate preparation, it seems that a large gap has grown between Advent and Christmas as the Church celebrates the seasons versus social celebration and commercial enterprise.

A few practical suggestions to consider:

- Celebrate Advent by having an Advent wreath around the table. Light the candles before your main meal with a prayer as simple as "Come, Lord Jesus!"
- Try using a special Advent calendar that not only gives the number of days until Christmas, but also a short verse of scripture or a thought for the day.
- 3. Go out and buy a **Christmas present for someone less fortunate** than yourself and put it under a "Giving Tree" or a "Toys for Tots" bin as an Advent sacrifice.
- Spend a few moments each day with the Lord, recognizing your need for a Savior. Try reading the Bible readings for the daily Liturgy. Try meditating. Try another spiritual exercise you haven't yet tried.
- 5. Fast from "premature Christmas." Wait until Christmas Eve to light the tree or put Christ in the manger.
- If you want a tree up during Advent, decorate it with symbols from the Old Testament prophecies (Jesse tree).
- 7. Save your Christmas parties for the "Twelve Days."

Welcoming People with Disabilities into Your Parish, Part 2

People First Language

People first language is used to speak appropriately and respectfully about an individual with a disability. People first language emphasizes the person first not the disability. When referring to a person with a disability, refer to the person first by using phrases such as: "a person who ...", "a person with ..." or, "a person who has ..." Here are some suggestions on how to communicate with and about people with disabilities. **Sav...**

- Person with a disability rather than disabled person
- Person with an intellectual, cognitive, developmental disability
- Person with an emotional or behavioral disability
- Person who is hard of hearing
- · Person who uses a wheelchair
- · Person with a physical disability
- Person with epilepsy or seizure disorder, and
- Person with cerebral palsy.

Finally, avoid negative, disempowering words like "victim" or "sufferer" with any type of disability; for example, say "person with multiple sclerosis" instead of "multiple sclerosis victim" or "person who suffers from multiple sclerosis."
