### Moving the Tabernacle

Moving the Tabernacle was no easy task! Weighting nearly a ton (aka. 2,000 pounds), it took several skilled people to determine the best method for its relocation without it crumbling.



First, it had to be determined whether the tabernacle was bolted down to the wooden table it sat on. By using air pocket pads (similar to what a blood pressure cuff looks like) they were able to raise the tabernacle to determine it was not. This was a jumping for joy moment for everyone!

Next, the engineers had to design and build a structure that was even from the floor to the high altar where it would sit.

With the tabernacle raised, it was able to be put onto a forklift where it was moved over to the high altar.

With the forklifts assistance to raise it onto the structure, the experts then used metal tubes to slowly but surely roll it across.

Once moved across, back onto air pocket pads it went where it was shimmied into place and gently set down to its new home on the high altar.

# 3rd Sunday of Easter

We often act out of ignorance. Armed with the best of intentions, we think we are seeing clearly and correctly, but we are not. We don't always understand the full meaning of things and only perceive part of the truth. Hence, our judgments and actions can be impaired by myopic, incomplete or erroneous perceptions. The meaning of life, understanding of human experience, and negotiating life's challenges can all become skewed without proper understanding and vision. The resurrection of Christ is the corrective to our incomplete and limited view of life. Looking at things with the eyes of faith brings a depth of clarity and understanding to how we see God, ourselves, others, and the world.

Even the disciples struggled with their limited understanding and ignorant perceptions. It was only when Jesus opened their minds to understand the Scriptures that their eyes were opened. It was their "aha" moment when everything clicked. We all want the substance of our lives to come together, make sense, and have meaning. This is easier to achieve when things are going positively, and life is good. It is when suffering, disappointment, death, hardship, and injustice enter the picture that things can become unsettled and disoriented. Our faith in the goodness and love of God is tested. We tend to shift our focus on these difficult and challenging moments and do not see them within the greater picture of how God intends life to unfold. We can gain, from the passion and resurrection of Christ, the clear vision we need in order to move away from ignorance to enlightenment.



We need our "aha" moment when everything comes together and clicks. It can come in a fleeting instant when we feel totally connected with God, where we find ourselves, others and all of creation. It is a moment when all is right and good, regardless of how difficult our journey. Our "aha" moment assures us that God is here, right with us, in us and around us bringing us a gift and blessing we can receive nowhere else: peace. In those brief sacramental encounters when we are lifted up out of ourselves and centered, we can hear God say, "peace be with you," and we feel secure. It's all okay. The resurrected Christ has the power to bring this gift to us. Some people, as they are facing their deaths, remark about this peace. When looking into the window of eternity, they experience a depth of joy and are amazed at God's goodness and closeness. We are called to be witnesses to this Good News.

### **Earth Day**

Earth Day takes place every year on April 22nd, and has been in place since 1970. Today, it's celebrated in just about every country on Earth, full of events, volunteering efforts, environmental lectures, and more.

However, just because there are official Earth Day events doesn't mean you can't do your own things.

So, here are our best Earth Day tips for you to take environmental action on your own:

**1. Avoid Plastic Disposables:** A one-time use plastic grocery bag takes 10–20 years to break down, and a throwaway water bottle can take up to 450 years to decompose. Other plastics that are a bit stronger can take up to 1,000 years!

**5. Recycle What You Can:** If you do happen to have a disposable plastic bottle or bag, then make sure you recycle it properly.

6. Don't Drive Alone: Try to carpool as often as you can!

**9. Unplug Your Devices:** One of our easiest Earth Day tips is to simply unplug your electronics when not in use. Devices left plugged in, even when turned off, still consume power, a negligible amount each day, but it adds up over the course of weeks and months.

**10. Donate Your Money:** You don't have to change your habits or do physical labor to help the environment. If you have some spare change, why not donate some money to an environmental organization or green charity?

**11. Donate Your Time:** Don't have much money to hand out to environmental charities? No problem! If you have some spare time, consider donating that instead, as a volunteer or a part-time worker for an organization that helps. We talked already that you can volunteer cleaning up the roads, beaches, and parks.

**12. Donate Your Belongings:** Instead of throwing away your old clothes, appliances, laptops, cell phones, and other items, consider donating them.

**13. Don't Stop After Earth Day:** Earth Day might be only one day a year, but these Earth Day tips are important to keep in mind each and every day.

You can't (and shouldn't try to) do all these environmental actions all in one day anyway. Rather, keep these ideas and work on them as often as possible, whether it's daily, weekly, or monthly.
