



Learn Your Faith

There are two common ways to offer prayers for loved ones at your parish - having a Mass offered and vigil lights in the church.

Praying for loved ones with the Mass is an ancient tradition. The Mass is the most powerful of all prayers, so it is a very effective way to pray for loved ones. While you can personally offer your own prayers at Mass for a special intention, requesting that the priest say a Mass for your intention can be even more powerful because your intention will often be read aloud and/or published in the parish bulletin. The priest and many in the congregation will now be offering their prayers, through the Mass, for your special intention.

Requesting a Mass be said is easier than you might think. It's often as simple as calling your local parish and putting in a request. There are also many religious orders and shrines with online Mass intention request forms you can submit. It is customary to give a very small monetary gift (stipend) when you request a Mass for a special intention. This money helps support the parish facilities or missions. The requested stipend in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee is \$10.

You can offer a Mass for family members, friends or any special intention, but Masses offered for the dead are particularly powerful. Since the souls in Purgatory are no longer able to pray for themselves, they rely on the prayers and good works of those still on Earth to help them along in their journey to paradise. Vigil lights or candles have been a tradition since the early church. Vigil candles represent prayers. The word *vigil* is Latin for "keep watch." The lit candle symbolizes your prayer. The candle then keeps vigil in the



church or shrine when you cannot physically be present. You may also hear these called votive candles. Votive comes from the Latin word *votum* meaning "promise or prayer."

Many churches, shrines and chapels have designated areas next to sacred images with small candles that you can light. Depending on the candles and their setting, these candles may continue burning for a few hours or even up to a week. Churches often ask that you leave a small donation to cover the cost of the candle. The requested donation at St. Francis Borgia is \$5. This simply covers the purchase price of the seven day candle.

When you light one of these candles, you can offer a prayer or intention along with it. You can pray for a special request, for deceased loved ones, for those who are sick or suffering, or simply to thank God for His blessings.

Please call the parish office with your requests for parishioners who are ill or in need of prayers to be published in the bulletin - both the printed and online versions. Privacy issues require that all requests be initiated by a member of the immediate family.

Names will be published in a total of 12 bulletins (about three months). If at the end of that time, the person wishes to remain on the list, he/she will need to call the parish office and share that request.

The bulletin prayer list only includes the names of parishioners. Names of non-parishioners, friends and neighbors can be added to our prayer chain. To be added to the list, please contact the parish office.

Have a new family addition?

If you wish to have your child baptized at St. Francis Borgia and haven't previously participated in baptism preparation (whether at St. Francis Borgia or another parish), you will need to attend a class prior to arranging your child's 'baptism date. We encourage you to attend the class as early as possible even before your baby is born.

Additional plots open in SFB Cemetery

St. Francis Borgia Cemetery has opened a new south section of plots with 300 spaces available. Planned landscaping includes many trees and bushes and, at 5/8 of an acre, it's the largest section to be opened in 150 years!

Additionally, 200 more plots are now available in the "historic" section of the cemetery. It took a while to figure out, but after exploration all of the previous burials in this section have been located. Part of this process involved researching old records to see which plots remain open. These new burial sites are scattered throughout the original section.

Three summers ago there was a plea to the parish to help fund the Infants Memorial and crosses for the unknown infant burials in the St. Francis Borgia Cemetery. Now that we have located the unknown sites, it's time to set the 170 crosses.

On Saturday, Sept. 11 at 9 a.m., we are seeking volunteers to dig holes for the crosses. It's an easy task, but we have a lot of them! Spaces will be all marked and guidance available, but please bring your own shovel. If you can't make this date but would still like to help, contact Brian Willbrandt (info below) about what you could do on another date prior to Sept. 11.

The following Saturday, Sept. 18 at 9 a.m., we are looking for volunteers to move wheelbarrows of concrete from the truck to the holes. Some will pour the concrete, while others will smooth it out and set the crosses. Smoothing and setting the crosses can be done by most anyone, but the concrete hauling (about 80 lbs. per load) needs more muscle. Please bring a wheelbarrow if you have one.

We will try to get both jobs done in just a couple of hours each day. To accomplish this, we will need many helpers. This is also a good opportunity for service hours for youth!

Reflecting on today's readings ...

Our readings offer us examples of how we should be living, and they present us with an opportunity to make a radical change in our lives.

