Cycle B -- Reflections on the Readings

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Deuteronomy 18:15-20; Psalm 95; 1 Corinthians 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28

Theme: He Spoke with Authority

In today's Gospel, we heard that when Jesus taught at the synagogue at Capernaum, the hometown of first four disciples, people were amazed at His teaching because He taught as one having authority and not as the scribes. Authority (in Greek, *exousia*) means an ability to perform an action without hindrance, and therefore, it is often associated with the kings. The teaching of Jesus with authority manifested the dominion of God, which was declared to be near (Mk 1:15); His teaching with authority was God's reassertion of His royal authority in the end-time.

Jesus' Authority is different from authority of the scribes

Many of the scribes were the Pharisees. They were the interpreters of the law and as such were in common touch with the people. That is the reason the people were immediately able to identify authority in Jesus' words as compared to the scribes.

According to the Gospel of Mark, the teaching of the scribes is a human teaching, which nullifies the commandments of God. When the disciples of Jesus were eating without washing of hands, the Pharisees and the scribes objected saying that the disciples of Jesus were not living according to the traditions of the Elders. Jesus accused them saying, "You abandon the commandment of God and hold on to human traditions (Mk 7:1-8)." Jesus' words derive their authority from the fact that He is the Messiah commissioned and authorized by God to proclaim the nearness of God's kingdom.

Characteristics for using authority

If we, like Jesus, are to speak and relate to others with authority rather than power, then we must have certain characteristics:

Our speech and actions, coming from the depth of our beings, ought to have a certain **credibility and conviction**. In other words, there must be a certain matching going on between what we do and what we say. And our words, in turn, must be consistent with what we feel and think.

If we speak with authority, we will show it through a sense of **responsibility**. We will feel accountable to God, to the world, to the community or family. We will live with the moral integrity and sense of values that characterizes a person with inner authority.

There are people in this world who use power, arm-twisting manipulation and force to rob others of their dignity. When, on the contrary, we address others with authority, when we speak and act with credibility and conviction, with respect and a sense of responsibility, with knowledge and in a spirit of service, we give people back their dignity. We thus empower them in a new way, just as Jesus did.

Jesus links his prophetic office with alleviating all that oppresses and depresses the human spirit. Jesus seeks not personal gain but comfort for the hurting.

Baptism empowers Christian spokespersons to address the community for the common good. Our God endorses comforting the depressed, helping the lonely, and visiting the shut-ins. Whenever we reach out to these and similar people, we communicate in a most realistic way the message of God. To share God's Word in action is nothing less than prophetic ministry. Shalom!

GROUNDHOG DAY

The first Groundhog Day celebration was held in 1887, but its origins go back much further to the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas Day. The belief was held that if the sun shone that day, then winter would continue another six weeks. Germans adapted this idea, basing their prediction on whether a hedgehog saw its shadow on Candlemas Day.



When German settlers arrived in Pennsylvania, they carried this tradition with them but switched their weather forecaster from a hedgehog to a groundhog. On February 2, 1887, a newspaper editor from Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania declared the city's groundhog, Phil, as the only official weather-predicting groundhog. Each year, thousands of people continue to gather in Punxsutawney to witness Phil cast his shadow and reveal either an early spring or a long winter.
