Pastoral Musings: Happy Fall

"Every beginning has an end and every end has a beginning". This dictum that speaks of the beauty change reminds us of the peak of fall season that brings to an end the harvesting season and marks the final four weeks of Church's year before the start of Advent on November 28th. Can you believe that we are already passing quickly to the new year focusing on the End Times and the Second Coming of Christ which remains our own mortality and final destination of heaven.

Thank you for your prayers for my safe travel and return back from home. It was a very delightful visit with my Mom and family after the long gap of three years although the travel was an adventure. Shopping with my sisters certainly taught me lot of patience and persistence. Special love and greetings from my Mom and family to each one of you. I did pray daily family rosary with my Mom family for both of my parish families here as I promised.

The month of November itself is dedicated in a special way to remembering all saints and praying for all souls who have gone before us. All these experiences of passing season reminds us of our true goal in life to love God and love people focusing on the final destination of heaven. In some way, our cultural observance of Halloween has its roots in Church's end-of-the-year focus on the Last things: Death, judgement, Heaven and Hell. Contemporary culture, however, draws its focus down ward, reveling the morbid and the scary for interesting entertainment.

The Church, rather, has always had its sights set on things above, and things deeper, as we wait with expectant hope for the glorious coming of Christ into our lives. For all of us who live in Him and experience his mercy can never live-in fear rather in the full hope of immortality. Our hope is not without the urgency to reform our lives and constantly reconciled to God and one another.

One of my personal devotions is to spend my first hour daily before the Lord to center my life and remind me of the final destination. It helps me to offer each one of you to the Loving and living God ever present in our nature and in our sanctuary seeking his grace, strength and glory as his beloved. At the daily Mass I commend all of our families unto the Lord who comes to us as solace and strength to live as his beloved followers and disciples.

Only by following Him will I know where to go. Thus, every one of us should use these weeks ahead to examine our consciences: How am I walking through life? Am I focused on Christ first? What or whom do I follow?

Theresa of Lisieux comforts us in our journey to God: "Yes, I'm like a tired and harassed traveler, who reaches the end of his journey and falls over. Yes, but I'll be falling into God's arms!"

Family Connection

Today's Gospel leads us to think about our family's financial contributions to our parish community, the diocese, other Church-sponsored organizations, and other charitable organizations. Good stewardship invites us to share our treasure as well as our time and talent. Sometimes, however, decisions about a family's charitable giving are made without our children's knowledge. Yet we teach more when we invite all family members to be aware of how we contribute to our Church and to other charitable organizations.

As you gather as a family, talk about your family's financial contributions to your parish and to other Church activities. If your family supports other charitable organizations, you might talk about these as well. Talk together about why it is important for us to share our resources with these organizations. Read today's Gospel, Mark 12:41-44. Talk about what Jesus observes about the generosity of the poor widow. Talk also about ways in which your family might also make a sacrificial gift to support your parish or other charitable organization. (Perhaps your family might choose not to go out to dinner but to contribute the money to your parish). Invite all family members to participate in the decision about what action you will take and which organization you will support with your contribution. Conclude in prayer together asking God to help your family be generous like the poor widow in today's Gospel. Pray together the Peace Prayer of St. Francis.

Inspiration for November 7

If a ship is sailing on a polluted canal and wishes to transfer itself to clear waters on a higher level, it must pass through a device which locks out the polluted waters and raises the ship to the higher position. Mary's Immaculate Conception was like that lock... [T]hrough her, humanity passed from the lower level of the sons of Adam to the higher level of the sons of God.

National Vocations Awareness Week: Nov 7-13, 2021

Saint Junipero Serra, the Franciscan priest who founded nine of California's missions, was a model of perseverance and strong faith. Despite a chronic foot infection, Serra walked more miles in his career than the expeditions of Lewis and Clark and Marco Polo combined, all to spread the Good News.

It was perhaps providential that the founders of Serra International, the organization of lay Catholics who promote vocations, chose Fr. Junipero Serra as their patron in 1935. Now, even more than then, the work of promoting vocations requires perseverance and strong faith.

Please continue to pray for an increase in vocations to priesthood, sisterhood, and brotherhood, and for all vocations to the consecrated life.

Prayer is a moving force in vocation development. Prayer is effective; prayer is powerful; prayer is essential. Few are called to priesthood or religious life, but all are called to pray for vocations.

Touch the hearts of many within our parish with the desire to serve you.

Call forth from this community sisters, brothers, deacons, priests and lay leaders.
