Today, on the final day of the Octave of Easter, the eight-day celebration of Jesus' resurrection, we give praise and thanks for God's mercy. Scripture is replete with examples of divine mercy, foremost among them Christ's sacrifice on the cross. Truly, as we hear repeated in the responsorial psalm today, "(God's) mercy endures forever." As we celebrate today's liturgy, let us recall the times in our lives when we have felt that tender mercy.

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DIVINE

Divine Mercy (Second Sunday of Easter)

Acts 5:12-16; Psalm 118; Revelation 1:9-13,17-19; John 20:19-31

Theme: The Human Touch

One day a nurse at a hospital heard cries of 'Help! Help!' coming from the room of a 96-year-old woman who had broken her hip. They rushed in to find that she was just thirsty. 'why don't you push the buzzer?' the nurse asked. 'I have done that,' she said and continued 'I tried but no one responded. The buzzer does not have any human touch.' Physical contact with others is very important. We desperately need to have someone next to us, a friendly and comforting presence. When you visit an orphanage, the children fight for the privilege of touching you.

With this in mind, we can understand how Thomas and the other apostles must have felt when death robbed them of the physical presence of their Master. They had pinned all their hopes and dreams on Christ. But then a storm broke over them and suddenly he was gone. A feeling of hopelessness and futility gripped them.

Beloved, to accept the message of Jesus is no easy matter. The gospel's challenges are unrelenting for the believer and seemingly ridiculous for the nonbeliever. Today's readings suggest how our faith response can counteract our fear and hesitancy to follow Christ wholeheartedly.

The gospel passage also focuses on the very real human experience of fear. The disciples seek the security of secret rooms and locked doors. Only the presence of Jesus is able to calm their anxieties and enable Thomas to profess: "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28). We are all strengthened by his proclamation!

The readings of today remind us that faith involves movement from the world of God into the world of God's people. Here, doing is believing. To Pg. 3.....

In today's Gospel, we heard that Jesus showed the disciples His wounds: He showed them His hands and His side. They were the wounds made by the nails and the lance. Jesus, even after His resurrection, still carried His wound. Since He had a glorified body; He could have dispensed and disposed of His wounds. But He still carried them because:

They are the Wound of His Identity

The wounds of Jesus are the infallible proofs that it was the same person. This is the same Jesus who walked with the disciples for the last three years; this is the same Jesus whom the disciples deserted when He was arrested, condemned and crucified; this is the same Jesus whom they unfastened from the cross and placed His body in the tomb. The wounds of Jesus were one of the living, physical connections between the Jesus before His death and Jesus after His resurrection.

To prove His identity, Jesus showed the disciples His wounds in His hands and on His side. When Thomas doubted the resurrection of the Lord, Jesus appeared to the disciples and said to Thomas, "put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hands and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe (Jn. 20:27-28)."

The wounds of Jesus are the wounds of His identity. Where are our wounds of identity? As Christians, where are your wounds, which you have suffered as a Christian? **Show your identifying wounds to Christ.**

They are the wounds of His Love

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep (Jn. 10:11)." Jesus never avoided sufferings. In the garden of Gethsemane, when He was arrested, Peter took a sword and cut off the high Priest's slave's ear. Jesus rebuked Peter and said to him, "Put your sword back into its place (Mt. 26:51-53)." To Pg. 4..... Jesus suffered and bore His wounds not out of force or compulsion, but out of love for us. Those wounds were the marks of His love; they were the tokens of His love.

They were the Wounds of Sacrifice

Jesus was the Lamb of Sacrifice. He is the Lamb on whom our sins are laid, and then led to the slaughter. By His Blood we are ransomed. He gave up His life for our sake. He died on our behalf as a substitute. Every time we look at His wounds, we need to cry out, "worthy is the Lamb that was slain." This is the Lamb that was slain for us, but this Lamb, although, slain, is yet alive.

They are wounds of healing

The wounds of Jesus are not running sores; they are not the festering wounds, filled with bacteria. They are healed wounds; they are holy and salvific wounds. The Prophet Isaiah said, "He was wounded for our transgressions... and by his wounds we have been healed (Isaiah 53:5;1Pet 2:24)." Through the wounds of Jesus our broken relationship with the heavenly Father is healed; through the wounds of Jesus our broken relationship with one another is rectified.

As believers, we do not rest our faith against the signs and wonders found in the Acts of the Apostles, nor are we tested by persecution. Yet we do know fear. Each of us has our personal secret room and locked doors. We may be afraid of challenges. We may not want to look to the faith needs of others. We may not want to be labeled as overly pious. All of us are at least distant relatives of Thomas; we are victims of fear.

The doubting Thomas within us must be touched. We are asked to respond to the wounds within ourselves and others. Even in our weakness, we are urged to breathe forth the Spirit so that the wounds may be healed, and our fears overcome. Faith will free us! May we bear our wounds patiently as evidence of our Christian identity.



The Promises of Divine MercyChaplet

1. "The souls that say this chaplet will be embraced by My mercy during their lifetime and especially at the hour of their death." (Diary, 754)

2. "When hardened sinners say it, I will fill their souls with peace, and the hour of their death will be a happy one." (Diary, 1541)

3. "When they say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as a just Judge but as a merciful Savior." (Diary, 1541)

4. "Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death." (Diary, 687)

5. "Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy....I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My mercy." (Diary, 687)

6. "To priests who proclaim and extol My mercy, I will give wondrous power; I will anoint their words and touch the hearts of those to whom they will speak." (Diary, 1521)

7. "The prayer most pleasing to Me is prayer for the conversion for sinners. Know, my

daughter, that this prayer is always heard and answered." (Diary, 1397) To Pg. 6..... 8. "At three o'clock, implore My mercy, especially for sinners; and, if only for a brief moment, immerse yourself in My Passion, particularly in My abandonment at the moment of agony....I will refuse nothing to the soul that makes a request of Me

in virtue of My Passion." (Diary, 1320; also, cf. Diary, 1572)

9. "Souls who spread the honor of My mercy...at the hour of death I will not be a Judge for them, but the Merciful Savior." (Diary, 1075)

10. "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image (of the Divine Mercy) will not perish." (Diary, 48).... "The two rays denote Blood and Water....These two rays issued from the very depths of My tender mercy when My agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross. These rays shield souls from the wrath of My Father." (Diary, 299)

11. "I desire that the Feast of Mercy...be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after

Easter.... The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion (in a state of grace on this day) shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment." (Diary, 699)

12. "Through this chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will." (Diary, 1731)
