As we celebrate the Eucharist here today, let us reflect on this awesome privilege of being a part of this two-thousand-year-old mission and contemplate what we are called to do to bring it closer to perfection.



Cycle A -- Reflections on the Readings

Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah 22:15,19-23; Psalm 138; Romans 11:33-36; Matthew 16:13-20

Theme: The use of Power

Today's readings remind us that power exists for the good of the powerless.

The first reading contrasts the use and abuse of power. In the eighth century B.C., Isaiah is sent to inform Shebna, the prime minister, of his removal from office. Shebna has been a "disgrace to his master's house" (Isaiah 22:18). The prophet also speaks of Eliakim, one truly worthy of authority. Eliakim will discharge the duties of office as a "father" and will support King Hezekiah and his kingdom by paternal service.

In the Gospel, Matthew combines the scene of Peter's confession with a post-Resurrection appearance of Jesus to Peter. The Lord calls Peter blessed because he perceives that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of the living God. Because this faith comes from God, Jesus confers the grace of leadership on Peter. This impetuous disciple will be "Rock", an unshakable foundation for the Church. The keys as also seen in Isaiah suggest power, the power of one who will focus not on self but on community.

Significance of Jesus' authority

Jesus gave authority to Peter, to teach, govern and rule over the universal Church when he said, "You are Peter and on this rock, I will build my Church... I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven" (Mt 16:18). It is the teaching of the Church that the Bishop of Rome, the Pope, is successor to Peter as heir to that office. It also recognizes that every Bishop is true head of the church in his own Diocese, holding authority directly from Christ.

By choosing very weak human beings as instruments of His divine authority, Jesus wanted to teach a lesson also to those who look up to Church leaders for guidance. The lesson is that while we accept fully the divine authority in them, we need also to fully accept their human limitations.

As Christians, we all exercise power in our respective work, home, or community. Are we more of Shebna or Eliakim? Are we intent upon making our power felt or making our power a service? Isaiah, and Matthew agree that to be in charge means to protect our charges. May our power be of service to others. Shalom!


Annual Diocesan Appeal (ADA)

THE PRIEST IN THE ERA OF COVID-19

This is a sequel to last week write-up as I reflect on my twelve years ministerial priesthood amidst covid-19.

Ban on Weekend masses

Human by nature is spiritual. Because of this instinct, there is that drive which enable us to search for spiritual fulfillment. Even atheist still believe in something. In the wake of the pandemic, our physical space for worship was taken way from us as preventive measures of containing the virus. The question of faith and prayer took the center stage.

Then I remembered the words of Pope Saint John Paul II encyclical "Faith and reason." He opines, "faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth..." While church doors were closed, my prayer channel was still active. Some of my brother priests suggested Facebook live or YouTube live for mass. I was not enthused by this as I wanted to know my audience and being careful what goes on social media.

Idea of Zoom Mass

During one of my private masses with Blaine Maher, a chat with Cheryl Phillips and Lori Goodman unearth the new baby "zoom". Within few minutes, I downloaded it from google play store while Blaine was patiently trying to figure out what I was doing. Then, we had our first weekday mass via zoom. It was nice and a bit chaotic as all microphones were not muted.

Beginning of zoom mass

When the Lord delivered Israel from bondage, it seems like a dream. Then our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with shouts of joy. Then it was said among the nations, "The LORD has done great things for them" (Psalm 126:1-2). The idea of having zoom mass was put into full gear like a dream come true. Knowing very well I have twins (Shenandoah & Hamburg), there was the need to arrive at conducive time for all.

With a new means of communicating, I needed to learn more and figure out what to do. YouTube was my learning tool to help me navigate through zoom. Just when things were not clear, Professor Lynda Marshall became my resource person.

This enable me to leave the task on the shoulders of Lynda Marshall and Cheryl Phillips. It was a big sigh of relief. Consequently, Dana Wenstrand joined the team as sound technician in ensuring that participants cameras and microphones are muted.

The Joy and challenges of using zoom.

The birth of zoom mass was a unifying tool after being in hibernation for weeks. It was indeed refreshing seeing and greeting each other at the end of mass. The initial stage for zoom mass is likened to airplane brazing turbulent storm. Many could not navigate through and needed tutorial. The team facilitated this challenge by helping members to get on zoom. I am forever grateful to them.

Having mass on zoom enable me to see and know my audience. While I enjoyed seeing members participating, my spirit was elated during the Divine Mercy Novena, Rosary, and teachings. These programs were to foster unity and deepen our prayer life. It was fully participated.

I do not see the need for higher data for my phone plan. Using 3G for the month was enough for me. However, with the birth of zoom mass, I started running out of data pushing me to change my plan. There were instances that calls may slip through while using my phone for zoom. For the most part, I was and still at the mercy of internet signal.

As time progresses, the need for a tripod came into sharp focus. Eventually graduating into wireless microphones. There were challenges however, not insurmountable.

Big up to my indefatigable zoom team who works behind the scene to facilitate our zoom masses and other events. Making power points to engage participants via zoom and ensuring the right slide is shared is not an easy task. Most often, our hosts are tempted to think of how to change slides, share music, mute participant mic or camera while fully participating in the liturgy. Sometime, the computer decides when to change by spinning for few minutes or internet is weak. Evidently, this affect their full participation in the liturgy. Thanks for your resilient.

There were times that the microphone gives up during the liturgy or phone mic goes off without my knowledge. During the liturgy, my attention is divided by looking into the device to ensure everything is alright while making sure the congregation is not disrupted. The temptation of looking into the phone device with the blessed sacrament instead of focusing on the Lord was a challenge.

I am glad this pandemic has taught me a lot to ponder on. To trust God in all circumstances. As a wounded healer, the needs of members were pivotal as I discern which direction the Lord is leading me to help the Church.

The hand of the priest

Unworthy as I am, God continues to use my hand to bless and sanctify. To consecrate ordinary bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ. God's grace works through my feeble body and weaknesses.

As we weave in and out of each other's paths in this pandemic, let us all strive to be there for each other. The emphasis is to love before we seek to understand. As human being, people will surprise us beyond our expectation. You will end up disappointed if you think people will do for you as you do for them. Not everyone has the same heart of gold as you. Some will hurt us, and some will heal us. Some paths will challenge us, and some will change us. Without challenges there would never be any growth.

So, remember that when life breaks your heart, it is so love can flood through the cracks. Sometimes courage is the little voice at the end of the day that says I will try again tomorrow. A failure is not always a mistake, it may simply be the best one can do under such circumstances. THE REAL MISTAKE IS TO STOP TRYING. I THINK YOU HAVE TO TRY AND FAIL, BECAUSE FAILURE GETS YOU CLOSER TO WHAT YOU'RE GOOD AT.

COVID-19 IS REAL. Always remember to protect yourself and others. That is the way we can restore, as quickly as possible, the blessings of normalcy for which we all yearn. Pray for those in the frontline who risk their lives for us.
