

As we continue to navigate through this challenging time, we are pleased to be able to say that things are beginning to open up here at the parish, although in a limited way. We are happy to communicate the following:

WEEKEND MASSES ARE CELEBRATED AT 5PM ON SATURDAYS

AND 9AM AND 11AM ON SUNDAYS. You must register to attend these Masses weekly through our parish website beginning each Wednesday morning at 9am. The program will stop accepting reservations on Friday at 3pm (or sooner if it reaches a maximum of 80 people for that particular Mass). Ushers will check your registrations at the door before entering the church and will seat you. The pews in the church are marked off to maintain social distancing.

WEEKEND MASSES WILL NOW BE LIVE STREAMED ON YOUTUBE AT 5PM AND 11AM —LINK AVAILABLE FROM OUR

WEBSITE. If you click on the Mass and it has already begun, you will have the ability on *YouTube* to rewind the Mass to the beginning while it is in progress. Don't worry if you are unable to rewind — the Mass in its entirety will also be available immediately after its conclusion. Live streaming will allow you to attend Mass at home simultaneously with your fellow parishioners in the church, and with much clearer video and sound than we have been able to offer in the past.

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION IS OFFERED ON SATURDAYS AT 4PM IN THE CHURCH. Unfortunately due to limited seating, you cannot remain for the 5pm Mass after Reconciliation if you have not reserved a seat ahead of time.

WEEKDAY MORNING MASSES ARE CELEBRATED ON MONDAYS, TUESDAYS, THURSDAYS AND FRIDAYS AT 8:30AM IN THE CHURCH. You do not need to register for these Masses.

As we continue to navigate the public celebration of Mass within State Guidelines, St. Sylvester Parish will offer Mass on Saturdays at 5PM and Sundays at 9AM & 11AM. Please note the following important information:

- At this time, the bishop still dispenses all the faithful from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass and Holy Days of Obligation.
- Our Sunday worship will be livestreamed on Saturdays at 5pm and Sundays at 11am and will continue to be posted on the website for those who are vulnerable, for those who have a health impairment that would make them more susceptible to serious illness, for those who might not be feeling well, or have a fever, and for those who are caretakers for other people who are vulnerable. If you are in any of these situations, you are encouraged to continue to remain at home and worship online.
- Restrooms will be open for emergency use only! Please use bathroom at home!
- There is a mandatory online reservation system for all who wish to attend Mass. Please register beginning Wednesdays at 9am by going to www.stsylvesterli.org
- Please print out your registration information or have available on your phone as you will be asked to show your registration before entering the church.
- Masks or other face coverings must be worn by all participants.
- Please arrive 15 minutes before Mass so your reservation may be confirmed and you may be shown to your seat. Capacity at this time is limited to 25%.
- Seating will be done according to social distancing guidelines. You will most likely not be sitting in your "usual" seat. Families may sit together at Mass. There is no "saving seats" or asking to be seated in a particular seat.
- The Offertory procession and passing of the donation basket will be omitted.
- If you wish to make a contribution, there will be baskets at the entrance and exit. Contributions may also dropped at the parish center or made online.
- The Sign of Peace or other greetings will not be exchanged.
- Directions will be given for Communion, which will be distributed after Mass as you are leaving the church. Please follow the directions of the ushers.
- Please go directly to your car, as no congregating is permitted.
- We will continue to keep you updated on changes as we move forward.

This is a work in progress, so as we move forward there may be changes. We appreciate your patience and want you to know that our first priority is that those attending Mass will be safe.

Revised & Simplified Faith Formation Program 2020-2021!

Dear Parents/Guardians and Catechists,

We have revised and simplified the St. Sylvester Faith Formation Program so that it will be more manageable and yet still meaningful for all involved, Catechists, students, and their families.

As school districts are moving forward with plans for the school year, it has become clear to us that parents and students may be challenged by the newness of what lies ahead. This combined with parents changing work situations has caused us to take another look at the Faith Formation Program we are offering and how we can be more accommodating to all.

If you have already registered your child, we hope this will make life a little easier. If you have not yet registered your child, the hope here is that with this more accommodating schedule, you will now reconsider registering them.

Here is the revised and simplified Faith Formation Program for 2020-2021 Year for Levels 1 through 7!

- Arrangements will be made for a pickup of the materials (books, calendar, etc.) needed for each of your children so they can work from home.
- There will be 4 virtual meetings on the Zoom platform, for the year, that we ask students to try their best to attend (with the help of a parent). So, for example, if you registered your child for a Level 5 class on Mondays at 4:30 p.m., your child's class will be held four (4) times virtually on 4 specific Mondays at 4:30 p.m. according to the Level 5 Calendar. If you registered your child for Level 3, 4 or 5 Home Taught the virtual; meetings will be held on Saturdays according to the Home Taught Level 3, 4 or 5 calendars. Level 1 will be Home Taught and have four (4) virtual meetings on specific Saturdays according to the Level 1 calendar.
- ♦ The calendar will not begin until Monday, November 30, 2020 to give everyone time to adjust to the school schedules, etc. and will end in May.
- ♦ Parents with children who have special needs!

