The Pope and Civil Unions


On Wednesday, October 21, 2020, the general media reported that Pope Francis, in an interview for a documentary, endorsed civil unions for same-sex pairs and declared that they have a right to a family. Subsequently, some commentators claimed the Pope was mistranslated. In response to the speculation that Francis was mistranslated, his longtime theological advisor Archbishop Victor Fernandez, clarified that the term used by the Pope "convivencia civil", rendered as "civil unions", was correct. According to Archbishop Fernandez, and other Spanish native-speakers and ecclesial sources, Francis did, in fact, advocate for the legal status of same-sex unions. No clarification has yet come from Rome.

In this interview, apparently the Pope is voicing a personal opinion that contradicts Sacred Scripture and 2,000 years of unchangeable Catholic teaching on this topic. Even though it is merely an opinion and not papal teaching, this creates confusion and division. Of course, no one, including the Pope, has the authority to change Divine Revelation.

Regarding this issue, the Catholic Church has always taught that we should have respect, compassion and understanding for those dealing with homosexual inclinations or other sexual temptations. We are sensitive to the great challenges they face in life. We strive to accompany them and lead them to healing and redemption in Jesus Christ. At the same time, there is no possible way to regularize homosexual behavior or other sexual disorders. The Bible and the Catechism of the Catholic Church are clear on these points. The Church proclaims this truth without hesitation because her greatest concern is always for the salvation of souls. Moreover, these behaviors are grave threats to marriage and family life, and to children of adoption, and are very confusing for vulnerable youth. Despite what anyone may purport, in the final analysis, we all know in our heart of hearts what the truth really is.

I would like to conclude with a few words addressed to all of us. They were spoken by Our Lady of Revelation in Rome on March 13, 2000. Our Heavenly Mother said: "You cannot construct a church because the Church is already built to welcome the repentant sinner who lives in error. Men must live for the Church and not the Church to live for them. Men must be persuaded of the truth. . . . The doctrine of the Church is of Christ, the Word, my Son and I am the Mother of the Church. Do not change the doctrine but rather change your hearts to live this doctrine for your salvation and that of your neighbor that impatiently awaits your return to the pure font of the Gospel."

Please pray and sacrifice for Pope Francis, the Vicar of Christ!

- 1. Chastity: To live chaste lives in accordance with the Roman Catholic Church's teaching on homosexuality.
- 2. Prayer and Dedication: To dedicate our entire lives to Christ through service to others, spiritual reading, prayer, meditation, individual spiritual direction, frequent attendance at Mass, and the frequent reception of the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist.
- 3. Fellowship: To foster a spirit of fellowship in which we may share with one another our thoughts, experiences, and so ensure that no one will have to face the problems of homosexuality alone.
- 4. Support: To be mindful of the truth that chaste friendships are not only possible but necessary in a chaste Christian life; and to encourage one another in forming and sustaining these friendships.
- 5. Good example/Role Model: To live lives that may serve as good examples to others.





Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I remember as a child the meticulousness my father would bring to a task. Whether it be tending to a chore in the yard, repairing something, or painting a room, the tiniest of every detail demanded his attention. He had great patience. I benefited greatly by his example and remember these lessons well. We all need examples to follow. It is important to identity folks who excel at simple things and show us how to do things well. Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

Everyday Saints

Growing up I thought saints were larger than life people with extraordinary stories. The thought that I could one day be revered as a saint by anyone seemed crazy. I wrote my essays on different saints every year in Catholic school right around All Saints Day. These were stories about people I had never met, and I assumed I would never meet anyone like them going forward.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Communion and The Church

Question:

Why do some people receive Communion in the hand, while others have it put on the tongue? And is one better than the other?

Answer:

Prior to the liturgical reforms that accompanied the Second Vatican Council, it was the universal practice that Catholics would receive communion "on the tongue," meaning that the one receiving would allow the priest distributing communion to place the consecrated host on their outstretched tongue. At this time, only the priest celebrant (and, on special occasions, priests assisting at the Mass) was allowed to receive the Precious Blood.

Since 1977 (with the approval of the Holy See) the bishops of the United States have officially approved two equally valid options for receiving Holy Communion in Masses celebrated according to the Ordinary Form of the Mass. As the bishops' statement *Norms for Holy Communion Under Both Kinds states:*

The communicant may choose whether to receive the Body of Christ in the hand or on the tongue. When receiving in the hand, the communicant should be guided by the words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem: "When you approach, take care not to do so with your hand stretched out and your fingers open or apart, but rather place your left hand as a throne beneath your right, as befits one who is about to receive the King. Then receive him, taking care that nothing is lost" (no. 41).

As we noted, both ways of receiving communion are equally valid in the United States and it is important that we always keep the instructions of the bishops in mind as we reflect on which method we might prefer.

First Reading:


In a vision, John sees in heaven those who survived being tested in their faith. What would you say is the biggest test of threat to your faith?
