FROM YOUR CLERGY



There is an old Jewish tale about a teacher, his student and a bird. I have read this story many times and just as it is with the reading and rereading of the same stories of the Torah every year, the stories don't change, but we do. Read the story with me and see if the lesson that

has become clear to me resonates with you.

There once lived a mischievous young yeshiva student who lived at the yeshiva with the other students and the rabbis. He always thought that the rabbi was getting more respect than he deserved. He did not think the rabbi was really wise. So, one day he decided to test him.

Holding a bird in his hands behind his back, he asked, "Rabbi, they say you're wise, can you tell me whether the bird in my hand is dead or alive?" The boy thought if the rabbi said it was alive, he would wring its neck and kill it. If he said it was dead, he would let it fly. Either way he'd prove the rabbi was wrong. The rabbi smiled knowing what the boy was thinking and said, "The answer is in your hands"

Upon reading the story in recent months. I have come to understand that its moral has more nuance than I had originally thought. Yes, it is about life and how fragile it can be. And yes, it is also about how we all have some say in how we deal with the circumstances we find ourselves in. But. it was not until I started teaching my classes and my b'nai mitzvah students by way of distance learning, that I understood a deeper meaning of the story.

As I look into the faces of my students in their homes as they give their all to make our classes and lessons everything they can be, I understand why the rabbi in the story takes the time to impart the wisdom of the lesson. It was not so much the lesson itself that was important, but the rabbi's understanding of the patience needed to impart the lesson that is most paramount.

We have all had to look for patience more than ever during this difficult time. In Hebrew, the word for patience is *savlanute*. The challenges we are facing during the pandemic have forced us to dig deeper than ever to find *savlanute* for ourselves, our families, our friends, and the temple community. The beautiful part about searching for patience is that not only does it make us more compassionate with one and other, but it also leads, step by step, to the very things for which we have patiently been waiting. With hard work the rabbi and I are now once again leading services from the sanctuary. This was a long time in coming, but we knew it would come with patience and you supplied that. This way of working breeds more movement in a positive direction. As an example, for those of you who don't yet know this, we are now beginning a program that allows a limited number of congregants to come to the synagogue to be part of the service in person. This will be a slow thoughtful process, but it will lead to bigger, safer and even more fulfilling experiences.

Just like the rabbi in the story who takes the time to model patience for his student, I am reminded of the words of the song **Ani Ma'amim** (I Believe) that I am asked to sing so often when we are experiencing trying times: *"Even though god may tarry, I will wait for god"*. Modeling this kind of behavior is not a lack of action; it is a type of prayer. May we all continue to support each other as we pray in this manner.



Our fate is bound up in each other (BT Shevuot 39a)

In 2020, we learned the extent to which the fate of every single one of us is in each other's hands. We are woven together inextricably. We need each other. We depend on each other. We must be here for each other.

Such has been the goal of the Sinai Men's Club these past eleven months. In the absence of direct contact, we have sought to retain as much contact with one another as possible without overly straining our Zoom tolerance.

On Sunday, February 28th at 10:00 a.m. **The Sinai Men's Club Virtual Breakfast** Presents: **Newtown Alive.** Our guest Speaker will be Walter L. Gilbert, III - Newtown Historian.

NewtownAlive.org is funded by a grant through the Sarasota County Neighborhood's Department. The North County Community Organization submitted a proposal January 26, 2016 and won approval. The overall initiative is part of a plan developed by the City of Sarasota to preserve the history of the African American Community of Newtown, one of this town's oldest neighborhoods. The Newtown Conservation History District (NCHD) is an idea ten vears in the making. Former Sarasota City Commissioner Fredd Atkins began discussions about the need to document Newtown's history in 2005. The seed of an idea began budding as Atkins witnessed the redevelopment and subsequent gentrification of Sarasota's first African American community of Overtown. Located near the heart of downtown, the African American Community was rebranded as the Rosemary District. Recognizable landmarks of its history disappeared.


