

Epiphany of the Lord St. Mary's Catholic Church Hamburg, Iowa January 3, 2021

Living in an age well before the internet or social media, the magi from the East relied upon a single star as a sign that a king had been born. The heavens revealed to these learned foreigners that a matter of great import had occurred in Judea. Today we celebrate the revelation of the birth of our Lord to the outside world, to us. The light over the little town of Bethlehem has revealed the light of the world to the ends of the earth.



Cycle B -- Reflections on the Readings Solemnity of the Epiphany

Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72; Ephesians 3:2-3,5-6; Matthew 2:1-12

Theme: Becoming bearers of Christ to the world

As an old man was walking down the beach, he noticed a young girl ahead of him picking up starfish and flinging them into the sea. He asked her why she was doing this. The little girl explained that a starfish stranded on the beach when the tide went out would die if left in the morning sun. 'But the beach goes on for miles and there are millions of starfish,' said the old man. 'How can your efforts make any difference?' The little girl looked down the stretch of beach at all the starfish and then stared at the one in her hand. As she pitched it back into the saltwater waves, she answered, 'It makes a difference to this one.' So, it is with every human being. Every person is infinitely precious in the eyes of God in their unique human dignity. Therefore, he sent his son Jesus as the savior of all humanity. This is what the feast of Epiphany celebrates.

The word Epiphany comes from the Greek meaning "appearing or to show".

The Epiphany of the Lord is about revelation: the manifestation of a God who cares in the person of the Son who became man and dwelt among us.

Matthew writes at a critical moment in the life of his community. Many Gentiles were entering the community, but many Jews were leaving it (see Matthew 21:42). To show that the admission of the Gentiles is part of God's plan, he tells the story of the astrologers. The pagan astrologers are the first to pay homage to the newborn King of the Jews; the Jewish leadership rejects this King. The faith of the gentile astrologers is meant to challenge the Jewish defectors.

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The Magi and what they stand for

The magi represent all those Gentiles who will enter the Christian Church while the Jews, who possess the Scriptures, reject Jesus. Believers are first and foremost recipients of the light who are challenged to penetrate darkness.

Today's readings understand community members as the bearers of gifts to others. To share one's gift is to overcome the darkness and usher in the light.

Determination of the magi

Tradition gives the names of the magi as Gaspar, Balthazar, and Melchior. It should be noted that opinions vary regarding the place of origin of the Magi. I won't go into detail about their origin.

They leave their homes, and they start searching. They are looking for something. What? They do not know. But they believe it is something great and wonderful. They leave with the hope to find it. Travelling in those days was not easy. They leave the security of their own land; they set out on the road to an unknown destination.

We see them keeping their eyes on the star – the sign. We hear them asking from people, from the king himself. Nothing stops them. They have set their hearts on finding what they are looking for.

Breathing the air of hatred and suspicion instead of Joy

The magi came to Jerusalem, the capital of Judah, expecting, of course, to find the city and the whole country rejoicing. Instead, they found suspicion and hatred in the reigning King – a hatred which in a few days turned to murder. Remember, Herod killed all the infants less than two years old.

Friends, we too know the true facts concerning Christ, his mission, and his present and future kingdom.

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Like the leaders of the Jews of his day, we could become absorbed in the affairs of this life and the quest for wealth, pleasure, and power that we will ignore him.

These three men we hear of in today's gospel represent us. We, like the magi are searching for some sign. A sign that will show us where we can find what we are looking for here on earth.

And what is this we are all looking for? We want a good life. We want to be in good health. To be on the right track, what you are looking for should lead you to Christ.

The three wise men did not find the star in a beautiful house of a king; they only stopped there to ask for information, not in the home of a rich and powerful person. They were led to a poor shelter where they found a child, the prince of this world who brings light into our lives.

Dear friends, we are still at the beginning of a new year, and like the Three Wise Men at the beginning of their journey, we do not know WHAT it will bring to us. But we know WHERE it will bring us to. If only we allow God to lead us, it will bring us to Himself, to the Savior who has come to us.

The wise men saw the star and understood its meaning, their journey was purposeful, and they were committed. Like the magi who followed the star and found Christ. May you also find the Lord when your pilgrimage is ended. Shalom!
