Cycle A -- Reflections on the Readings

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah 55:1-3; Psalm 145; Romans 8:35,37-39; Matthew 14:13-21

Theme: Little in the hands of Jesus is always much

A villager, along with his wife, came to the city and entered a hotel. He stood in the lobby of the hotel and watched people moving up and down in the elevator. He has never seen an elevator in his life. He watched an old lady entering the elevator and after closing the door, she went up. The villager stood and watched the elevator wondering what the old lady was doing inside that small room.

After some time, when the elevator opened, he was surprised to notice a beautiful young lady coming out of the elevator. Oh! He wondered what a wonderful machine this is – an old lady gets in and within minutes she is transformed into a beautiful young lady. He wished that his wife should also become as young as this lady. Therefore, he held his wife by her hand and started pushing her towards the elevator.

I do not know if the elevator was a wonderful machine, but certainly the hands of Jesus are wonderful. He may receive a little from our hands, but when he returns it to us, it is always abundance.

In today's Gospel, we heard about the multiplication of the loaves. When Jesus saw the crowd, he took pity on them and said to the disciples, "You yourselves give them something to eat." To this command of Jesus, there are three reactors: Philip, Andrew and *the boy* (Jn. 6:1-13).

The boy

There was a boy who supplied Jesus with the raw materials for the miracle. He gave the little he had-five loaves and two fish. We don't know the name of the boy. Was he a peddler who came there to sell some bread and fish in order to make money? Or was he a boy on some picnic? We know nothing for sure. Although a boy, he was a generous soul.

When the disciples asked him to part with his bread and fish, he willingly parted with them. He agreed to lose something of his own, so that the others could gain. He was a great soul, who sacrificed his meal for the benefit of others. His name we may not know, but his magnanimity we shall never forget.

This young boy stands for the providence of God. He was the right person, with the right things at the right moment. God ordains myriad things in His own ways for our benefit.

Little in the hands of Jesus is always much. May we give the little we have in our hands into the hands of Jesus, so that He might multiply and satisfy our needs. Genuine disciples do not isolate themselves from the needs and concerns of others. To reach our God is to reach our sisters and brothers. Humans are not obstacles to union with the divine but rather the condition for that union. People are the barometers of our relationship with God: Your problem is my problem; no one is an island. How have we imitated Jesus in providing the poor a place at our table?


