Cycle B -- Reflections on the Readings Fourth Sunday of Advent

2 Samuel 7:1-5,8-11,16; Psalm 89; Romans 16:25-27; Luke 1:26-38

Theme: Let God's Will be done

There was a former drunkard who got converted to Christianity. He believed in Jesus and reformed his life. One day another man met him and asked him, "I heard that you got converted to Christianity. Do you know anything about Jesus?"

The drunkard said, "Not much." "Do you know where he was born?" The drunkard replied, "No sir, I don't know." "Do you know how many miracles he worked?" The drunkard again expressed his ignorance.

Then the man said, "for being a new convert, you know nothing about Jesus. It is useless." Then the drunkard said, "Sir, I am really sorry that I am ignorant of many things about Jesus. I am ashamed of it, but one thing I am sure. Six months back I was a great sinner. I was a drunkard. My family was in shambles. My wife and children used to dread me coming home in the evening. But after I believed in Jesus and accepted Him as my Savior, I reformed my life and now, my family is incredibly happy, prosperous and peaceful."

All we need is Jesus

Beloved, we may not know many things about Jesus. People spend their entire lives to study about Jesus. We need not know everything about Jesus. But if we know one thing it is enough for us. That we are sinners and Jesus is our Savior.

No one's words or deeds are sufficiently redemptive, except Jesus Christ. We are saved by the blood and cross of Jesus.

Redemption would seem to be a divine enterprise. Generally, we imagine ourselves as cast in a minor role on the stage of salvation history. To imagine the all-powerful God calling to say "I need you" doesn't quite fit. What could we possibly contribute to such an awe-inspiring production?

Today's readings take a different approach. We are free, grace-filled participants in the drama of salvation. The Davidic king, Mary, and Paul have leading roles. God says to them "I need you."

Mary's Yes and our response

Luke's account of the Annunciation to Mary follows a pattern found in the Hebrew Scriptures: an angelic appearance, fear in the recipient, the message and its problem, a resolution, and a sign to confirm God's intent. Mary says "yes" in total openness, the ideal disciple who hears the word and acts upon it.

Annunciation - God's wondrous action in human history.

The story of the Annunciation calls to our attention God's wondrous action in human history. God chose a human person to give birth to his Son so that all humanity would know God's salvation. Mary, already full of God's grace, was able to cooperate in this great plan for our salvation. Thus, Jesus was born as one of us, fully human and fully divine. This is the mystery we prepare to celebrate at Christmas, the mystery of the Incarnation. In the model of Mary, we pray that we will be people of faith who recognize God's saving plan for us and are able to respond with obedience.

My dear beloved, God has urgent need for us, just as for the Davidic king, for Paul, and for Mary. We are God's instruments of consolation, of peace, of mercy. We announce God's saving presence. What better season than Christmas to be needed by the Messiah? Let us all resolve with faith to respond yes to God like Mary did.

So, no matter who, when or how. Just continue to help, sustain, wipe tears, listen attentively and carefully repair all the 'leaks' you find, because you never know when one is in need of us or when God holds a pleasant surprise for us to be helpful and important to someone.

You may have repaired numerous 'boat holes' along the way... of several people without realizing how many lives you've saved.
