

CATHOLIC Church

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Summer has begun! With warm temperatures and long sunny days, this season brings intense growth to many of the fruits and vegetables we eat. Here and now, though, we focus on a different kind of food, the Eucharist. Bread and wine are offered by God's people, and through the priest, are blessed by God, becoming the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Sharing this meal today, in remembrance of the Last Supper, we find our true sustenance. The Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)



Genesis 14:18-20; Psalm 110; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; Luke 9:11-17

Theme: Holy Eucharist, food for the soul

Have you ever seen two people sitting at the same table in a restaurant yet never speaking a word to each other? The social dimension seems totally absent, the meal becomes nothing more than satisfying the body's need for food and drink.

The readings for the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ urge us to see the Eucharistic meal as an experience of one another. The wheat and grapes embrace the entire planet as they become bread and wine; the bread and wine embrace all creation as they become the body and blood of Jesus.

The Genesis passage has Abram returning home from a successful battle. He meets Melchizedek, the priest-king of Salem; the two shares a meal of bread and wine and so form a bond by which they commit themselves to mutual obligations.

Paul, in today's passage from the First Letter to the Corinthians, warns against situations where some hoard the food and drink while others go hungry. Paul reminds the Christian community that Christ's words were "Do this in remembrance of me" (verse 24). An authentic celebration of the Eucharist occurs when those participating truly put on Christ. This means mirroring the self-giving of Jesus in their daily lives. It is only by providing for the needs of all that Corinthians of old and Christians of today genuinely celebrate the Lord's Supper.

The gospel passage describes the multiplication of the loaves. Luke places this miracle immediately after Jesus' preaching about the kingdom of God, a kingdom where the needs of all are satisfied. Luke also makes it clear that this miracle has a Eucharistic dimension. Christ follows the pattern found at the Last Supper and on the road to Emmaus: taking, blessing and thanking, breaking, and giving (Luke 9:16; 22:19; 24:30) This is the only miracle of Jesus related in all the four gospels (compare Matt.14:13; Mk.6:30; Jn.6:1). It begins with a lovely thing. The Twelve had come back from their tour.

There is all the divine compassion here. Most people would have resented the invasion of their hard-won privacy. How would we feel if we had sought out some lonely place to be with our most intimate friends and suddenly a clamorous mob of people turned up with their insistent demands? Sometimes we are too busy to be disturbed, but to Jesus human need took precedence over everything. The evening came; home was far away; and the people were tired and hungry.

Before Jesus distributed the food, he blessed it; he said grace. There was a Jewish saying that "he who enjoys anything without thanksgiving is as though he robbed God." Jesus would not eat without giving thanks to the giver of all good gifts.

This is a story which tells us many things:

(i) Jesus was concerned that people were hungry. It would be most interesting to work out how much time Jesus spent, not talking, but easing men's pain and satisfying their hunger. He still needs the service of men's hands.

(ii) Jesus' help was generous. There was enough, and more than enough.

(iii) **As always there is permanent truth in an action in time**. In Jesus all men's needs are supplied. There is a hunger of the soul; there is in every person, a longing to find something in which we invest our lives. Our hearts are restless until they rest in him. "My God will supply every need of yours," said Paul (Php.4:19) even in the desert places of this life.

The Eucharist is not a private devotion separate from the rest of our lives. In eating and drinking we commit ourselves to serve Jesus Christ who is manifested in the needs and problems of our brothers and sisters around the world.

Jesus leaves with us today, in His Body and Blood, each day when the Eucharist is celebrated.

The holy Eucharist is the food for immortality (viaticum) as often as you eat my Body and drinks my blood you proclaim my death until I come. We are bringing the death of Christ to the present and making it effective in ourselves.

The Eucharist makes us Christ bearers, when the Body and Blood are infused in our members. **LET US DEVELOP LOVE FOR THE EUCHARIST AND ADORE CHRIST.**

Brief History of Corpus Christi

The appearance of Corpus Christi as a feast was primarily due to the petitions of the Augustinian nun **Juliana of Liège.** She was born in 1193.

