Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Each year, the Church in the United States observes January 22 as a Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children. January 22 marks the anniversary of the ruling on Roe v. Wade, the Supreme Court case which struck down many state and federal laws prohibiting abortion, in effect legalizing abortion in the United States. The case was decided in 1973.

*In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, #373).*

Note that this is a day of **prayer** and of **penance**. This day should have a penitential character or feel in our lives, similar to that of Ash Wednesday or Good Friday. It is a day of mourning and sadness. It is a day to pause and to consider what happened on this day in 1973 and what has happened since. Over 60 million lives have been lost through abortion since 1973.

How might you observe this day in your families? The traditional penitential practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving would be appropriate. We offer prayers to God asking for the Holy Spirit to change hearts in our nation on this issue, and we also offer penances as expressions of our sorrow for those who have been harmed (parents, family members, survivors) and for those who have died. Penance costs us something. It would be a good day to do some prayerful research on this uncomfortable topic and to talk about it with our children and grandchildren.

I would also offer a gentle reminder. Many people who have an abortion do so out of fear. They deeply regret it later. They experience great shame, guilt, and pain. As a priest, I have witnessed their pain and remorse, and I cringe when I hear someone speak in a judgmental manner about “people who have had an abortion.” If they only knew they were speaking about their friend standing right next to them, they would have said it differently. There is a difference between condemning the sin of abortion and condemning a person who has had an abortion.

If abortion has touched your life, I invite you to make an appointment to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation and to experience God’s love and mercy. *You are not the sum of your sins and failings. You are the sum of the Father’s love for you* (St. John Paul II). You are a beloved son or daughter of God. Healing is possible. God desires it for you. Come to Him.


## 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

### **Christ Is Anything but Ordinary**

We're about to dive headlong into week two of Ordinary Time, and we need to admit, after the hustle and bustle of the holidays, things are indeed looking more ... ordinary, at least in our spiritual lives.

The transcendent highs of the Christmas season are flatlining a bit and the vivid imagery of the Nativity scene has faded. The solemn anticipation of the Advent season is by now a distant memory.

Are you bored yet? Here's a secret: I think that Ordinary Time can actually be quite extraordinary, if we're really living out our baptismal call.

In today's Gospel, Jesus point-blank asks Andrew, who is following him after hearing John the Baptist's testimony: "What are you looking for?" He's asking us the same question.

What are you looking for? Why are you following me? Is it for the Christmas cookies and the Advent carols? Is it for the King's Cake on the Epiphany? Is it for the feeling we get on Christmas when we just know God has done a wondrous thing?

# The Year of St. Joseph

## Benefits of Turning to Joseph

### One

Why is this Year of St Joseph and devotion to him so important and what does it mean to consecrate oneself to Joseph? God's plan is to create a family in which all the members play their specific part and take care of one another. God gives us the immense dignity of being His adopted sons and daughters and the further dignity of sharing in and expressing his power and goodness by helping one another. In God's plan Mary would be not only the Mother of Jesus, but also the Spiritual Mother of all those who have Jesus dwelling in them – all believers. Joseph was the father, protector and provider of Jesus. He continues to care for Jesus in us if we turn to him. Those who use their free will and turn to Mary and Joseph receive the benefit of their maternal and paternal care. We are free and neither God nor his saints or angels will force their help upon us. When we consecrate ourselves to Joseph, saying yes to and accepting God's plan to take care of us through a spiritual family, then we open ourselves up to all of Joseph's care. As a divine person, the Son of God made a conscious decision to place himself under the obedience, care and protection of Joseph. In imitation of Jesus, we make the same choice by consecration to Joseph and receive in return the care of this illustrious spiritual father.

### Two

The Seven Privileges of St Joseph according to Mary of Agreda I have been informed concerning certain privileges conferred upon St. Joseph by the Most High on account of his great holiness, which are especially important to those who ask his intercession in a proper manner. In virtue of these special privileges the intercession of St. Joseph is most powerful: First, for attaining the virtue of purity and overcoming the disordered desires and vices; Second, for procuring powerful help to escape sin and return to the friendship of God; Third, for increasing the love and devotion to most holy Mary; Fourth, for securing the grace of a happy death and protection against the demons in that hour; Fifth, for filling the demons with terror at the mere mention of his name; Sixth, for gaining health of body and assistance in all kinds of difficulties; Seventh, for securing the blessing of many children in families. From Teresa of Avila we can add an 8th, Joseph is the patron of the spiritual life and will help you become better at prayer and enjoy it more.

