Cycle C -- Reflections on the Readings

Third Sunday of Easter

Acts 5:27-32,40-41; Psalm 30; Revelation 5:11-14; John 21:1-19

Theme: Courage Under Pressure

When he was seven years old, his family was forced out of their home on a legal technicality, and he had to work to help support them. At age nine, his mother died. At twenty-two, he lost his job as a store clerk. He wanted to go to the law school, but his education wasn't good enough. At twenty-three, he went into debt to become a partner in small store. At twenty-six, his business partner died, leaving him a huge debt that took years to repay. At twenty-eight, after courting a girl for four years, he asked her to marry him. She said 'no'. at thirty-seven, on his third try, he was elected to the congress, but two years later, he failed to be reelected. At forty-one, his four-year-old son died. At forty-five, he ran for the Senate and lost. At forty-seven, he failed as the vice-presidential candidate. At forty-nine, he ran for the Senate again and lost. At fifty-one, he was elected president of the United States. His name was Abraham Lincoln, a man many consider as one of the greatest leaders of the world. *Failures never seemed to have discourage Lincoln*.

Today's readings, however, salute individuals who know success only after traveling the rocky road marked failure.

The twenty-first chapter of John closes out this gospel. Today's passage features Peter, a man who knew failure along the road of discipleship. Three times Jesus tells Peter to feed and tend the sheep. This is a reminder of Israel's kings who were often cast in the role of shepherd (see Ezekiel 34:2,10).

THE DISCIPLES WENT FISHING

The disciples had seen the risen Lord at Jerusalem, and they were instructed to go back to Galilee and there Jesus would meet them. Peter, being a man of action, proposed to go for fishing. He was accompanied by six of the disciples. They went to work and there they found the risen Lord. We, too, will meet the Lord during the performance of our duties.

THE DISCIPLES SEEMED TO LABOR IN VAIN

The disciples had labored the whole night, but they caught nothing. Cast after cast was made, and time and time again the nets were drawn in and nothing was found except twigs and mud. What a laborious waste their efforts had been! As their hopes were fading, it is then that they heard the voice of Jesus, which they did not recognize, saying, "Lads! Have you any fish? And they answered, 'No'.

Weary body and wet cloths, and empty nets are the lots we often experience in our lives. But we are called in life, not to give up. Even if the last cast has brought in nothing, we need to try again. Our fishing nets and boats may be empty, but if we heed His voice and cast our nets once again, our nets, too, would be filled to the breaking point.

Peter had denied Jesus. Jesus not only forgave his sin but conferred upon him ultimate responsibility for the flock. Peter learned his lesson well; he would imitate Jesus the rest of his life even to the point of giving that life as a martyr.

Heroes aren't supposed to fail. The psalmist, Peter, and Jesus teach us how that type of hero is fantasy. We live in a real world where weakness and imperfection are the human condition. Even in the face of our greatest failures, there is a new and brighter tomorrow, because we know that Christ is risen!

Not exactly a joke, but worth sharing.....

Jumping out of the car, he approached a man he saw every Sunday, a man he'd never seen in uniform.

"Hi, Bob. Fancy meeting you like this."

"Hello, Jack." No smile.

"Guess you caught me red-handed in a rush to see my wife and kids."

"Yeah, I guess so."

Bob seemed uncertain. Good. "I've seen some long days at the office lately. I'm afraid I bent the rules a bit -- just this once."
