
MISSION STATEMENT

The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Today's gospel presents both wonderful and curious contrasts. A blind man gains the disciples' attention, and they ask Jesus whether his blindness is due to his sin or the sin of his parents. The culture of Jesus' time attributed illness and other problems to personal sin. Jesus reassures them that the man's blindness is not the result of sinfulness but so that God's glory may be revealed.

Jesus proceeds to anoint the blind man's eyes, restoring his sight. The Pharisees question the man as they discount the miracle, claiming that Jesus is certainly not from God.

The jubilant man insists that he has been healed and that the man who healed him is certainly a prophet. Furthermore the healed man after repeating his joyful testimony ironically asks the questioning Pharisees if they want to be Jesus' disciples!

The blind man has experienced Jesus' merciful love and power and he joyfully gives his testimony, amazed that these teachers cannot see!





PEACE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

The Church invites us on this Fourth Sunday of Lent to consider light and darkness. Both practically and metaphorically it is a healthy Lenten exercise to think about light and darkness in our lives.

In reading from the Letter to the Ephesians, you were reminded that, "you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord." The text does not say you are in the light of the Lord; no, it says you "are light" in the Lord. What might that mean? Light in the Lord implies a relationship between you and the Lord.

The Lord is light; indeed the Lord is, as Psalm 27 puts it, "my light and my salvation." And the psalmist draws from the inspired assertion this encouraging conclusion, "whom do I fear?" With the Lord dwelling within you and enlightening you, you have nothing to fear.

There was a time – before your baptism – when you were indeed in darkness, as was the case with the Ephesians before they heard and believed the good news. But with Baptism, they and you became illuminated with the life and light of Jesus Christ. There may have been other times between then and now when you chose to turn away from the light, to extinguish the light of Christ within you, and to revert to darkness. But here you are, at this moment, drawn By God's grace into the light. Note again that Paul was telling the Ephesians (and through them, telling you) that you "are light." So again, I have to ask: what might that mean?

It seems to me that Paul is saying that the follower of Christ is an enlightened person, a person who has light within, a person who exudes light, a person who not only reflects the light of Christ, but who can illumine his or her part of the world and thus assist others in finding their way out of the darkness into the light. The world [certainly] needs that spiritual illumination today.


SUMMER CATECHETICAL MISSION 2020 MISSIONARY INFORMATION STUILS a week long summer parish