### Three

Pope Benedict XVI explains the spiritual life of St Joseph The Bible calls Joseph a "just" man (zaddik)...Psalm 1 presents the classic image of the "just" man. We might well think of it as a portrait of the spiritual figure of Saint Joseph. A just man, it tells us, is one who maintains living contact with the word of God, who "delights in the law of the Lord". He is like a tree, planted beside the flowing waters, constantly bringing forth fruit. The flowing waters, from which he draws nourishment, naturally refer to the living word of God, into which he sinks the roots of his being. God's will is not a law imposed on him from without, it is "joy"... This image of the man with roots in the living waters of God's word, whose life is spent in dialogue with God and who therefore brings forth constant fruit—this image becomes concrete...in everything we are subsequently told about Joseph of Nazareth. Once Jesus is born, Joseph imagine the amount of time Joseph spent with Jesus. Talking to Jesus, listening to Jesus, working with Jesus, eating, taking walks, working through problems, laughing, facing difficulties and just being with Jesus sitting silently by the fire. Because Joseph spent so much time with Jesus and knows him so well Joseph is the patron of the spiritual life. In this decade entrust your spiritual life and all your difficulties in prayer to Joseph.

### Four

Pope Francis wrote: Prayer is Resting in the Lord. Rest is so necessary for the health of our minds and bodies, and often so difficult to achieve due to the many demands placed on us. But rest is also essential for our spiritual health, so that we can hear God's voice and understand what he asks of us. Joseph was chosen by God to be the foster father of Jesus and the husband of Mary. As Christians, you too are called, like Joseph, to make a home for Jesus...To hear and accept God's call, to make a home for Jesus, you must be able to rest in the Lord. You must make time each day for prayer. But you may say to me: Holy Father, I want to pray, but there is so much work to do! I must care for my children; I have chores in the home; I am too tired even to sleep well. This may be true, but if we do not pray, we will not know the most important thing of all: God's will for us. And for all our activity, our busy-ness, without prayer we will accomplish very little.

### Five

Joy or delight means to rest in or take pleasure in the good thing you possess. We should not just gobble up a good meal, or slam a nice glass of wine or be anxious to move on from a good conversation with an old friend. We should rest in, relax in and savor the good things of life. Delight is to rest in the good. The greatest Good we should not rush through but delight in is friendship with God. Just as we don't want to rush through these lesser goods we don't want to rush through time with God. Here we must learn from Joseph's life and Joseph's rest to learn to relax with Jesus and to spend time with Him in prayer. The Rosary is a great start. But allow yourself to spend more time with Jesus in a leisurely fashion – talking from the heart, listening and resting in stillness and silence. Once you possess God in prayer – there is nothing greater to get or to do and nowhere more important to go. Once you are in prayer you have reached the pinnacle of human life – so stay on the mountain top and rest a while and soak it in.

For all Liturgical Ministers, Pam Zimbelman has volunteered to assist me in managing the Ministry Scheduler Pro software.



## Location of Blessed Sacrament

**Question:** Why do parishes have the Blessed Sacrament in a separate room?

**Answer:** While many Catholics of a certain age have memories of the Blessed Sacrament being housed in the tabernacle on the high altar of the church, many parishes in the decades since the Second Vatican Council have chosen to build a separate space — a reservation chapel — where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. Although this practice is not universal, it is in keeping with the guidance offered by the US Bishops in their document *Built of Living Stones* (see nos 77-78). The goal is to create a space that is separated from the nave and sanctuary, but which is "integrally connected with the church" which can foster "reverence and can provide the quiet and focus needed for personal prayer." This can be especially important for communities that have continuous eucharistic adoration, allowing people to come and pray in a space separate from the normal activities of parish life.

The practice of reserving the Eucharist in a separate space — or in a dignified location away from the altar where Mass is celebrated — is that it emphasizes the importance of the liturgy itself, which is the "source and summit" of the life of the Church.

As with many things in the Church, the practice of placing the tabernacle in the sanctuary or in a separate chapel is not universal (as can be seen in visits to historic churches in Rome and other places). The important thing is that as communities question where to place the tabernacle, they listen to the voice of the Church, explore the ancient and varied liturgical tradition of the Church, consider the needs and life of the community, and also take into account the architecture and limits of the spaces they might already have.