 Parents, for students who are in the Individualized Faith Formation Program or whose needs would make it difficult to stay focused virtually, we will work directly and individually with you to accommodate your child's needs. Please go ahead and register your child for the next Level in the Individualized Faith Formation Program. If you have questions, please email faithformation@stsylvesterli.org

Stewardship of the Environment Care For Our Common Home

One of the first TV public service advertisement that I remember from my childhood was that of the Native American with the tear running down his cheek lamenting all of the litter around him. The memorable tagline, "People start pollution. People can stop it." was meant as a wake-up call to make viewers feel responsible for our polluted environment. The ad, which debuted on Earth Day in 1971, is still ranked as one of the best commercials of all time, but its impact wasn't enough to even begin to solve the serious environmental issues facing our world today.


Taking care of the earth and all of the creatures in it has been our God-given responsibility since its creation, and encompasses all three components of Stewardship — time, talent and treasure. How we live our lives is intricately connected to the health and future viability of our planet. As Pope Francis writes in his encyclical Laudato Si', "All of us can cooperate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements and talents. (Paragraph 14)."

Respecting and caring for the earth becomes increasingly difficult in our disposable society. Disposable bags, plastic bottles and even clothing and furniture are considered modern "conveniences" but they continue to contribute to the deterioration of our world. These time-savers were developed without thinking of the consequences to our actions. Where does all of this "stuff" go when we are done with it (not to mention the air and water pollution it creates) and what role does poverty play in how all these disposable "wonders" are made?

The discarded "stuff" goes into landfills already near capacity, in addition to our oceans and our air. There is also a human cost — many of these items, especially clothing, are made by the world's most impoverished citizens, who are exploited and forced to work under dangerous conditions for meager pay.

As Christians trying to live a "Stewardship Way of Life," we must increase our awareness about these issues and work to improve or eliminate them. For example, just using a reusable water bottle or installing a water filter on your sink can make a huge difference. Did

you know that Americans throw away 60 million plastic water bottles each day and that 80% of those end up in landfills? There is currently two million tons of discarded water bottles in landfills and each bottle takes 1,000 years to decompose. If that wasn't enough, it takes 17 million barrels of oil a year



to produce these bottles which could fill one million cars with fuel.

Recycling is important and takes dedication. Nobody wants to spend time rinsing out their plastics to put them in a recycle can or separating all their cardboard and paper, but every little bit helps. Here at the church we have a separate dumpster for recyclable cardboard and paper and return plastic bottles and cans for deposit. Our thrift shop also ensures that clothing in good condition is re-used and our Garden Club Ministry helps to take care of the parish's grounds. As faithful stewards, God has entrusted the care of the earth to us and we all must do our part to preserve the magnificent gift of the earth that God has given us for future generations.

Finally, as compassionate stewards, we are called to improve the lives of the poor and exploited throughout the world through advocacy and financial assistance. How? For starters, try to purchase items marked "fair trade" whenever possible as this label indicates that the workers who brought this product to you are being treated with dignity and paid fairly for their labor. If we all do just a little bit in our respective corners of the world, the change will be remarkable! ~ Lori Zito

Planning your holiday season will assist in reducing your level of stress. Having some plan is better than no plan at all. You cannot ignore the holidays; they are just as real as your grief and they are going to happen. You cannot wish them away, you cannot sleep them away and you cannot ignore them. The following is a brief overview of some of the thoughts we shared in our "Grieving Through The Holiday Seminar."

First and foremost Christmas is a reminder of our Lord's love and grace

Make time to attend spiritual holiday activities

Maintain a journal of God's blessings at this season

Realize your holidays will never be the same, they will be difficult

Expect your emotional grief to become more amplified at this time

It is okay to feel sad and miss your loved one

Decide ahead of time where to spend the holidays, have a plan

Communicate ahead of time with family/friends you plan to be with

Remember that other family and friends may be grieving also

Be honest in telling others what you do or do not want to do

Allow others to minister to you - and you to them

Remember that it is okay to seek professional counseling

Journal your holiday thoughts, ideas, wishes and events

Don't feel guilty if you feel like you need to leave a festivity

Have some form of plan so if need be you can excuse yourself from the activity

Be sensitive to your own feelings of "holiday overload", eliminate some activities

Do not allow others to tell you how to spend your holidays

Determine what traditions you want to keep, what to change, develop new traditions

The holidays can be hectic, especially in your grief, allow yourself "quiet times"
