- 1. (c) The tradition that there were three arises from the three gifts that were given to the Holy Family.
- (a) Quirinius was the Roman governor of Syria. Caesar Augustus was the chief of the Roman state. Flavius Joseph was the Jewish historian who chronicled Herod's reign.
- 3. (d) The Rev. John H. Hopkins, an Episcopal priest, wrote the text of this hymn in 1857 for a Christmas pageant at the General Theological Seminary in New York City. Phillips Brooks, also an Episcopal priest, wrote the text to "O Little Town of Bethlehem" in 1865. Father Josef Mohr wrote the text to "Stille Nacht" ("Silent Night") in 1816. Charles Wesley, the brother of John Wesley, wrote the text to "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" in about 1739.
- (a) Luke jumps from the Nativity to when Jesus was twelve years old. Mark begins his Gospel with John the Baptist and the baptism of Jesus. John begins before the creation of the earth and then recounts Jesus' adult ministry.
- 5. (d) The Greek components are *epi* meaning "on" or "to" and *-phainein* meaning "to show."
- (d) Huey, Dewey and Louie are Donald Duck's nephews. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were the three young Hebrew men cast into the fiery furnace by King Nebuchadnezzar (Daniel 3:1-29). Peter, Paul and James are all apostles.
- 7. (c) Myrrh comes from the trees Commiphora myrrha and/or Balsamodendron kua. Merbromin or Mercurochrome was a common antiseptic in the United States until it was banned in 1998 because of the fear of mercury poisoning. Fiddah is the Arabic word for silver. Common nutmeg is of the species *Myristica fragrans.*

First Reading - Isaiah 60:1-6

The last part of the book of Isaiah contains the words of a prophet who lived after the Jews returned from exile in Babylon, (which is modern day Iraq). They found their temple destroyed and the city leveled. But with great faith the prophet envisions a wonderful future for Jerusalem.

Second Reading - Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

The Ephesians were a community in which Jewish and Gentile converts to Christianity lived side-by-side. The author of this letter confirms that God's saving grace is available to everyone, whatever their ethnic or religious background.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew. Glory to you,

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.
