FATHER RAY'S PASTORAL NOTES X-RAYS

Howdy! These early days of Advent, although it is the sec-

ond week of this preparation season, our scriptural emphasis is found in the proclaiming of a savior and lord coming into the midst of the people. John the Baptist was one of these heralds. He knew not however, how this messiah would come about, but did know that whoever this person may be, would be more powerful than he. This person would baptize for one and in a unique type of way - baptizing not only with water, but with the fire of the Spirit.

In many ways this anticipation, this announcement that is the foundation of the Christmas event, is relevant in our call to evangelization and for us to unleash the gospel.

Perhaps, this could be the important or influential factor in our lives, in light of our preparation for Christmas. For as John called the people to repentance and change in life style, so too, could we do, so as to unleash the gospel through the pastoral letter of our archbishop and uphold that prayer we prayed after communion - into a new Pentecost.

We have to juggle in so many ways, our everyday lives and the bombardment of Christmas sales and holiday savings with the fact, that we are Christians and, Catholic Christians at that! Thus, we are to be unique in how we respond to this annual pre- holiday frenzy, while maintaining a knowledge of how this all came to be: God so loving the world and a world who needed some form of hope and sent to the people, a savior, messiah and lord. And it was not only His birth, but his life that was given, that we have hope and now, today, hope in a troubled and divided world that we are currently living in. It is a hope of something more, something else that fashions 'n shapes us. Even this mindset separates us from the holiday cheer and hustle and bustle of the days.

In that mindset, note well, how I began this article; by saying in these early days of Advent versus the first part of December...to help us focus or re-direct ourselves as Christians towards the religious significance versus the secular ploys that pull away from the origin of what we celebrate.

So, we have to be strong to stand against the influence of secular sales,

bargains that can easily pull away from being followers of Jesus.

Perhaps a bit of nostalgia is best here: the holiday cooking and baking, the decoration that has to be just right, etc..., that our parents, grandparents did..., that had their roots in honoring God, the birth of Jesus and the many other related stories, such as the celebrating of the kings that visited. The foods, blessings, decorations and blessings needed and found and the prayers prayed, all related or were tied to the events of Christmas. Some have drifted away, yet we can bring them back!

Thus, as you get ready for Christmas and the many things that I know some to many of you have to do, stop for a few moments and remind yourself why you are doing them. If it is not for the honor and glory of God, think of why you are doing them.

If we can begin to center ourselves on this fact - of God and God so loving the world - the other things that we have to do, will fall in place and will reflect what we know and believe inside. So I pray, that you can find some time, valuable as it is for you, to stop and consider all that you do and want to have happen, and how it can be centered on prayer, prayerful attitudes and most importantly, towards honoring God.

Do take care and God's blessings.

1st Sunday of Advent

"I'm never getting enough rest! How can I possibly be 'asleep'?" In a world of jam-packed schedules and high anxiety levels, physical rest may be hard to come by. Yet relentless pursuit of our to-do lists and social calendars may keep our minds off of the things that really matter. Jesus knows all too well a pattern of busy, harried ignorance. "In those days before the flood, they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage ... they did not know until the flood came and carried them all away ... two men will be out in the field ... two women will be grinding at the mill; one will be taken, and one will be left." When it comes to the spiritual life, we can be at work or at relaxation and still be spiritually asleep.

Each year, we are called back to remember the essential things. God comes to save His people. He becomes flesh to dwell among us. Supernatural light pierces the world's darkness and our own. Advent wakes us up. "Stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." Christian Stewardship

Earlier this month, the Department of Development and CHOUCESENCESENTE Stewardship distributed weekly reflections for the readings in the Sunday Liturgy of the Word in Cycle A, which parishes can begin including in their bulletins this weekend.

These Stewardship Thoughts are designed to encourage reflection on the grace God gives to each of us through His gifts of time, talent, and treasure, and how we are called to "steward" those gifts to serve Him in advancing His Kingdom on earth.

Your CSA gifts allow the Archdiocese of Detroit to provide materials and guidance on Christian stewardship education, including the Department of Development and Stewardship's award winning stewardship education manual, *Called by Christ, Gifted by the Spirit.*

Pastoral and Sacramental Guidelines

Baptism

Infant baptisms are celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 11:30 Mass (or after). Parents requesting baptism of their child



or children must contact the parish office, be baptized (or at least one parent), registered and active members of the parish. They must attend a baptism class at least one month prior to the baptism. Newly registered members must wait three months prior to a request.

Marriage

Couples seeking to be married at St. Roch's must contact the pastor to secure a date, contacting him at least six months or more, prior to their desired date. One member of the party must be a baptized Catholic, active and registered at St. Roch's (or through their parents). The couple will then be instructed in the marriage preparation program. Non-catholic members (of the party) or previously married members are not restricted from entering into marriage, so long as they are free to marry according to

the laws of the Catholic Church.



Anointing of the Sick

Any member of the parish may be anointed prior to surgery, beginning therapies, suffering chronic illnesses, having reached old age and/or having been hospitalized. This sacrament of healing is for the living (conscious and alert) and can be celebrated in church, at home or in the hospital. Please contact the parish office for a visit to be arranged. Emergencies always take precedence.

First Eucharist and Confirmation

Please contact the religious education office for information regarding these initiation rites, requirements and subsequent celebrations.

Reconciliation

This healing sacrament is celebrated every Saturday afternoon at 3Pm in the church or by appointment.

Catholic School Tuition Assistance

St. Roch Parish is able to assist families who are active members of the Parish, with Catholic School tuition assistance. Contact Fr. Ray and or the Finance Council for more information.

Using the spirituality of St. Teresa as a guide, we can learn to love and serve here and now.
