Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 14:21-27; Psalm 145; Revelation 21:1-5; John 13:31-35

Theme: "Love one another"

People who have suffered the loss of personal possessions, in a fire for example, say the greatest

losses are photos of those who have touched and continue to touch the heart in love.

Today's readings affirm this human sentiment. We must make God present in as many ways as possible.

The first reading from Acts of the Apostles describes the preaching of Paul and Barnabas. The most obvious sign, of course, is the preaching itself, that opens the door of faith to the Gentiles.

The gospel focuses on Jesus' departure, an absence that will severely test his beloved disciples. The Lord, aware of the human heart, gives the formula for a continuing experience of his presence: Love one another. Wherever self-giving love is found, people will recognize Disciples of Christ, and Christ himself!

Mother Teresa recognized that, the biggest disease today is not leprosy, cancer or tuberculosis, but the feeling of being unloved or unwanted. There is more hunger in the world for love and appreciation than for bread. If you judge people you have no time to love them. If you love until it hurts, there can be no more hurt, only more love.

When we die and appear before the judgment throne, God will NOT ask, how many good things have you done in your life? Rather he will ask, how much LOVE did you put into what you did? What we need in the world is to Love without getting tired. Good works are links that form a chain of love.

The love of God and neighbor are the essential ingredients of our Christian religion, our relationship with God in Christ. In fact, Christianity cannot be practiced otherwise.

Our relationship with God has a vertical and also horizontal dimension: the love of God with all our soul and with all our strength (as in Dt 6:4), and the love of our neighbor as ourselves (as we also see in the book of Leviticus 19:18). He says in John 15:13 that there is no greater love than for a man to lay down his life for his friends. And in John 13:35 he says that it is by the Practice of such love that men and women will know that we are his disciples.

You cannot claim to love God while neglecting to love your neighbor, or to care for them when they are in need. You can also not have the love of neighbor without the love of God. Without the love of neighbor, the love of God remains a barren emotion. And without the love of God, love of neighbor is only a refined form of self-love.

Beloved, Christian love, however, is **sacrificial love.** It hurts. The most powerful expression of Christian love is the cross of Calvary.

Let us eschew the hypocrisy of claiming to love God while ignoring our neighbor whom we see. We must not forget that the love of God is best seem in our relationship with our neighbor. Your love for God reflects the love you have for your neighbor.

There is only one way to recognize a disciple of Christ – **Love**. There is only one thing that can glorify God – **Love**. There is only one thing that can reveal God – **love**. The "Christian" is not title, but a way of life. Love is the trade mark of a disciple of Christ. Love seeks to makes us active in the service of God and others. Love overcomes hatred and seeks to make everyone happy. May you sow the seed of Love daily. Shalom!

In his 1965 encyclical,

"Mense Maio," Pope Paul VI wrote about the importance of Mary's intercession for all the world, explaining that those who encounter her, encounter her Son, Jesus: "For what other reason do we continually turn to Mary except to seek the Christ in her arms, to seek our Savior in her, through her, and with her? To Him men are to turn amid the anxieties and perils of this world, urged on by duty and driven by the compelling needs of their heart, to find a haven of salvation, a transcendent fountain of life."

Pope Paul VI went on to write, the month of **May** is the month Christians offer the Virgin Mother more "fervent and loving acts of homage and veneration; and it is the month in which a greater abundance of God's merciful gifts comes down to us from our Mother's throne."

During the month of May, we honor her motherly and queenly majesty from every corner of the earth. Let us all seek her motherly intercession.


A New Commandment