In addition to the scheduled breakfast on the 28th, on Monday, February 15th, we will have our virtual **Film Forum** with a discussion of *East Side Sushi*.



FROM YOUR PRESIDENT



I stopped dead in my tracks. I was riveted. I watched the slow procession of motorcycle after motorcycle go down the street. Huge American flags were flying behind many. Leather covered men and women atop the machines were attired in the typical

garb, but looking more aware of their surroundings than usual as they passed by much more slowly than usual. Long hair. Beards. I looked for flags that represent hate groups. There were none. I couldn't move from my spot on the sidewalk. There must have been 30 or 40 bikes driving in a long, slow line - followed by several older pickup trucks sprouting huge American flags from the rear. My anxiety rose. Where were they going? What would they "do"? What was their message? Should I call the police? The media? Of course, I did nothing, but feel anxious.

It was the day after five people died during the riotous breach at the Capital in DC. I am not a historian. I do not possess the perspective of one, so I struggle to put the riots in some context, in some frame of reference to which I can relate. The image of the man in the Camp Auschwitz sweatshirt sends me into a downward spiral of anger, hate and M



horror. The unspeakable things I imagine doing to this man frighten me.

In many ways, I am an optimist ... or perhaps more accurately, a pragmatist. Weird as this may sound, my viewpoint is not only partly innate, but also stems from reading and studying the Torah. Our story, as recorded in our Torah, speaks of the human condition of thousands of years ago. Kindness and brutality, love and hate, honesty and deceit, freedom and slavery, good and evil are all evident during those ancient times. And now? Yes, some things have changed. We have modern "conveniences" machines that drive or fly us all over the world, communications that connect us instantly and weapons that can destroy millions in a flash. But as human beings, have we changed, evolved from the days of which the Bible speaks? I think not.

As Jews, we teach *Tikkun Olam* - to repair the world with acts of kindness, to pursue social justice. We pray for peace – for us, for Israel, for the world. We teach our children charity by putting money in the Tzedakah Box. We affirm the value of each human life, equals among each other, as we are all created in the image of God. And so, we must foster these core Jewish values, because the struggle to

overcome the darker side of humankind must never abate.

Today I find solace in the words of Alden Solovy and I share them with you in the hopes that you too will find comfort in them.

God of mystery, Thank You for the gift of this day, For the one ending, And the one about to begin. Help me to see the moments and the hours, Those already past and those to come, As blessings, as teachers. Guide me to service for Your name's sake. Grant me comfort and rest So that I enter the new day With a sense of joy, hope, and peace. Then. God of old. I will become a source of love. A beacon of wonder, awe, and grace.


Report to Membership:



Dr. Christopher Wilson Delights The Women of Sinai with an Educational Presentation About Sarasota Architecture



The Women of Sinai were enthralled with a fascinating presentation of architectural design in the Sarasota area given by Dr. Christopher S. Wilson at the January 7th Zoom meeting. Dr. Wilson teaches architecture and design history at Ringling

College of Art and Design. He has been a board member of the Sarasota Architectural Foundation since 2012 and currently serves as board chair. Dr. Wilson earned a bachelor's degree in architecture

from Temple University, a Master of Arts degree from The Architectural Association. London. England, and a Ph.D. from Middle East Technical University in Dr. 🅎 Ankara, Turkey. Wilson worked as an



architect in Philadelphia, Berlin, and London, and is registered with the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA). Before the pandemic he was asked to be a visiting scholar at Cambridge, but Covid-19 prevented this. He hopes to go in the near future.

Dr. Wilson revealed some astonishing information about Sarasota architecture with wonderful photos of buildings that were based on a regional variation of modern architecture adapted to Florida climate. There was a close relationship between the inside and outside of homes with glass enclosures and overhead shading structures to protect from the rain.



He spoke about architects, such as Paul Rudolph, who designed homes and Riverside Hiah School (demolished in 2009). Paul Rudolph designed the art and architecture building at Yale.

Suzanne Weinstein, moderator, introduced Dr. Wilson and thanked him for joining our Zoom meeting with an educational and interesting presentation.