In our first reading, Joshua tells the leaders of the Israelites to decide as to who they shall serve in this life. As he presents them with this choice, he boldly states, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Who or what does your household serve? Whether you are a household of one or twelve, now is the time to decide, 'will we serve the Lord?'

We are constantly bombarded with endless distractions around us. It can be very easy to serve other 'gods' in our lives. For instance, putting technology (phone, internet, TV), kids' extracurricular activities, our jobs, or our social lives before the Lord. We also might be putting these things above our loved ones, and if we are doing that, then we are putting them above our relationship with God.

With this in mind, we must strive each day to intentionally live as disciples of Christ. It starts with commitment — incorporating personal daily prayer and increasing that prayer week by week, incorporating prayer into our marriages and families, frequenting the sacraments, and serving others. Through this time with the Lord and service to those around us, He will reveal to us where to go next.

Reflect on how you may not be putting God first in your life and decide to respond like the Israelites, "Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods... Therefore we also will serve the Lord, for he is our God."

LOCAL NEEDS

North Church Restoration | \$320,000

More than 1,500 people join together every weekend to worship God for our Sunday Masses. In order to ensure we are serving our parishioners and visitors well, and protect the future of this space, we need to make improvements. They include enhancing our outdoor plaza and roof replacement on all parish buildings.

Eliminate the Education and Activity Center Mortgage | \$335,000

In 2015 our parish and school community were able to take the amazing step to build a new Education and Activity Center. This center houses our school and is also utilized for various parish functions, including Christian Formation. Due to the amazing work of dedicated volunteers and staff, our debt has been reduced significantly. Through this capital campaign, we will eliminate the debt in full which will allow us to focus more deeply on our mission.

South Church Renovations | \$719,025

The South Church is a beacon of faith and Catholicism in our community. We utilize this site for our daily Mass, weddings, select Masses, as well as Eucharistic Adoration. With Adoration, this Church has been revitalized and is a center for prayer throughout the week for parishioners and visitors alike. This campaign will allow us to restore the original beauty of the space by doing work that includes installing and restoring beautiful altars as well as redoing the floors and repainting the interior of the Church. It will also allow us to do maintenance which includes stone tuckpointing and bell tower restoration.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last Tuesday, a violent, late-night storm raced through southeastern Wisconsin. Of course, I was in bed and as usual I slept through the sounds that were created by the violent winds, thunder, and lightning.

It was around 3 a.m., that I woke from my sleep to perform the normal ritual for an old man. It was then that I reached out to turn on the lights, but the lamp did not light. Half asleep, I thought, great, the light bulb burnt out.

Stumbling my way toward the bathroom, I then tried the overhead lights and again no lights. Looking around I realized the telephone landline light was not on, nor was the cable light indicator.

I proceeded to stub my toe in a feeble attempt to get to the bathroom. This was not the first time that electricity was cut off due to a storm, so I figured the lights would return shortly. Therefore, I returned to the safety of my pillow and covers.

Arising at my normal 5 a.m., power still had not been restored. Again, I thought, well it is just a matter of time. But it was not a matter of time and I encountered one inconvenience after the other interrupting my normal routine. No hot oatmeal, instead cold cereal; no Keurig hot coffee, instead a glass of water; and no ability to read the morning newspaper unless I was near an open window, stealing a few rays from the rising sun.

My cell phone was not charged, the computer was down, and it seemed that all means of social communication had been shut down. So, I could do nothing but wait. It was then that I started to understand how spoiled we are as a people and how much we take for granted.

Most of the populations of the world do not have access to the luxuries that we possess on a daily basis. I, and we, at times are frustrated by the inconveniences created by the loss of the power that provides for our comfortable and supportive life (hot and cold running water, an abundance of fuel for our vehicles, electricity, etc.). You don't think of your hand until you can't use it. And then, perhaps you might give thanks.

When the power was returned there was a feeling of a return to a normal life.

There is an ultimate power, one we could never do without and that is Divine Power, the power of God. Understanding the Divine Power, we realize that if God ceases to hold us in his mind, we cease to exist. Yet many go through life without even considering this divine power, without considering God.

God became man. "The incarnation" gives us an ability to embrace a source that unites all of us through the ultimate power of His love. His crucifixion paid the price for our sins, a debt which we can never repay. It returned us to the destiny that God intended for us. Yet gratitude to God is the most neglected of prayers.

There is a way for us not to take for granted the divine power. It is by understanding that God's loves us and we must LOVE ONE ANOTHER.


