FIRST WEEK OF ADVENT

Advent is designed to prepare us for the second coming of Christ – not to prepare us to welcome a little baby, but to allow the fullness of Christ to take up His dwelling within us. How do we do that? How do we prepare ourselves for that? The Liturgy Committee was particularly taken with the image of the manger. The manger was the vessel that received the infant Christ, and we are the vessels that will receive the fullness of Christ. Our Scriptures for Advent call us to be more attentive to our interior life and the world around us. Each week we will use the Scriptures to find encouragement for this work of our faith life.

First Week

The image of transforming our swords (instruments of destruction) into plowshares (instruments that bring life) teaches us to be malleable; to be less rigid. We are invited to do the actual work of transforming the destructive thing within us to something that will give life. The Gospel, which calls us to be prepared for the end times, doesn't necessarily sound encouraging, but it is. It motivates us to do the interior work that we are called to do in order to receive the Christ.

FROM THE BOOK OF ANN MARIE

Dear Parish Family,

I love Thanksgiving. I hope you had a good day or weekend with family and/or friends. Thanksgiving is the only holiday that my brother comes home for, so it is an important one in my family. He has been running the Turkey Trot every year since he was 17. He is 53 now. I would love to think that it is the love of his family that draws him home each November, but honestly it is his competitive nature that won't let him end his continuous run of this

Thanksgiving tradition in Buffalo. I am not complaining!

The Turkey Trot has become a family tradition in my house. In the early days, my dad would drive my brother and his friend Matt to the starting line, and Matt's dad would go and pick them up. After a while, we began going down to the finish line to cheer them on. When my brother got engaged to his wife, he announced it to all of us by running by with a sign that said "Paula, will you marry me?" He then kissed Paula and kept running, wanting to make a fairly good time. Poor Paula was left with her soon-to-be in-laws to tell us that they had gotten engaged a few weeks previously and to pull out the ring and show it to us. After children were born into the family, they too came down to the finish line to cheer on Jim and Matt. Matt blew out his knee about ten years ago, so his run of continuous races ended, but he usually still came to the finish line and most recently began walking it with his children. Eventually, my sister started running as well, so I took care of her kids so she could run. Then two of my nieces became old enough to run (although they really walk) as well, so I was in charge of my niece Eliza, who is much more of a cheerer than a runner. Four years ago, my parents (both on blood thinners) almost froze at the finish line waiting for the runners/walkers in our family to finish. When it came time to register for the Turkey Trot three years ago, I decided it was time to join in the fun (as a walker!). My parents no longer come down to the finish line, but Dad still drives us over to the start of the race. My youngest niece is in college now and won't be able to join us this year, but my friend Theresa is joining me for the first time.

This whole long history of my family's participation in the Turkey Trot speaks to me of how family traditions go. I could easily say that our Thanksgiving tradition, for the past 36 years, includes the Turkey Trot. That would be a simple and true statement. "We always do the Turkey Trot!" would also be true. But in saying that, it wouldn't acknowledge the way that this tradition has ebbed and flowed through the years. It wouldn't give you a true sense of how it has changed. It wouldn't acknowledge that I feel really guilty leaving my parents at home on Thanksgiving morning, after so many years of them being a part of the "cheering section." There was this great "I hope they can do it" when my nieces first started participating in the Trot, but now they are adults, so that sense of pride is replaced with friendship on the Trot journey.

Traditions are wonderful, and I am a big fan of keeping things as they are. What I have learned over the years, of course, is that keeping things the same is absolutely impossible. Every year we are older. Every year we are faced with new opportunities and challenges within those same traditions. As we head into the Christmas holidays, it might be the year that some of your kids can help with cookie making, maybe even taking the cookies in and out of the oven. But is also might be true that your Mom (grandmother to those same kids) can't roll out the dough like she used to. The tree might be smaller this year since there are fewer people coming to the house for the holidays, or it may be that this is the first year in a new house and a big, beautiful tree is needed for your new space. You may have lost someone you love dearly this past year and the holidays don't make a lot of sense without them and you are trying to decide what you even want to do to acknowledge the holidays without really celebrating them. The trick, I am finding, is to remember what is most important to me, and then try to make the traditions (new ones or old ones) fit that goal. I don't want to do the tradition anymore if it doesn't fit or work, but I am happy to adapt, change, and amend the traditions to keep them alive and growing.

As we enter into the holiday season, I invite you to be careful about how much you take on in service of traditions. I invite you to ask your family or friends if the "way we have always done it" is still working for them, or how it could change to be better. If you don't have a lot of traditions, this year might be an opportunity to start something that can ebb and flow through the years. My goal is to always make sure the tradition doesn't "wag the dog." Good luck with all of this!


