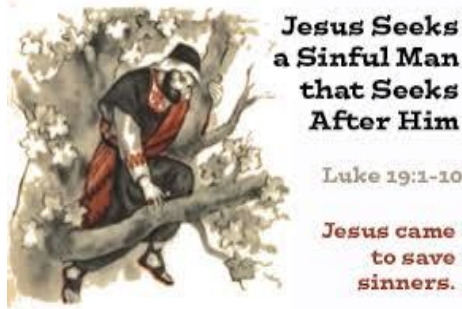

31TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

November 3, 2019

Zaccheus is one of the most interesting characters in the Gospels. What is this rich man doing by looking for Jesus? Everyone in town knows he is a sinner, one who has broken the law consistently, probably by cheating others and breaking the Lord's commandments. Why does he take the risk that the Gospel writer describes, climbing up a tree because of his small stature? And Jesus not only listens to Zaccheus, he recognizes him, calls him by his name, and invites himself to dine with him that night. Jesus always chooses those who need him and seek him out, even in the presence of those who criticize his actions. These critics simply do not understand how important it is to listen to the sinner in their desire to be renewed. Today, Zaccheus reminds us of those who are so near to us that we have not realized their need. Who can they be: a family member, a friend, a neighbor, or a member of the community? 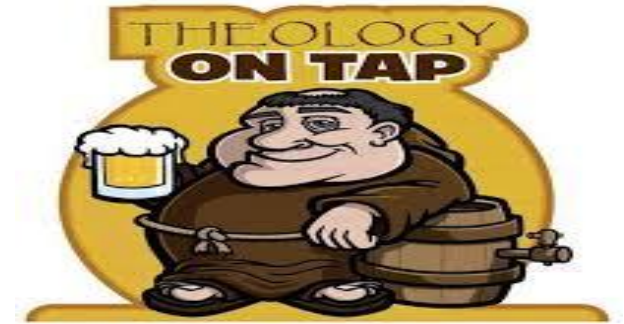

ALL SOULS DAY AND WHY CATHOLICS CELEBRATE IT

All Souls Day is a solemn celebration in the Roman Catholic Church commemorating all of those who have died and are now in Purgatory, being cleansed of their venial sins and the temporal punishments for the mortal sins that they had confessed, and being made pure before entering into the presence of God in Heaven.



On All Souls Day, we not only remember the dead, but we apply our efforts, through prayer, almsgiving, and the Mass, to their release from Purgatory.

Praying for the dead is a Christian obligation. In the modern world, when many have come to doubt the Church's teaching on Purgatory, the need for such prayers has only increased. The Church devotes the month of November to prayer for the Holy Souls in Purgatory, and participation in the Mass of All Souls Day is a good way to begin the month.