From her early youth Juliana had veneration for the Blessed Sacrament, and always longed for a special feast in its honour. This desire is said to have been increased by a vision of the Church under the appearance of the full moon having one dark spot, which signified the absence of such a solemnity. In 1208 she reported her first vision of Christ in which she was instructed to plead for the institution of the feast of Corpus Christi. The vision was repeated for the next 20 years but she kept it a secret. When she eventually relayed it to her confessor, he relayed it to the bishop.

Juliana, also petitioned Pope Urban IV) and Robert, Bishop of Liege. At that time bishops could order feasts in their dioceses, so in 1246 Bishop Robert convened a synod and ordered a celebration of Corpus Christi to be held each year thereafter.

In 1263 Pope Urban IV investigated claims of a Eucharistic miracle in which a consecrated host began to bleed. In 1264 he issued the papal bull **Transiturus de hoc mundo** in which Corpus Christi was made a feast throughout the entire Latin Rite. This was the very first papally sanctioned universal feast in the history of the Latin Rite.

The Feast of Corpus Christi, which is a moveable feast, is celebrated on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday or, in countries where it is not a Holy Day of Obligation, on the Sunday after Holy Trinity.

The Importance of Eucharistic Adoration

The importance of Eucharistic Adoration is shown in the fact that the Church has a ritual that regulates it: the Rite of Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction. This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the

sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.

Holy Hours

Holy hours are the Roman Catholic devotional tradition of spending an hour in Eucharistic Adoration in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. The bishops have created a variety of holy hours that focus our prayer to Jesus Christ on peace, life, vocations, and other topics that are at the heart of the life of the Church and the world.

Twelve Biblical Reasons For Wanting To Spend One Hour With Jesus In The Blessed Sacrament

1. He is really there! "I myself am the living bread come down from heaven." (Jn 6:35)

2. Day and night Jesus dwells in the Blessed Sacrament because of his Infinite love for you!

"Behold I will be with you always even to the end of the world," because "I have loved you with an everlasting love, and constant is my affection for you." (Mt 28:20; Jer 31:3)

3. The specific way that Jesus asks you to love him in return is to spend one quiet hour with him in the Blessed Sacrament.

"Where your treasure is, there is your heart...." "Could you not watch one hour with me?" (Mt 6:21; 26:40)

4. When you look upon the Sacred Host, you look upon Jesus, the Son of God. "Indeed, this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks upon the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life. Him I will raise up on the last day." (Jn 6:40)

5. Each moment that you spend in His Eucharistic Presence will increase his divine life within you and deepen your personal relationship and friendship with him.

"I have come that you may have life and have it more abundantly." "I am the vine and you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him shall bear much fruit because without me, you can do nothing." (Jn 15:5)

6. Each hour you spend with Jesus will deepen his divine peace in your heart.

"Come to me all of you who are weary and find life burdensome and I will refresh you..." "Cast all of you anxieties upon the one who cares for you..." "My Peace is My Gift to you." (Mt 11:28; Pt 5:7; Jn 14:17) 7. Jesus will give you all the graces you need to be happy! "The Lamb on the throne will shepherd them. He will lead them to the springs of life-giving water." (Rev 7:17)

8. Jesus is infinitely deserving of our unceasing thanksgiving and adoration for all he has done for our salvation. "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive honor, glory and praise." (Rev. 5:12)

9. For peace in our country! "When my people humble themselves and seek my presence... I will revive their land." (2Chr 7:14)

10. Each hour you spend with Jesus on earth will leave your soul everlastingly more beautiful and glorious in heaven!
"They who humble themselves shall be exalted...." "All of us, gazing on the Lord's glory with unveiled faces, are being transformed from glory to glory into his very image." (Lk 18:14; 2Cor 3:18)

11. Jesus will bless you, your family and the whole world for this hour of faith you spend with Him in the Blessed Sacrament.
"Blessed are they who do not see and yet believe..." "Faith can move mountains..." "What is needed is trust... " "Behold I come to make all things new." (Jn 20:29; Mk 11:23; Mk 5:36; Rev 21:5)

12. Each moment you spend with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament brings joy, pleasure, and delight to his Sacred Heart! "My joy, my pleasure, my delight is to be with you." (Prov 8:31)
